TELEGRAPHIC TIDINGS.

Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.

The Terrible Cyclone.

READING, Pa., Jan. 11.—The cyclone that swept over the northern portion of the city Wednesday afternoon, laid waste everything within its reach, and with terrible loss of life. At five o'clock in the evening the storm was seen approaching, with a thundering noise. The swath it cut was narrow, but its effect was terrible. Persons residing along the track of the storm say they saw the first signs of danger in a funnel-shaped maelstrom of wind and debris, which seemed to gather up everything within its reach and cast it right and left. The track of this destructive element was not more than 200 feet wide, and it is lucky that it only touched the suburbs of the city. It came from the west, but passed along the northern border of Reading.

A Draw After Eighty-Seven Rounds.

SAN FRANCISCO, JAN. 10.—The fight which occurred last night between light-weights Billie Mahan, of California, and George Mulholland of Australia, was the longest ever seen on this coast. The battle commenced at 9:40 o'clock and continued until 3:25 this morning, when it was declared a draw, at the close of the eighty-seventh round.

A Hunting Horror

JACKSONVILLE, Jan. 10.—Geo. Brown, 16 years of age, while hunting yesterday dragged his gun on the ground. The trigger caught on an obstacle and the gun was discharged. The contents passed through his powder flask, which he had over his shoulder, causing it to explode, tearing his side away. Young Brown bled to death.

The Mine Troubles

VICTORIA, B. C. Jan. 10.—The Wellington strike assumed a more serious phase yesterday. The committee of miners, who returned to Wellington, reported to a general meeting the result of the interview with Dunsenair in Victoria.

Death of a Pioneer.

ALBANY, Or., Jan. 11.—Isaac Hayes, who has served this city as marshal during the past year, died at his home yesterday, aged 62. He came to Albany early in the sixties and was well known. He leaves six sons and one daughter.

Cable Scheme Falls Through

OTTAWA, OHL, Jan. 10.—It is understood that the scheme for a cable from Canada to Australia has failed. The reason is that the subsidies demanded amounted to \$375,000 a year for a term of twenty-five years.

Not Aspirants For Office.

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 10.—General Lew Wallace to-day said he was not an aspirant for any office. Ex-Governor Porter has made a similar statement.

His Reward.

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 10.—The Governor to-day appointed M. H. DeYoung, of San Francisco, Commissioner to Paris Exposition of 1889.

Mathematics and Arithmetic.

Like most ordinary mortals, mathematicians are inclined to shirk dealings with figures. Even Newton, the greatest master of the most abstruse calculations, could not, we are told, cast up a sum in addition; and the works of M. Stas, said to have never had an equal in exactitude are found to contain an astonishing number of arithmetical slips. Prof. Hurley has given the weight of air on a square mile as about 590,129,971,290 lbs., containing not less than 3,081,870,167 lbs. of carbonic acid, in which is 371,475 tons of carbon. The real quantities, as figured by Mr. Sydney Lampton, are 59, 133 & 31 508 lbs. of air, 31,464,899 lbs. of carbonic acid, and 375,327 tons of carbon. Another writer has proven the water under a westerly equatorial current to be twelve per cent lighter than an eastern equatorial current, this false result being based on an arithmetical error.
