Multnomah and Wasco Capture the
Speakership.

PROCEEDINGS UP TO PRESS TIME.

Prospects of a Lively Forty Days—Many
Bills Proposed—The Officers.

SENATE.

MONDAY AFTERNOON SESSION.

Senate called to order at 2:15.
The report of the committee on
credentials was received and
adopted.

Secretary of State G. W. McBride
was invited within the bar to ad-
minister the oath of office to newly
elected members. They were duly
sworn in.

Hon. J. W. Watt offered a reso-
lution for the election of permanent
officers, which was adopted.

Temporary Speaker Barin nomi-
nated Hon. Jos. Simon of Multnomah;
and Hamilton of Grant nominated
Hon. Geo. Cauthorn of Benton.
The vote stood—Simon 20, Cauthorn
9, Dimmick voting for Hon. M. L.
Chamberlain.

Hilton and Cogswell were ap-
pointed to escort the president elect
to the chair.

Mr. Simon made a very appro-
priate speech and was sworn in by
the secretary of state.

J. H. Shupe of Douglas, and J. A.
Douthit of Crook, were the candi-
dates for chief clerk.

The vote stood, Shupe 21, and
Douthit 9. Shupe declared elected.

E. G. Hurst of Baker, and A. M.
Elam of Umatilla, were nominated
for assistant clerk. The result stood,
Hurst 21, and Elam 9. Hurst
elected.

C. Watts of Linn, was the only
name mentioned for second assis-
tant. He received 24 votes and was
declared elected.

J. B. Eddy of Umatilla, and M.
Martin of Lane, were named for
reading clerk. Eddy 21, Martin 9.
Eddy elected.

M. Pomeroy of Clatsop, and C. A.
Logan of Jackson, were nominated
for sergeant-at-arms. Vote stood,
Pomeroy 21, Logan 9. Pomeroy
elected.

Abe McCully and H. Downing of
Marion were the contestants for
door keeper. Vote stood, McCully
21, Downing 9. McCully elected.

Secretary of State McBride ad-
ministered the oath of office to new-
ly elected officers.

The following resolutions were
proposed and passed:

By Watts: That the rules of last
session be the rules of the present
session.

Cauthorn: That the house be in-
formed that the senate was ready
for business.

Chandler: That each member be
supplied with \$5 worth of stamps
and \$1 worth of paper wrappers.

Dawson: That newspaper report-
ers be given a space within the bar
and supplied with stationery.

Cauthorn: That the clergy of the
state be invited to open the morning
sessions with prayer.

Chamberlain: That each mem-
ber be supplied with four papers.
Adjourned till 10 a. m. Tuesday.

TUESDAY FORENOON SESSION.

Senate called promptly at 10
o'clock. Minutes of yesterday read
and approved.

Barin moved that the president
appoint a person of mature years as
milling page. Carried.

The president appointed Jas.
Clark, Charles Henderson, W. H.
Matson as pages.

Message from the house notified
the Senate that the House was or-
ganized and ready for business.

The president announced the fol-

Cogswell introduced joint mem-
orial No. 1, asking for Congress to
enforce the Chinese exclusion act.
Carried.

Hon. Rob. Clough of Polk coun-
ty was invited to a seat within the
bar.

Senator Cogswell was excused for
to-day.

Hon. S. W. Clavig of Douglas was
invited to a seat within the bar.

Senator Bailey of Umatilla offered
a petition from citizens of Eastern
Oregon for one term of supreme
court to be held in Eastern Oregon.
Referred to judiciary committee.

Watt of Yamhill introduced reso-
lution No. 6, that the officers of the
Senate be furnished with four news-
papers each. Carried.

Veatch of Lane offered joint reso-
lution No. 2, in appointing a joint
committee to investigate and report
on the workings and government of
the agricultural college.

Irvine of Linn offered Senate
resolution No. 7, limiting the employ-
ment of clerks by various commit-
tees. Laid on the table.

Message from the House announced
the passage of a joint resolution of
a joint committee to examine the
books and accounts of the state
treasury. Resolution concurred in.

The following bills were introduced
and passed to the second reading
without question:

Looney S. B. No. 1. For repeal
of vagrant act.

S. B. No. 2, to provide for holding
terms of supreme court at Jackson-
ville, Pendleton and Salem.

St. Clair S. B. No. 3, for drainage
for agricultural and sanitary pur-
poses.

Hatch S. B. No. 4, to prevent bet-
ting on elections.

Irwin S. B. No. 5, to amend the
charter of Albany.

Watts—S. B. No. 6, for the relief of
Jos. Embree.

Irwin—S. B. No. 7, for relief of
firemen.

S. B. No. 8, to cure defects in land
titles.

Eakin—S. B. No. 9, to amend Ar-
ticle No. 2333, Gen. Laws of Oregon.

Raley—S. B. No. 10, to regulate
mortgage and foreclosures.

Wager—No. 11, relating to trust
companies.

Dawson—S. B. No. 12, to amend
Sec. 3042 Gen. Laws of Oregon.

Irwin—S. B. No. 13, to amend Sec.
931 Gen. Laws of Oregon.

Raley—S. B. No. 14, to perfect title
to lands in Pendleton.

Eakin—S. B. No. 15, to improve
certain streams in Lane county.

Chandler—S. B. No. 16, a bill for
the relief of Baker county.
Adjourned until 2 p. m.

HOUSE.

MONDAY AFTERNOON SESSION.

Committee on credentials' report
was read and adopted.

Hon. G. W. McBride, secretary
of state was invited within the bar
and administered the oath of office
to the members.

A resolution was offered and
adopted to elect permanent officers,
which was done as follows, beginning
with Speaker:

Thompson of Multnomah placed
in nomination Hon. E. L. Smith of
Wasco; Miller of Jackson nominated
Hon. J. T. Bowditch of Jackson.
The vote resulted, Smith 5, Bow-
ditch 9. Smith declared elected.

Apperson, Thompson, and Pac-
quet appointed to escort speaker to
the chair.

Mr. Smith made a short speech,
thanking the members for the great
honor conferred upon him.

The secretary of state next admin-
istered the oath of office.

J. T. Gregg of Marion and O. H.
Humphry of Linn nominated for
chief clerk; Gregg 51, Humphry 9.

Assistant clerk O. B. Miller of
Clackamas and O. P. Cashow of
Linn; Miller 51, Cashow 9.

Sergeant-at-arms, S. J. Finch of
Baker, and Thomas Jones of Mal-
heur; Baker 51, Jones 9.

Doorkeeper, C. O. Boynton of
Clackamas, and C. A. Moore of
Lake; Boynton 51, Moore 9.

The secretary of state adminis-
tered the oath of office to the newly
elected officers.

The following resolutions were
offered:

By Armstrong:—Inviting the
ministry of Salem to open the daily
session with prayer.

Roberts:—Inviting reporters of

newspapers within the bar.

It was voted that the house notify
the senate that it was ready for
business.

Each member was voted \$4 worth
of stamps and \$1 newspaper wrap-
pers.

Rules of the last house were adopt-
ed as rules of the present.

A motion carried that the speaker
appoint a reading clerk.

Pages were elected as follows;
Nicholas J. Haas, Carl Gray and
Mac Smith.

Miller of Jackson moved that each
member be furnished five newspa-
pers; carried.

MONDAY FORENOON SESSION.

The house was called to order at
10 a. m. by Speaker E. L. Smith.
As no minister was present the
morning session was not opened by
prayer.

The roll was called to which all
of the members responded.

The journal of yesterday's proceed-
ings was then read and approved.

Bills were then presented by mem-
bers of the House.

The following resolution was read
by the clerk: Resolved by the house
the senate concurring that both
are now organized and ready for all
business.

Resolved that a committee of
three from the house and two from
the senate be instructed to examine
into the state of affairs at the Oregon
State Insane Asylum. Adopted.

The Clerk read House Bill No. 1.
In regard to the taking up of land
and homestead laws.

House Bill No. 2. An act to cre-
ate the office of Attorney General.
A message from the senate was
next read:

Resolved that congress be petition-
ed to make an appropriation of mon-
ey in order that the law relating to
the exclusion of the Chinese from
Oregon may be strictly enforced.
Carried 59 to 1.

House Bill No. 3. A bill to pro-
vide for the punishment of crimes
committed upon the Columbia and
Snake rivers.

House Bill No. 4. In relation to
mortgages.

House Bill No. 5. An act to incor-
porate the town of Medford. Carried
unanimously.

House Bill No. 6 an act in relation
to the regulating by law the tolls
of mills establishing a uniform rate
of toll and when such toll is exceed-
ed by any person it shall be a mis-
demeanor and upon conviction there-
of said miller shall be fined not to
exceed \$50.

House Bill No. 7. In regard to the
duties and compensation of circuit
court officers.

Message read from senate. Senate
concurs with House bill No. 2 and
appoints two members of senate on
committee.

House bill No. 8. In regard to
amendment to laws of Oregon.

House bill No. 9. In relation to
trusts corporations and loan Co's.
An act to locate and regulate a
State Normal School.

A bill to change the name of the
town of Abram in Coos Co. to Ban-
don.

At 11:50 the house adjourned to
meet again at two p. m.

The message of Gov. Penneyer
has been concluded, and will be de-
livered at eleven a. m. to-morrow.
The committee of the senate and
house have waited upon the gover-
nor, and this hour was agreed upon.

Articles of Incorporation.

Articles incorporating the Lane
Co. Land & Loan Co. have been
filed with the secretary of state. A.
P. Churchill, E. J. Frasier and J.
E. Featon are the incorporators,
with a capital stock of \$30,000 and
principal office in Eugene. Also the
McMinnville Creamery, Cold Stor-
age & Cheese Manufacturing. O. O.
Hodson, J. E. Magers, J. S. Hibbs
John Booth and Jas. Agee are the
incorporators, with a capital stock
of \$8000.

A Mass Road Convention.

A convention of Marion and Polk
county citizens is to be held in this
city on Friday of the present week
for the purpose of uniting upon some
plan for amending the road laws of
Oregon to make them more effective
toward good highways, and asking
the legislature to act thereon.
