News And Notes of a General Interest to the Westerner.

Yaquina has over one hundred and sixty children, mostly of school age.

There is a move on foot to organize a Loan and Building Association at Albany.

Francis Murphy, the great temperance worker, has promised the coast a visit this winter.

Young's river cemetery association of Clatsop county yesterday filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state.

It is now said there is a case of smallpox at Roseburg. J. P. Duncan, who worked with the deceased Mr. Burt, has broken out with it and is under quarantine.

Dr. Sharples of Eugene has received returns from two carloads of potatoes shipped to San Francisco. They netted 33 cents per bushel in the ground.

It is said that the new steamer "Yaquina Bay" was wrecked at the same place Sunday.

In the recent decision the Oregon Railway & Navigation Company is prohibited from building branch lines, as well as from using money in the hands of a trust company, or the proceeds.

Capt. Wm. Vaughn who died lately near Brownsville, was 81 years old. He moved to Missouri in 1840 and came to Oregon in 1845 and brought over the first sheep that ever came from the East to this valley.

Just as the steamer Yaquina Bay left her docks at San Francisco, a rope got entangled in her propeller. After a short delay the rope was removed and the vessel proceeded on her way for Yaquina without inspection. Some people think that her propeller was broken—hence her sudden dart upon the bar.

About the only state in the Union that has no law on her statute books in relation to engineers, is Oregon. Any person who has the necessary self-confidence can run a steam engine, and though casualties resulting from incompetency have been in this state the increased use of steam machinery, especially in the harvest field, make it necessary that the engineer should know something about the machine he essays to run.

As the days go on, the sad mystery surrounding the fate of the crew of the wrecked Makah at Tillamook, still remains unsolved. The wreck lies in such shape that it is impossible to tell whether a storm or a collision left her in a helpless condition. There is a possibility that the crew may have made their escape in small boats and reached some friendly island or passing ship, says the Pioneer, but there is a stronger probability that they found a grave in the depths of the ocean.

TELEGRAPHIC TIDINGS.

Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.

Accident on the Northern.

PORTLAND, Dec. 11.—Yesterday morning a passenger train of the Northern Pacific standing on the main track at Puyallup was run into from the rear by a regular freight train of thirteen cars, Engineer Doane in charge. The freight engine crashed ten feet in the Pullman "Mandan." Mrs. Thomas Wilcox of Portland wife of the manager of the Salem and Portland flouring mills, who was on a pleasure trip with her husband, was in the Pullman dressing room and was scalded to death by escaping steam.

Engineer Doane was caught between the cab and the tender, receiving injuries from which he died yesterday evening. Several other sleeper passengers received slight injuries. The morning was very foggy, rainy, and slippery. The engine, sleeper and one freight car were badly wrecked. A special train, bearing the remains of Mrs. Wilcox reached here last night.

Guilty of Manslaughter.

BAKER CITY, Dec. 10.—Saturday morning Arthur Hallam was sentenced by Judge Fee to seven years in the penitentiary and to pay a fine of \$500. Thus ends the trial of the man who furnished the new camp of Cracker City with its first "man for breakfast." The victim, Bud Douglass, and his slayer, Arthur Hallam, in common with hundreds of other miners, sought the new Eldorado for the golden opportunities it offered, but the part they were destined to play in the history of the camp was soon enacted, and to-day, and through the coming years, the story of their trial and conviction. Such, sometimes, is life in the far west.

His Gun Went Off.

EUGENE, Dec. 10.—Another fatal accident caused by the careless handling of fire arms, occurred at Pleasant Hill, this county, on Saturday. George W. Atberry, a lad of 16 years, while sitting on the porch conversing with some friends, accidentally let fall a shotgun he was holding, and the hammer striking the floor caused the gun to be discharged, the contents entering his side. After lingering for about ten hours he quietly breathed his last.

Railway Train Wreck.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Dec. 10.—The wreck on the A. & P. R. R. Saturday was in Johnson Canyon. The engine jumped the track when near the head of the canyon, approaching the tunnel, and the engine, tender, mail, baggage, express and one emigrant car rolled down the steep and rocky side of the mountain a distance of 150 feet, and was piled up in a mass at the bottom. No one was killed.
