ABOLISHED FOR CAUSE.

The legal point made by the governor in his quotation from his classical lore, "Delegatus non potest delegare," shows more knowledge of the merits of old maxims of regal age than of our modern jurisprudence.

The governor, when he penned this, must have felt that he was the president of the United States and was addressing the congress which represents a government of delegated powers, as is expressed in Act 10 of the constitution, which is in these words: "The powers not delegated to the United States by the constitution, nor prohibited by it to the states are reserved to the states respectively or to the people."

When the people of the colonies threw off the yoke of regal power, they repudiated the doctrine of the divine right of kings—that is that all civil power emanates from the kings as sovereign of the realm, and assumed sovereign power in the people and enacted the other maxim—"Vox populi vox dei."

PROTESTANT VERSUS CATHOLIC.

It has been and still is the policy of Protestants in this country to found seminaries and colleges, usually under denominational control, in which religious instruction finds a conspicuous place.

1. The safety of the Republic demands that all its citizens have the requirements of an education, and experience proves that this will not result adequately from private schools but requires the all embracing authority and supervision of the state.

2. Protestants desire so far as themselves are concerned, that the common schools teach religion, but they recognize the fact that compulsory religious instructions are unjust and unwise, and inconsistent with liberty, and do not insist on it in the public schools where objection is raised.

3. They concede that christian parents can supplement the teaching of the common school by religious instruction at home, in the Sunday school and at church.

4. They may even prefer sometimes, or frequently, to send their children to private schools where religious influences prevail, but they do not for this reason; ask state aid for such schools by a division of public school funds, partly because it is utterly unpracticable, and partly because it would tend to undermining the common school, which the safety of the state requires to be maintained.

5. They cheerfully pay their

share of the taxes to maintain the common schools of the state secured by them is a blessing shared by all.

6. Higher education rests upon a different basis. Although highly advantageous to the state, the necessity of providing for it is not so imperative a nature as providing for elementary education, only one in fifteen hundred ever graduates from a college.

7. They hold further that parents cannot supplement adequately the work of higher education with proper religious instruction because, first, children usually attend such schools away from home, and because, secondly, the order of religious instruction needed is beyond the range of most parents, most Sunday schools and even most pulpits, special training in christian evidences being needed for the purpose.

8. Protestants further insist that experience abundantly proves that private enterprise and private benevolence are abundantly equal to the task of supplying all the schools of high grade the country needs, and those of excellent quality. Nineteenth of all the colleges and universities in the land, are independent of the state, to say nothing of the most numberless seminaries that do the work of high schools.

9. Protestantism therefore says to the state: Tax us as much as you need for common schools, but for the rest, let us alone, the country can take care of itself and better than you can do it.

Now the position of Catholics agrees with the above in all that pertains to high schools and colleges. It disagrees only in some points relative to the common schools.

1. Catholics regard common schools as Godless and therefore not only unnecessary, to the state but a damage to it.

2. They therefore ask that as they share in taxation and yet feel conscientiously bound to maintain schools of their own, that there be a pro rata division of the school funds. As seen above, Protestants believe these positions defective.

These observations are made because when Protestants insist that it is unjust then to sustain state colleges and universities because they are sustaining like institutions of their own they are met by the superficial citizen with the remark, "But that is the position of the Catholics." What if it is, is a position invalidated because a Catholic happens to hold it?

Protestants can never join Catholics in their assault on the common schools; but there is no logical difficulty in Catholics and Protestants uniting in efforts to render higher education independent of the state, and in resistance to all taxation for the maintenance of non-religious colleges and universities such as the most intelligent Protestants and Catholics know are not suitable to the needs of Christendom.

If any one choose to inquire "What will those who are neither Protestant nor Catholic do for higher education if the state does not provide it?" Let every such remember that this is a free country and they are at perfect liberty to found a university of their own.
