**TELEGRAPHIC TIDINGS.**

**Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.**

**Methodists Denour.**

**INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 29.**—The Methodist preachers here are working up a sentiment against the inaugural ball, and have called a meeting for tomorrow, at which condemnatory resolutions will be adopted.

**A Partoned Wrecker.**

**WASHINGTON, Dec. 30.**—The President yesterday signed a warrant pardoning Benjamin Hopkins, who wrecked the Fidelity Bank, of Cincinnati by wheat speculations. It is feared he will die before his pardon arrives.

**Race War**

**ATLANTA, Dec. 30.**—A small race war occurred in Priors, Ga., to-day. Some drunken negro miners fought the officers who attempted to arrest them. Other negroes came to their assistance, and there was a clash between the whites and blacks. Two negroes were wounded.

**Bald Knobbers Escaped.**

**OSARK, Mo., Dec. 30.**—John and Wiley Matthews, two of the four condemned Bald Knobbers, escaped from jail here last night by the assistance of friends on the outside. Dave Walker, leader of the Bald Knobbers, and his son William, also under sentence to hang, refused to leave, and were found in their cells when the discovery was made.

**The Burlington Strike.**

**CHICAGO, Dec. 29.**—The representatives of the various divisions of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers continued their session to-day. It is generally believed here that there is strong and growing dissatisfaction among Brotherhood engineers on the Western roads where a classification system is in vogue, and that unless a change is soon made to the mileage system a big strike will be inaugurated. The classification system was the cause of the trouble on the Burlington road. One of the delegates to the present meeting said to a reporter to-day that the statement to the effect that the Brotherhood would cease giving the Burlington strikers financial assistance after January 1st is absolutely false.

**The Striking Miners.**

**ELLENSBURG, Dec. 29.**—This afternoon A. S. Williamson, assistant superintendent of the coal mines at Roslyn, brought in 10 new mule-drivers to take the place of strikers. This seemed to excite the strikers, who got hold of the superintendent and drove him out of town, bruising him up considerably with rocks. They then turned their attention to Williamson and made a rush at him, when he drew a gun, but it did no good, as they knocked him down and cut him about the head badly, finally running him out of town.

They also ran the new men out. Williamson is said to have been drunk all day, he bringing all the trouble on himself. Everything is quiet to-night. Parties in the C Elum have ordered a large amount of ammunition from here, and there may be more trouble.

**A New "Jack The Ripper."**

**LONDON, Dec. 29.**—The mutilated body of a boy was found in an out-house at Bradford this morning and recognized as that of John Gill, 8 years of age, who, when last seen alive was sliding on the ice with a companion. The boy had been brutally murdered, his legs and arms chopped off in a rough manner and tied to his body, and his ears cut off. There were two stab wounds in the chest and heart, and the entrails were torn out. The remains were wrapped in a rough covering.

**The Men of Ohio.**

**CINCINNATI, Dec. 29.**—A special from Sabina, Ohio, says: A fox drive took place near here to-day, in which nearly 4000 persons, men and boys, participated. Only two foxes were scared up, and both escaped!

**Report Fully Confirmed.**

**OTTAWA, Dec. 30.**—A dispatch from London fully confirms the report that Joseph Chamberlin is likely to be appointed by Lord Salisbury to fill the vacancy in the British Legation at Washington.

**Oklahoma Filling Up.**

**GAINESVILLE, Tex., Dec. 30.**—One hundred families, with teams, crossed the South Canadian river at Purcell, Indian Territory, yesterday, entering the Oklahoma country to settle on claims near Purcell.

**On the Oregon Pacific.**

Without cessation the work of railroad building continues on the Oregon Pacific. Trains are now running to Rock Creek which is about fifty-one miles from Albany. Track is laid some distance farther and is delayed on account of bridges. The headquarters of Searle & Dean are nine miles from Rock Creek and these gentlemen will complete their contract of fifteen miles by the middle of January. The winter has been remarkably fine and but little delay has been occasioned on account of rain.

A correspondent of the Yaquina Republican relates the following remarkable occurrence:

"Friday a man running from a ghost, took refuge behind the very stump that was being blasted out and under which there were two boxes of Judson powder. You may judge of his astonishment when the blast went off, tore his hat into fragments and knocked him stupid, but did not injure him as he was at work again in the afternoon." He says they receive their supplies by pack trains over a horrible trail "and as I write about ninety mules are filing past, weary looking and sore with their heavy burdens. Our camp is in a canyon into which the sunlight never enters, in fact this railroad runs through a canyon from Rock Creek to the Cascades. The scenery is grand for those who have time to enjoy it. The mountains around us are fifteen hundred feet high, heavily timbered with good timber to their tops. This will be a great lumber country as soon as it is opened up. There is an abundance of excellent farming land farther up on the road to the summit and plenty of timber; it is not surveyed but squatters can hold land. We struck a galena mine on the grade the other day that looks well, and there is undoubtedly plenty of mineral all over this country."
