Paulsen moved to suspend the rules and take up second reading of bills; lost.

THIRD READING OF BILLS.

Harrington, to provide for the satisfying of mortgages by affidavit; passed.

Northup, to amend Hill's code relating to conveyances; passed.

Geor, to repeal an act relating to vagrants; passed.

Hume, to amend Hill's Code relating to punishment for stealing stock; passed.

Harrington, to amend secs. 3292 and 3296 of Hill's code; passed.

Ladd, to amend Hill's code relating to the Oregon National Guard; passed.

Powell, to regulate hunting or the killing of game on enclosed lands; passed.

Earhart, to amend Hill's code relating to the salaries of treasurers; passed.

Napton, that the rules be suspended that he could offer an amendment increasing the salary of the treasurer of Malheur county; carried and the amendment adopted.

Paquet, to provide assessment blanks for district clerks; passed.

Jennings, to amend Hill's code relating to voters at school meetings; passed.

Gillham, to create the county of Harney and fix the salaries of officers thereof; passed.

Hume, authorizing the appointment of official reporters for circuit courts; passed.

Miller, to amend section 1935 of Codes and General Laws relating to the killing of grouse and pheasants; amended and passed.

Roberts, to appropriate money to aid Coos and Douglas counties to build a wagon road; passed.

On motion the house adjourned until Monday at 2 o'clock p. m.
