CLYMER ITEMS. Miss Mary Van Wagner has lately finished a very successful term of school at this place.

Mr. McCrow has engaged Henry Holcomb to teach a six-month term of school at his place for the special benefit of his younger children, the distance from the school house being too great for them to attend school during the winter.

The young people have organized a literary and debating society to meet at the school house each Thursday evening to freely discuss and satisfactorily settle the leading issues of the day, and if a fair judges decides in favor of a handsome gentleman leader instead of the argument produced, no one complains.

A petition is being circulated and signed for the presentation to the

Second Assistant Postmaster general asking the government to establish a new mail route from Salem to Silver Falls City. The proposed new route is to be located four miles north of the present route from Salem to Knight, with postoffices to be established at or near Kavanaugh's in the Howell Prairie and R. C. Geer's in the Waldo Hills. This route if established will be a great convenience to a large number of citizens who now live from five to ten miles from their postoffices.

J. D. Darby will present a petition to the school superintendent asking that a new school district be created from a portion of the Clymer, Union Hill, Wolford and Center View districts, the school house to be built on or near the Dr. Savage farm. Families living in the proposed new district are too far from their present school houses for their children to derive any benefit from the public schools. A similar petition was once before presented to the school superintendent but through the double dealing of some person who signed the petition and afterward wrote a letter of remonstrance, the petition was not granted, and it is earnestly hoped nothing of the kind will again occur to defeat this meritorious measure.

TELEGRAPHIC TIDINGS. Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.

A Burning City. MARBLEHEAD, Mass., Dec. 26.—Marblehead is in ruins, and a dozen firms are burned out. Also the Boston & Maine depot and several other buildings. It is the largest fire ever visited this city, and the people are panic-stricken. The telegraph office has been destroyed. This dispatch is sent with great difficulty, over a hasty improvised wire and communication is liable to be interrupted at any moment.

A Steamer Burned. MEMPHIS, Dec. 24.—The steamer Kate Adams burned this morning near Commerce, Miss., forty miles from this city. She was en route to Memphis and had about 200 people aboard. The fire, which caught in some cotton near the forward end of the boilers, was discovered about 8 o'clock.

A fearful panic seized the crew and lower deck passengers and many lost their lives by drowning.

Burned to the Water's Edge. SEATTLE, Dec. 24.—The steamer Leiferickson, plying between Seattle and Port Blakely, was burned off Alki Point, opposite this city, between 5 and 6 o'clock this evening. No particulars can be learned, but it is thought four persons were burned and six were drowned. Other steamers went to the rescue, but were unable to catch the ill-fated steamer.

New Panama Canal Company. LONDON, Dec. 25.—Stevin, of San Francisco, the inventor of the dredge used in excavation the bed of the Panama canal, is expected to arrive in Paris in a few days. It is asserted that the purpose of his visit is the formation of a new Franco-American company to complete the canal. The capital of the company will be 500,000,000 francs, more than half of which sum is already pledged.

The Anarchists Meet at Chicago. CHICAGO, Dec. 25, 1888.—Last evening it was learned that the members of the Arbeiter bund outwitted the police after all. When they left the vicinity of the plasterers' hall, in accordance with a pre-arranged plan they went to a quiet saloon on the west side of Randolph street and held a meeting, perfecting organization.

Jack the Ripper. BERLIN, Dec. 25.—A man signing himself "Jack the Ripper," has written a letter to the police stating his intention to slaughter fifteen British women in the same manner as at Whitechapel, and put to test the boasted ingenuity of the German detectives.
