OCCIDENTAL JOTTINGS.

News And Notes of a General Interest to the Westerner.

The "Mediterranean of America" is what the Tacoma News calls Puget Sound. Polygamy is said to be practiced in a number of households on Lees creek, British Columbia.

Col. James Waters, a survivor of the war of 1812, lives at Roseburg, Or., and Representative Hermann, has introduced a bill to increase his pension.

The Roseburg smallpox scare still rages, though there are no new cases to report. James Duncan, living a mile northwest of the city, is slowly improving.

A manilla hawser six hundred feet long, being over twelve times the length of a baggage car, and eighteen inches in circumference, was shipped to Yaquina Bay.

Forest Grove has a new paper, which will be a good thing for Washington county. The Hillsboro paper will keenly feel the opposition. This is the second paper for that county.

The bottom has dropped out of the California potato market and they are selling in Portland, for from 40 to 45 cents per sack; choice ones at 80 cents. Portland uses 3,000 sacks per day.

East Portland Star wonders why the Portland daily papers should have refused to publish the fact that Mrs. Wesley Sexton was sick with the smallpox. She took the disease and died on Thursday.

At Drain, Mrs. Burt, the smallpox patient, is getting along nicely, and the indications are that she will soon be convalescent. There has been no smallpox there since the first of December. No new cases developing.

A singular suicide was committed on the railroad between Blackfoot and Butte. A man was sitting near the track smoking a pipe and as the down passenger train approached he put his head across a rail; it was taken entirely off. He was not identified, but from his dress is supposed to have been a prospector.

There is freight ahead enough for five months work with the present facilities of the Oregon Pacific, a fact which makes the present disaster so much the more serious. The "Willamette Valley," which is always piloted into the bay by its own pilot, never has had a bobble, and people generally do not believe there was any excuse for the present accident to the "Yaquina Bay."—Democrat.

Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.

An Anarchist Kills Himself.

PTTSMURGO, Dec. 14.—Henry Landsidel, steel-worker of Alleghany City, committed suicide this morning, after a futile attempt to kill his wife. Landsidel was prominently identified with the anarchists. He had been married seven times, and all his wives are still alive. The present Mrs. Landsidel is a niece of the late Archibald Wilmir of St. Vincent's abbey. The woman's story is rather inconsistent, as there is no hole in her dress near the abrasion on her side, which she says was caused by a bullet fired by her husband.

The Sabbath is Saturday.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—The committee appointed by the Sabbath Observance Union appeared before the senate committee on education and labor to-day to urge the passage of the Blair "Sunday rest" bill, with amendments recommended by the convention. Rev. Dr. Loomis, representing the Seventh-Day Baptists, afterwards came before the committee and opposed the bill. He desired to have the Seventh-Day Baptists, Seventh-Day Adventists and Jews exempted from its operation.

Stanley Heard From.

CAIRO, Dec. 14.—A letter received at Suakin from Osman Digma is supposed to have contained the announcement that Emin Pasha and "White Traveler," presumably Stanley, had fallen into the hands of the Mahems. There were enclosed copies of dispatches from Darvish, leader at Lado, to Khaleff Pasha, giving the date of Emin Pasha's surrender at October 10, and a letter to Emin Pasha from the Khedive, which the latter handed to Henry M. Stanley, when at Cairo.

More Talk of Blaine.

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—The Press and Star both assert this evening that they have positive and authentic information that General Harrison has invited Mr. Blaine to the chief place in his cabinet. Both papers also announce Blaine's acceptance, and state the correspondence between President-elect Harrison and Mr. Blaine will shortly be made public.

A Heavy Immigration.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 14.—J. B. Garland, an old-time Atlantic & Pacific railroad agent, says the Northern Pacific is bringing hosts of passengers. Most of them are from the east, and come under the head of tourists and immigrants. From ten to twelve passenger coaches full of people arrive in Portland from the east on each train.

The Panama Canal.

PARIS, Dec. 14.—An official notice was posted on the course this morning that the government will introduce a bill providing for the postponement for three months of the payment of the Panama canal company's liabilities, including the interest and redemption of bonds.

No More Chinese.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 14.—The steamer City of New York, which arrived from Hong Kong and Yokohama to-day, was the first steamer which has arrived from the Orient for a number of years without a single Chinaman aboard bound for this port.

The Holiday Recess.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—Hector, of Missouri, introduced a concurrent resolution in the house providing for a holiday recess from Friday, December 21st until Monday, January 7th, which was referred to the committee on ways and means.
