A THIRD TRANSCONTINENTAL.

The O. R. & N. Co. has succeeded after considerable difficulty, in securing the right of way across the Coeur D'Alene Indian Reservation. This move will enable that company to extend its system to Mullen, the objective point in the Coeur D'Alene mines, and the work of extension will be commenced immediately.

The Jim Hill road is building rapidly towards the Pacific coast and will seek a connection at Mullen with the O. R. & N. Co. to enable it to reach tide water on the coast, and before the people are aware of the fact Portland will be the terminus of another great system of railroads reaching across the continent.

The completion of a new system of railroad will be looked for anxiously, as it will serve in a great measure to solve the transportation problem which is now agitating Portland and the O. R. & N. Co. Three roads competing for the same territory will result in lower freights and fares than if two roads now controlling the Northwest should unite to divide the territory between them.
