The First Parliamentary Wrangle in the House.

HARRINGTON'S WARNING HAND.

It Waves Threateningly at Those Who Dare to Vote Against Him.

SENATE.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

Communication read from the Oregon Pioneer Association, presenting the portrait of Dr. McLaughlin to the legislature. Chamberlin of Marion appointed committee on presentation.

SECOND READING OF BILLS.

Dawson—To prevent the sale of tobacco or cigarettes to minors; referred to committee on education.

Wager—Amend general laws in relation to road; highway committee.

Chandler—Clerks' and sheriffs' fees for Baker county; ordered engrossed and to third reading.

Cogswell—Amending election laws, committee on election.

Wager—To exempt homesteads from attachments and executions; judiciary committee.

Looney—Repealing free scholarships in the state university; committee on education.

Watkins—Challenging jurors for implied bias; committee on judiciary.

Chamberlin—Creating the county of Morton; committee on counties.

Dawson—To regulate foreign corporations doing business in this state; committee on corporations.

Moore—Incorporating the city of St. Helens; committee on corporations.

Steel—Surveys in the state; committee on judiciary.

Chandler—To appoint a state inspector of stock; committee on agriculture.

Dimick—To defray the funeral expenses of soldiers of the Indian war; committee on military affairs.

Wager—To amend the charter of Weston; committee on judiciary.

Fullerton—Holding circuit court in second judicial district; senators from that district.

Wager—Introduced joint memorial to congress asking that a strip of land in Washington territory be condemned for the purpose of building a portage railroad from above Celio to below the Dalles and aid in the construction of the same; ordered printed.

Hamilton—Joint memorial asking congress for a reclassification of the public lands; ordered printed.

Gray—Joint resolution asking that our senators and representatives in congress work for a survey of the public land; ordered printed.

Gray—Joint resolution asking congress to reimburse settlers along the line of Oregon Central railroad for the enhanced price of land caused by the survey and location of the line, but which has failed to benefit the settlers through the failure of the road to be built; ordered printed.

WEDNESDAY FORENOON'S SESSION.

Senate met at 10 a. m., pursuant to adjournment; prayer by Rev. Brown.

Senate Resolution No. 20, by Wager, to appoint G. M. Smith of Umatilla county, assistant door keeper, as he was a crippled ex-union soldier; referred.

Powell—To amend Independence charter.

Fisher of Polk—To regulate practice of medicine.

Geer—Amending marriage law.

Price—To incorporate Central Point, Jackson county.

Roe—For relief of Union county.

Harrington—Amending laws in regard to appeals.

Thompson—For state inspector of engines.

Condon—To improve Fall Creek and Little Fall Creek, Lane county.

Gilbert—Amending road law, also making state librarian's salary \$1000.

Hume—Amending law in regard to taking of bail.

Crowno—Providing for health officers at Yaquina bay, Rogue and Umpqua rivers with \$400 salaries.

Short—Punishing persons for drunkenness.

Geer—For election of railroad commissioners by the legislature. Also amending school law.

Condon—To regulate civil practice in justices' courts.

WEDNESDAY FORENOON SESSION.

Hon. T. T. Geer was called on to take the chair on account of the hoarseness of Speaker Smith.

SECOND READING OF BILLS.

Hunter—To appropriate \$8,000 for

the construction of wagon roads in Union Co. Same was referred to committee on Commerce.

Motion made to return to first reading of bills. Motion lost, yeas 28; nays 32.

Earhart—Concerning Portland and the issuing of bonds to the amount of \$1,500,000 for water works and to exempt bonds from taxation.

A motion was made to refer same to the delegation of Multnomah county but was lost. Here the parliamentary trouble arose and for fully one hour and a half the house stood at a stand still and numerous representatives occupied the floor, and spoke in behalf of the motion just lost.

Some in behalf of a motion to amend different articles of the bill and not a few thought the bill should be committed to the committee on assessment and taxation. During the wrangle, Representative Apperson gained the floor and proved himself to be somewhat of an orator.

Representative Bowditch wanted to refer the bill with all its amendments to some other standing committee besides the Multnomah delegation. At this crisis Representative Harrington of Multnomah gained the floor and spoke in a vigorous manner against the members who had opposed the bill from going into the hands of the Multnomah delegation.

He "warned" them to be careful as to how they voted against the same. Mr. Thompson explained that he thought that Harrington spoke hurriedly and when the member looked into the matter coolly would be reconciled. Hon. Paulsen made a motion to refer the bill to the committee on assessments and taxation; motion lost. Motion by Earhart to refer the bill with all its amendments to the delegation from Multnomah, motion carried.

H. B. 32 by Stowbridge for the protection of vessels in harbor at Portland and Astoria.

H. R. 30 Latham—That the Sec. of State get hemp matting and place in the gallery at once.

H. B. 33 Roe—To amend certain laws of Oregon and incorporate the city of La Grande.

H. B. 34 Pope—To Regulate the practice of medicine and surgery in Oregon. Referred to a special committee of three.

H. B. 35 Roberts—Establishment of office of state stationary and portable engineer examiner.

H. B. 36 Ladd—Provide for a harbor master at Portland and Astoria.

At 11:55 a. m. Senate and House went into a joint session and President Simon of the Senate disclosed that J. N. Dolph was duly elected.

SALEM CITY COUNCIL.

Not Much Business Before That Honorable Body Last Night.

A meeting of the city council was held last night, but the business coming before it was not very voluminous.

A motion was adopted that all bids be read in open council.

Hirsch's amendment to the rules that the council meet twice each month, on the first and third Tuesdays, was adopted.

Farrar moved that the council purchase nine photographed maps of the city; carried.

Hirsch moved that the committee on streets and public property investigate the matter of permanent improvement of streets and report; carried.

The recorder was ordered to have names of standing committees printed to paste in the rules.

John Knight was granted the wooden blacksmith shop in the fire limits.

Ordered that two of the old street lamps be sold.

Ordered that \$10 for cement walk across the State street alley be paid out of the city treasury and collected from T. M. Patton.
