## TELEGRAPHIC TIDINGS.

Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.

Astoria, Salem & South Coast R. R.

ASTORIA, Jan. 8.—The general feeling and desire of the people of Astoria and Clatsop county is for railroad connection with the Willamette valley and the ultimate object and intent of the Astoria & South Coast Railway Co. is to build on to reach such a connection. While not authorized to speak for the company, it is certain that the company is favorably disposed to such railroad co-operation. A communication from your Albany company to the board of directors of the Astoria company would doubtless receive prompt and favorable consideration. The company advertises this morning for bids for grading ten miles of track south of Skipanon, heading toward Tillamook.

[This telegram is from the editor of the Astorian to the Albany Herald, in reply to an inquiry regarding Salem's new railway. From it we learn that the Astoria Company are ready to co-operate with the valley and now is the time for our people to act.—Ed.]

Connection With the North.

TACOMA (W. T.), Jan. 10.—Thomas F. Oakes, president of the Northern Pacific Railroad Company, is expected to arrive in Tacoma to-day to meet David Glass of Winnipeg, one of the solicitors of the Canadian Pacific Railroad Company, for the purpose of proceeding to Bellingham bay to arrange for bridging the Bellingham bay and Westminster road to Tacoma to connect with the Northern Pacific. When this important work is completed the entire North American continent will be girdled with an iron band from Vancouver to San Francisco, thence to New Orleans, thence to New York and Toronto and across the continent to Tacoma and Vancouver by way of the Canadian Pacific and Northern Pacific railroad.

Utah's Admission Opposed.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—C. C. West, who was appointed governor of Utah by President Cleveland, arrived in Washington Sunday night. He intended to appear before the house committee on territories to-day to oppose the admission of Utah as a state. This sentiment, he says, is shared by nearly every Gentile in the territory. West places his objections on the broad ground that Mormons are unfitted to exercise the rights of citizenship.

Storms of Wind and Rain.

PITTSBURG, Jan. 9.—A terrible wind and rain storm passed over the city this afternoon, during which a large building in course of erection collapsed, carrying twenty workmen to the ground and burying at least twenty more in the ruins. Twelve are known to have been killed, six are fatally and about thirty seriously injured.

The Storm in Canada.

MONTREAL, Jan. 9.—The damage by the sleet storm between here and Toronto will not be much less than a million dollars. The wires are down and forest trees are uprooted through the whole region.

Hunting Hidden Treasure.

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—Another expedition is fitting out to go to Belize, Central America, to recover \$1,500,000 in gold, alleged to have been buried by pirates over fifty years ago.

Don't Want Much.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Jan. 9.—F. E. Patterson of Portland, Oregon, is here making a claim to all the land on which the town of Stratford stands.

A Man of Family.

OGDEN, Utah, Jan. 9.—Abraham Hunsaker, a prominent Mormon, is dead; aged 78. He leaves forty children and 130 grandchildren.
