THE SENATE ADJOURNS.

The House Hears Many Second Readings.

SENATE.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION.
108, by Barin—To amend law concerning suits in equity.

SECOND READING OF BILLS.

S. B. No. 54, by Watts—To authorize construction of bridge across Willamette river between Marion and Yamhill counties. Read third time and passed.

Settlers occupying it who are made uneasy, and vast portion is kept from settlement. Calling for forfeiture without delay.

Short Sketches of Our Law Makers And Prominent Men.

HON. J. C. MOORE.

Mr. Moore is one of the republicans from the "Sunny South" and is representing the people of Washington county. Mr. Moore was born in Fayetteville, Washington county, Arkansas in the year 1833 and came to Oregon in '52 driving an "ox team," the entire distance, as the railroads were not so complete as now. Mr. Moore has been somewhat of a public man during his life, having held numerous offices of trust. He was elected assessor of Washington county several years ago, has had the honor of holding the office of sheriff in same county for three successive terms, and has held numerous other positions. He was nominated and elected "without wish or consent," for Representative, and we are pleased to note he is working with a good grace for the people. Mr. Moore has reached three score years of age, yet he is strong and hale. His present occupation is that of a dealer in general merchandise but in former years he was a farmer. Mr. Moore's opponent in the race for Representative was Dr. Ward, a democrat, but Mr. Moore sailed forth with a handsome majority. His postoffice address is Greenville, Oregon.

HON. J. B. MORELOCK.

Mr. Morelock is a native of Tennessee and came to Oregon in '73 and was so well pleased with his change, that he forever bade goodbye to his native home. He was born in Morristown, Tenn., in 1848, and was in that state when the war broke out. In politics Mr. Morelock is a democrat and was elected as a representative from Linn county by his democratic friends. He is now located at Brownsville, Or., and is engaged in the milling business. This is his first public office, and he seems to be filling it very successfully.
