### G. A. B. IN POLITICS.

Gen. John M. Palmer was a candidate for Governor in Illinois. He is a democrat and also a member of the G. A. R. organization. It may he is as mad as a tormented hornet over the results. Without any justice he now proposes withdrawing from the order and encourages as much dissension as possible. It is unnecessary to acknowledge that a very large bulk of the G. A. R. vote -say nine tenths or more-went to Harrison. Cleveland and the democratic leaders have appeared to do all in their power to allerate the old soldier, therefore they should be the last to complain if these men do not give them their votes.

As the returning Congressmen assemble in Washington and exchange views regarding the late election, the opinion becomes more general that the tariff, after all, was only an incident, and not, except in certain cases, a potent factor in the campaign.

Senator Faulkner of West Virginia says that notwithstanding several democratic mill-owners in the great manufacturing city of Wheeling swung out of line, the Cleveland electoral ticket gained rather than lost. In other words, the tariff scare failed utterly to frighten the workingmen.

Congressman Yoder of Ollowis a candidate for re-election. It was said early in the campaign that the wool-growers, who are very numerous in his district, would vote solidly against him and thus insure his defeat. He was re-elected by a najority of 1,800 more than he received two years ago. In his Judgement the pension vetos of the President injured him more seriously in Ohio, Indiana and New York than the tariff did.

General Hovey, who ran on the Gubernatorial ticket in Indiana with General Harrison, also emphasizes the fact.

Speaking on this subject General Hovey said:

"It was a soldiers' campaign, and

the soldier vote decided the result. I have no hesitancy in saying that in Indiana alone 10,000 democratic soldiers voted the republican ticket. I do not believe that the tariff issues changed 3,000 votes either way, and a close analysis of the returns, I believe, would show that its influence was rather against us than for us. I have no doubt whatever, if the facts were susceptible of proof, that at least as many democratic soldiers in New York voted for General Harrison as the total republican majority in that State shows, I know, the way the soldiers in Indiana voted, because I received personal letters and corresponded with many of them. The result shows that if President Cleveland's Administration had been such as to attract to it the soldier vote, nothing could have prevented his re-election."


