News And Notes of a General Interest to the Westerner.

At Astoria bogus \$5 dollar pieces are very plentiful just at present. The people of Oregon are in arms, metaphorically, over a threatened change of text-books.

At the next session of the legislature Woodburn will apply for a city charter.

The establishment of an M. E. church south is being agitated at Tangent, Linn county.

Mr. Hermann of Clackamas county dug 80 fair-sized potatoes out of one potato hill on his farm.

The seed-wheat sharps have put in an appearance in Oregon to collect the notes of the farmers who patronized them last spring.

County Judge W. L. White is rather astonished at the statement of the grand jury that Clackamas county is \$65,000 in debt.

The clerical ilk who is posing as a worthy priest and solicits funds for the aid of such and such a Catholic church has just paid Astoria a visit.

Three years ago Abe Uglov of Dallas paid \$4000 for some land in Seattle, and thought he made a poor purchase but the scales have turned and he has realized \$10,000 from it.

The Pacific Coast Express company are about ready for business and on December 10th will be prepared to handle everything in the line of express matter between Astoria, Ilwaco and Oysterville.

A singular defect in the laws of Oregon was made apparent at a recent term of circuit court, it appearing that the statutes do not impose any penalty for resisting an officers making an arrest, nor do they define the crime other than an assault.

Salmon cannot be scarce as long as we are as successful as we have been in hatching them. The Clackamas hatchery on the upper Columbia, will, within a few months, turn out 6,000,000 young salmon. Our fish commissioners are doing good work as will be shown in the next report.

The erratic East Oregonian says: The new land office for the Harney land district, constituted by act of congress, approved May 21 last, has been located by order of the President, at Drewsey, Grant county, with Robert J. Slater of Pendleton Register and George-McGowen as Receiver.

Some time ago several grains of wheat were found in the winding sheet of a mummy in Egypt. The mummy was at least 5000 years old. The grains were carefully planted and reared and a wonderful grain was the result. A head of this wheat is at McMinnville. On each single stalk thirteen separate heads spring forth. It is a wonderfully prolific grain and Oregon could raise at least 100 bushels to the acre. It is a spring wheat.

Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.

Masquerading as a Boy.
ST. LOUIS, Mo., Dec. 4.—Miss Laura Ritter, a cultured young lady residing near Springfield, Mo., is in the hands of the police, charged with masquerading in boy's clothes. The young lady tells the following story:

"My father is W. H. Ritter, a farmer and bee raiser near Springfield. I slipped on a suit of my brother's clothes and walked from the farm to Springfield, a distance of three miles. It was cold and I had no overcoat, but I had to walk very fast to make the train, and I did not feel the cold. I had borrowed \$20 from one of my brothers and purchased a ticket to St. Louis. It was my intention to come here and secure employment in a photograph gallery. Perhaps I was mistaken, but supposed that, dressed as a man, I could secure employment more readily. I now see I made a mistake, and am willing to return home."

Miss Ritter is 20 years of age and very pretty. She was picked up at once, as the train men discovered her identity.

Attempted Train Wreck.
SACRAMENTO, Dec. 4.—An attempt was made to wreck the Oregon Express, which arrives here from the north. At a point just this side of the American river bridge two ties were found on the track by the engineer of a freight train, which was moving slowly toward this city. An examination showed that the spikes had been removed from the rails and ties so arranged as to derail the train. The obstruction no doubt was intended to throw the express off the track for the purpose of robbery. The train usually runs at a high rate of speed at this point, and would have gone over an embankment and an accident occurred.

A Talking Daily Newspaper.
NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—Edison promises his phonograph to a curious practical use. His intention is to furnish his subscribers with a talking daily newspaper. The little instrument will be charged with the condensed news of the day, and each subscriber can listen to it while at breakfast. It will sing and play to them the latest operas, and reproduce the tones and sayings of public men with all the "thunders of applause."

In the Senate.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—In the senate to-day the various annual reports, including that of the secretary of the treasury, were presented and appropriately referred. Numerous bills were introduced and referred, including one for the construction of two steel rams to be armed with heavy rifled dynamite guns, and one for the construction of two steel cruisers to be armed with dynamite guns.

The Coroner's Inquest.
PORTLAND, Dec. 4.—The coroner's inquiry on the body of Moi Bing, one of the victims of Sunday's bloody fight, was concluded this afternoon. Wong Sing was charged with his murder. The inquest on the body of Ah Sue, another victim, will be held to-morrow morning.

Admit the Territories.
WASHINGTON Dec. 4.—At a democratic caucus, to be held some time this week, Congressman Springer will urge that all the Territories be admitted at once, according to the provisions of the bill which he reported from the Committee on Territories, last winter. This bill admits the whole of Dakota as a state.

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
