WHERE SPIRITS ARE SOLD.

Some Folks Have License and Some Have None.

In Marion county there are twenty licensed saloons, of this number eleven are in the city of Salem. The Salem saloons are under the jurisdiction of the city and receive their licenses through the city council. Those outside the limits of incorporated cities conduct their business on licenses granted by the county court.

Marion county has four incorporated cities, as follows: Silverton, Jefferson, Gervais and Salem. Silverton's saloon closed Wednesday, Jefferson has none, Gervais has one and Salem has eleven.

Often there is yet a third class of saloonists who conduct their businesses without license from either county or municipality. To illustrate our point it is not necessary that we should enumerate the liquor houses of the city. But of those not inside of incorporated limits who sell gin, etc., by retail in the county are the following:

It will not take a very critical or studied glance to see what point we make from this statement of the facts as they are admitted by the general public to exist.

This matter, which will come under the investigation of the grand jury next week, is one which we would never have mentioned but for the reports that reach us of the villainous of the unlicensed dive. About it congregated the youth of the city. There they are permitted to carry on their capers unchecked. But to digress, several parties have assured us that any man who would sell such horrible liquor (license or no license) should be hung seven times until he was dead. Indiscriminations are unjust in matters of this nature. If we are to have "civil service," let us have it straight. When one man pays license for running a gin mill, all men in the same business should receive the same treatment, and as some of the dramshop keepers who pay their licenses and conform to the letter of the law object to unlicensed dives, and as the property owners in the vicinity of such side-door saloons object to unlicensed saloons of this order, the CAPITAL JOURNAL asks the grand jury to turn its eyes to the northward. A little vigilance on their part will result in the bringing to justice of the party or parties who wink at the officers and run their rum holes in defiance of all law.

Senator Mitchell's Bill.

The CAPITAL JOURNAL is in receipt of a copy of a joint resolution, introduced by Senator Mitchell, proposing an amendment to the constitution of the United States providing for the election of senators by the vote of the people of the states direct. The resolution has been read a second time and is now in the hands of the committee on privileges and elections. It proposes to strike out the word "legislature" in the first clause of section three of article one, and substitute in lieu thereof the word "people" so that said clause shall be as follows:

"The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each state, chosen by the people thereof for six years; and each Senator shall have one vote."

This bill of Senator Mitchell hardly agrees with the action of our Oregon legislature in which a similar memorial is "side-tracked."

IT IS ALMOST ASSURED.

Hundreds of Citizens Attend the Woolen Mill Meeting.

THE MOSSBACKS AWAKENED.

Could Easily Raise \$40,000 Instead of \$20,000.

It was announced through the columns of the CAPITAL JOURNAL yesterday that a citizens' meeting would be held in the Board of Trade chamber at 7:30 last evening, to counsel in regard to the woolen mill project. And long before the appointed hour hundreds of enthusiastic citizens congregated at the entrance of the chamber, and a bystander could easily ascertain that a great interest was being felt. When the doors were thrown open the spacious hall was filled to overflowing in three minutes, and those who arrived late were compelled to abandon all hopes of getting in hearing distance, so great was the throng. Promptly at 8 o'clock President Wright brought the gavel down and the mighty talking and discussing were abruptly brought to a silence. He then called the meeting to order with C. B. Moores in the chair as secretary pro tem.

The president then arose and stated in a few pointed remarks, the object of the meeting and asked that the committee, which had been appointed to look after the woolen mill business, make a statement to the meeting as to what arrangements had been made between the committee in behalf of the people of Salem and Mr. Kay.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

J. H. Alberts said: "Gentlemen I desire to say, as one of the committee, that we have held a number of meetings to try and make arrangements with the water power people, but for some reason could not make it satisfactory and therefore we placed this matter in Mr. Kay's hands and he has completed arrangements with them and they have also agreed upon the price. Mr. Kay agrees to build a woolen mill in our city that will consume 200,000 pounds of wool annually, and employ, say 50 persons the first year, and further agrees to increase said capacity after first year, as the demand requires. He proposes to make a life business of this matter, and when the mill is in full operation it will be the largest woolen mill in the state of Oregon, provided the citizens of Salem subscribe \$20,000, payable as follows: \$2500, first of March, \$5000 first of August and the balance, first of January, provided he has the mill completed in that time, otherwise they are not to pay but \$5000 on the first of January, and balance when the mill is completed. He further agrees to allow the citizens of Salem to hold a lien on the entire plant until he has filled the contract in every detail."

Squire Farrar of same committee said: "It is my belief that Mr. Kay is going to do the square thing with us, as he is a thorough business man and is going to do the whole thing in a business-like manner. He is not building great air-castles to be shattered at the first ripple, but is starting out slow but sure. If we invest the \$20,000 it will increase the business of our 'Athens of the West' double, yes I will venture to say treble the first year from the time it is invested, and will put our city on a solid foundation, on which business can safely build and 'booms' come to other towns but 'Salem' will decrease not. I am in for the enterprise and think we are assured of success."

E. M. Waite was called on but he was so "full" of enthusiasm, that words could not express his desire for the building of the mill.

Other speeches were made and all expressed themselves as feeling that "it is good for us to build the mill" and were willing to subscribe the required amount any time, accordingly a committee of three consisting of Messrs. S. Friedman, J. B. Stump and G. Stoltz was appointed to select seven names for a committee, for the purpose of securing the necessary bonus and vested with power to arrange all necessary details in the matter with Mr. Kay. The committee appointed consists of Thos. Holman, A. Bush, J. H. Alberts, W. N. Ladue, R. S. Wallace, Squire Farrar, H. W. Cottle and Dr. S. R. Jessup. Cottle and Alberts declined to act on account of business interests requiring their attention, and C. B. Moores and R. J. Hendricks were placed on the committee. The committee are to elect their chairman.

A report was then read referring to the Salem, Tillamook & Astoria railroad as to the cost of a survey of

the line for ninety miles, giving a full description of the route, number of men required, etc. The cost would be \$2,184 but after a deduction of the stock the surveyors would take it would leave \$1,934 to be raised. It is said it will take fifty-two days to complete the survey after starting.
