The California legislature convened Monday last at Sacramento. Both branches are controlled by the democrats.

An attempt is likely to be made to have the Eugene City charter so amended by the legislature as to authorize a higher rate of taxation and a bonded debt.

TELEGRAPHIC TIDINGS.

Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.

A Sharp Criticism.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—Mr. Sewel, United States consul to Samoa, testified before the sub-committee of the senate on foreign relations, concerning the conduct of the office's on the islands. He criticized the policy of Secretary Bayard very sharply and in sensational terms on the failure of the administration to protect American interests in Samoa. The Germans, he said, rode over both British and American residents of the islands. The British government, in pursuance of an understanding with Germany, had refused to interfere.

The Sea Serpent Caught.

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—Captain Paul Eoyton claims to have captured the genuine sea serpent. It is now in a museum, and is 63 feet long. In outward appearance it is something like the bark of a tree. Its head and neck are reared up on high, with a pair of propelling fins, the same as those commonly ascribed to the sea serpent of fancy. A wooden railing protects the serpent from the touch of too courageous visitors, and on the wall above and below are posted the words, "Canes Off."

A Son of John Brown.

PASADENA, Cal., Jan. 11.—The funeral of Owen Brown, a son of John Brown, of Ossawatimie, the sole survivor of Harper's Ferry, took place yesterday. Deceased was 72 years of age.

Brown had for some years passed the life of a hermit on a remote summit of the Sierra Madre mountains called "Brown's Peak." He was very eccentric and kind hearted. During the anarchists' trial in Chicago he sent fruits and sympathy.

The Panama Canal.

PARIS, Jan. 11.—A deputation of Panama canal bondholders headed by Count Dillon to-day called upon Goblet, minister of foreign affairs, and pointed out the urgency of the passage by the senate before the meeting of the canal company on Jan. 20th of the bill reforming the bankruptcy law. Goblet expressed sympathy with the bondholders, but said the government was compelled to act with the greatest reserve.

Selling Their Differences.

VICTORIA, B. C., Jan. 10.—A committee of Wellington miners waited upon Mr. Dunsmuir at his office in this city this afternoon and held a long conference. Their grievances were submitted. The chief point seemed to be whether all the miners would be taken back. Mr. Dunsmuir stated that all could go to work except the ringleaders. The committee and Manager Bryden returned to Wellington and will submit the terms to a meeting of the miners.

The Cabinet Puzzle.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—A prominent member of the House solves the Cabinet problem as follows: Eliaze will be offered the State portfolio, Allison will be urgently asked by General Harrison to take the Treasury and Wannamaker will go into the Cabinet. The Pacific coast may be given the interior department, and the man will probably be John F. Swift.

Bounty for Sugar.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 11.—A dispatch received here by C. A. Grow, from Senator Stanford at Washington, states that the senate will probably make up for the reduction of duty on sugar by a bounty.

All For Prohibition.

CONCORD, N. H., Jan. 11.—The constitutional convention yesterday adopted an amendment to the Constitution, prohibiting the manufacture and sale of all intoxicating liquors, "except cider."

A Deserved Compliment.
