THE CRYING NEED OF THE TIMES.

Many papers are discussing the cause of the comparative decline of wealth among agriculturists since 1860. Prior to that year more than half our people were farmers and they owned more than half the wealth; and when they diminished so as to be half the people they still owned half the wealth.

Let us give an instance or two. It costs to-day more for school books twenty dollars to one. And yet the old cabin school house turned out about as good scholars as do the splendid temples of to-day.

In old times postage cost some twenty five cents per letter and a family would receive not more than half a dozen letters per year. The same kind of family, to-day, will be receiving several hundred letters in the same time.

The enrollment has now reached 163. There are twenty-two students attending from outside districts. It is expected the trustees will make arrangements whereby 200 students can be accommodated next year.

The music teacher, Miss Florence Cornell, has a large class which are making good progress in that branch of study.

The school is being thoroughly graded, and a nine years' course of study is arranged for adoption at the annual meeting of the trustees in March.

The grounds have been improved, and a horizontal bar, jumping rings, and several swings have been put up for the amusement and exercise of the pupils.

The recitation rooms have been thoroughly renovated and re-seated, and rooms have been prepared in the upper part of the building, which are occupied by young men who board themselves.

The school is beginning to attract the attention of young men and young women who are preparing to teach. At present there are three of the former and six of the latter, who will teach a term of school the coming spring.

The young men of the school have organized a military company of about forty members, with O. C. Riches captain, Elmer Barzee first lieutenant, Grant Longworth and Walter Looney first and second sergeants, and Sterl Gola drummer. The company drills daily, on the school grounds.
