## CAPITAL CITY NEWS.

Recital of the Daily Doings Compiled From Various Sources.

Happenings Over the City and News From the Country.

### The Gervais Difficulty.

Justice Chase's court in this city has been devoted during the greater part of yesterday and to-day to the hearing of evidence and pleadings in the Purdom-Mitchell difficulty.

Joseph Purdom, the station agent and justice of the peace at Gervais was on trial for knocking down McKinley Mitchell, the Gervais merchant and editor. Their quarrel was over some freight mistakes. Warm words grew warmer until the gentlemen found themselves engaged in a personal encounter.

At eleven o'clock this morning Justice Chase rendered his decision in the case and the accused man, Purdom, was acquitted, the state not having proven that an assault was made. The court was satisfied that something took place in the depot but as none were present save the combatants, the accused was benefited by the doubt. On the other hand Mitchell thinks, from the sensation of having been struck and himself describing a half circle on the floor, that he must have been knocked down. The costs are charged up to the county.

### On the Road to Recovery.

This morning a JOURNAL man met Frank A. Avery, the man who was the target of the maniac's bullet. Avery is on the road to recovery and is able to walk around out of doors. Yesterday he took a stroll over the city and enjoyed it greatly, feeling refreshed by the balmy air. He continues to know as little about the causes that led to the shooting as formerly. Perhaps some day additional facts will develop. For the present the lunatic's story is credited. Within a day or so Avery will be taken to the asylum, there to see the crazy man who claims to have done the shooting. Avery may recognize him, but is hardly probable he will, as he firmly adheres to the belief that there were but two men on the car platform—himself and McKay.

### Result of a Friend's Work.

Yesterday there was brought to the asylum for insane a young girl and mother, Arminta Gardner of Union, Baker county. She is but sixteen years of age, and was born and reared in the county from which she was committed. Her misfortunes are the result of an assault upon her by a brute named Wiggins. He is in the penitentiary serving a ten-year term. The girl has been a cripple since childhood, and Wiggins, her brother-in-law, by force accomplished his hellish purpose again and again. As a result the girl became a mother, and her unfortunate condition has preyed upon her mind so strongly that reason has been dethroned and her confinement in the home for unfortunates is a relief and necessity.

### Street Railway Extension.

The property owners of Center street seem determined to have the Salem Street Railway company extend their line along that thoroughfare. They have succeeded in raising a subsidy of \$2500 and it is probable both the Center and Commercial street lines will be constructed at once. The Commercial street line will extend into North Salem, thereby closely connecting the city and her northern suburb, while the Center street line will place the eastern portion of the city in closer communication.

### To Bridge the Willamette.

Monday a bill will be introduced in the House asking that the permission be granted the Salem, Tillamook & Astoria Railway Co. to build a bridge across the Willamette river at Salem.

One by one the developments arrange themselves, and the survey of the projected line at an early date is assured. The stock is not yet ready for subscription, but soon enough will be taken to accomplish the survey.

### A Dim Rumor.

## THE LEGISLATURE.

The House Keeps Up the Good Old Fashioned Lick.

### THE FIRST BILL IS PASSED.

And Goes to the Governor for His Consideration.

Speaker pro tem Harrington declared the House adjourned until 2 o'clock Monday.

Col. Harrington filled the Chair this morning to the satisfaction of all.

Speaker Smith's hoarseness is improving and by Monday he will be able to fill the Chair.

It is expected that the different committees will form a number of bills ready for final passage on Monday.

The supporters of H B 37 are determined to get the same passed if possible. This morning they had the same reconsidered and referred to the judiciary committee. The objectionable part of the bill seems to be that part which reads "any one stealing a dog or enticing it away from its rightful owner shall be fined accordingly." The gentlemen supporting this bill claim that it is impossible for sheep men to get along without their "herd dogs" and consider them more valuable than a good horse. Some of the number did not want to vote for it in that shape, as a man might have to pay for stealing a "worthless dog." One gentleman claimed that a man should be fined "twice as much for stealing a worthless dog as for stealing a valuable dog."

Paquet—Doing away with separate acknowledgment of married women; judiciary.

Watts' senate bill authorizing Portland and Willamette Valley Railway company to build a bridge at Ray's landing over the Willamette, between Marion and Polk counties, work to begin within a year after the passage of bill; to third reading and sent to the governor.

Roberts—To change name of Averill to Bandon; passed.

Bean—To confirm to Umatilla county title to block 12, Pendleton; passed.

Maxwell—Changing the name of Lincoln to Tillamook; passed.

Hume—Modifying the penalties for stealing stock, giving courts more discretion, and adding dogs to the list; lost.

Earhart—To purchase the fourteenth and fifteenth volumes of supreme court reports and laws of Oregon; passed.

Maxwell—Providing that the regular term of circuit court of Tillamook county be changed from July to the second Monday in September; passed.

#### FRIDAY MORNING SESSION.

House called to order at 10 a. m. Absent 5; prayer by Rev. Post.

Motion that the reading of Journal be suspended; passed.

Col. Harrington called to relieve the Chair.

34 Irvine—To incorporate the city of Halsey; passed.

W. B. Blyeu was invited within the bar.

#### THIRD READING OF BILLS.

60 by Maxwell—To change the time of holding the terms of the county court in Tillamook county; passed.

Report from engrossed committee that bills 74, 52 and 53 had been engrossed are ready for final passage. 52 by Harrington—To amend sec. 1548 c 3 § 1, criminal procedure; passed.

53 by Harrington—To amend sec. 968, chap. 12, title 3, Hill's code; referred to com. on Jud. for amendments.

83 by Thompson—Relating to surveys of Oregon; passed.

BILLS AND OTHER BUSINESS OF THE HOUSE.

H. J. R. 5, Jennings—In relation to a Department of Agriculture and the election of United States Senators; Ordered printed.

H. J. M. 5 Earhart—Praying congress to enact legislation providing

for the payment of claims arising from Indian depredation; adopted. H. J. M. 6 Smith—To adopt such legislation as will afford temporary help in building canal and locks at The Dalles and Cello; referred to committee on commerce.

W. T. Hume gave notice that he would introduce on Monday a bill to regulate and license commercial agencies.

Northrup, that House adjourn at noon until Monday at 2 o'clock; carried.

Bowditch, that House Bill 39 by Hume, to amend Hill's Code relating to the punishment for stealing stock be reconsidered and referred to Judiciary; passed.

Motion to adjourn by Apperson; carried.

### SALEM'S GOVERNMENT BUILDING.

EDITOR CAPITAL JOURNAL:—The citizens of Salem are to all appearances, unanimous in their desire for a government postoffice building here. The city papers are doing all they can to and the same and yet I see the business men are doing all they can to prevent the consummation of the very thing so much desired.

The question arises, are a few of the citizens to help their own interests to the detriment of the entire city?

During the last few days several meetings have been held in as many different parts of the city to perfect plans for the location of the postoffice. These plans have generally been to furnish building, lights and fuel to the government free, provided the government would only locate the postoffice in the favored locality. One calls for the present locality; another the opera house, and the third in the new bank block. Is it to be expected that a government building will be built here when the generous people of Salem so gratuitously furnish building, as well as fuel and lights? Would a man be expected to devote fifteen or twenty thousand dollars to the erection of a building in which to conduct his business when he could get the use of one free and also be paid for using it? Let all agree to charge the government for the privileges of building, fuel and lights and we will soon see what all appear to desire, a government building to be devoted to the use of the post office and other government needs.
