PUBLIC LANDS,

Congressman Hermann recently introduced in the House a petition of the Wasco county Business Couneil, Patrons of Husbandry, for the forfeiture of the land grant to the Dallas Military Wagon-Road company of Oregon-to the committee on the public lands, which was followed by the following resolution :

Be it resolved That the secretary of the interior be requested to inform the house what action, if any has been taken by him in the matter of the cancellation or annulment of patents and lists of selections of lands heretofore granted by congress and now claimed by the Dallas Military Wagon-Road company in the State of Oregon, or whether any portion of said lands have been restored to the public domain for settlement.

The memorial and resolution were referred to the committee on public lands.

POSTOFFICE BUILDINGS,

The following resolution was introduced in the House last week which says: That January 15, 17 3. immediately after the reading of the Journal, be set apart for the consideration of H. B. 3319, entitled "A bill to provide for postoffice buildings,"


