Vaccination.

That smallpox has greatly declined in England during the last fifty years is apparent from figures which have been published. From 1833 to 1842 the death from smallpox in England amounted to 57.2 per 100,000; in 1880-84 the rate was 6.5 per 100,000. Vaccination has not only a direct influence in causing this reduction in the number of victims to smallpox, but it also has a tendency to decrease the liability to the disease of children of vaccinated parents.

Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.

His Private Secretary—Virginia Lost—Foul Murder—General Items.

The Whitechapel Agony.

LONDON, Nov. 21.—Great excitement was occasioned this morning when it was reported that another woman had been murdered and mutilated in Whitechapel. According to the woman's statement he seized her and struck her once in the throat with a knife. She struggled desperately, succeeding in freeing herself from his grasp, and screamed for help. Her cries alarmed the man and he fled without attempting further violence. Some of the neighbors who heard the woman's screams followed the would-be murderer about 300 yards, when he disappeared. The woman says she is fully able to recognize the man, and gave a description of him to the police.

A Preacher Swears Off.

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—Rev. E. Walpole Warren, Rector of the Church of the Holy Trinity, swore off drinking for one month. The pledge was taken in his pulpit at the close of a sermon on temperance. It was not taken because the reverend gentleman believed it was necessary to his own good, but just to show himself that he could do it.

During the sermon he said it was unjust to close up the saloon all day Sunday unless the wealthy men would lock their wine cellars. Apparently as a matter of good faith, he closed by taking a pledge not to drink for a month.

A Herd of Buffalo

ST. PAUL, Nov. 21.—C. J. Jones of Garden City, Kansas, has for some years been making a special study of buffalo, and has at present a herd of about fifty on his ranch in Kansas. He began crossing them with cattle and the experiment has been successful, the half breed buffalo being a hardier animal, while much less wild in its nature. The raising of bison has become a profitable business, as fifty cents a pound for buffalo meat can be obtained in Chicago. The animals will be shipped south to-morrow.

From Cowhide to Court.

OLYMPIA, Nov. 21.—The Tuw-water Sunday church horse whipping affair assumed different features, and promises to create a sensation at the next term of district court. A meeting of the citizens was held, and it was deemed advisable, in order to uphold the dignity of the town, that Mr. Mansfield should be prosecuted. The only evidence produced for the defense was that Ward, the complainant, had thrown peanuts at young Mansfield in church, and in various ways made him appear ridiculous.

Harrison's Private Secretary.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 21.—The president-elect tendered Elijah W. Halford, managing editor of the Indianapolis Journal, the position of private secretary. Mr. Halford is 43 years of age, and came from England when a child, with his parents who settled in Cincinnati. He began his paper career as a reporter on the Indianapolis Journal twenty-five years ago, and rose in a few years, through successive promotions, to the managing editorship.

A Weary Infantsate.

Barney Bresler, a Scotchman, was brought down from Albany this afternoon and committed to the asylum for insane. He is a tailor by trade and had been working for several days in Albany, when he first showed signs of insanity and was taken in charge. He thinks he is Jesus Christ and is constantly surrounded by devils. Intemperance is assigned as the cause of his demented condition.

Considerable excitement was created this morning by the announcement that the wife of a well known Salem business man had eloped with her husband's clerk, but investigations revealed the fact she had only gone hurriedly to Squire Farrar & Co's to catch some of those splendid bargains in groceries, etc.

Harrison And The South.

AUSTIN, Nov. 22.—The Chronicle publishes a letter from Gen. Harrison to its editor, declining to write something on what is commonly called "the Southern question." The letter concludes as follows: "What I have said during the campaign is accessible to you, and when the appointed time arrives I shall not hesitate to express such views as I hold, and shall hold all my views subject to modification upon further consideration."

Will Ask a Pardon.

OREGON CITY, November 19.—Frank Hamilton was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary for assault with a dangerous weapon. Public sympathy is said to be in favor of Hamilton, as it is generally believed that he acted in self-defense when he committed the assault. A petition for pardon may be circulated and presented to the governor at once.

Charges Against Powderly.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 21.—It was decided by the general assembly to-day to appoint a committee to investigate and report on the charges against Powderly and other general officers. The report of the committee on law, and the action thereon occupied the remainder of the forenoon session. It contained nothing of importance.

A Healed Heart and \$100,000.

PITTSBURG, Pa., November 21.—The suit of Mrs. Eliza Hibbard against Henry C. Fry, for \$100,000 for alleged breach of promise, was called at Beaver. Mrs. Hibbard, the plaintiff, is the widow of Dr. Henry Hibbard, a prominent physician who died ten years ago. She is a handsome woman about 40 years of age.

The Age to Marry

We do not advise girls to put off marriage until they are 380 years old, which was, I believe, the age of the daughter of Enoch when she entered the state of holy matrimony, but we think that they do not consult their best interests when they allow thoughts of love and marriage to occupy their minds in their "salad days," when they are "green in judgment." This precociousness works mischief in many ways. It prevents the enjoyment of happy years of maidenhood, when the mind and heart are free to expand under healthful influences; it prevents improving and elevating study; it occupies the mind with fancies, desires and castle-building, which are not only futile, but injurious; it indisposes for sensible views of life; it tends to the formation of a shadow and frivolous character, and it not infrequently leads to foolish entanglements and hasty attachments, which cause much anxiety and distress. Sometimes it leads to marriage before either husband or wife know what they are doing, and before the girl is fit either physically, mentally or domestically for the cares of married life.—Scribner.
