THOSE WOOLEN MILLS.

The Soliciting Committee Are at Work--Their Circular Issued.

Salem must have woolen mills and other manufacturing enterprises. The city's transportation facilities, fine water power, and other advantages are going to waste.

The tide of immigration toward Oregon, if the signs of the times are not misleading, point to an era of wonderful growth and advancement in the towns of Oregon.

This city has the natural advantages and needs only the requisite push and enterprise on the part of the citizens to accomplish the desired ends.

The soliciting committee have commenced the work of raising the subsidy of \$20,000 for the woolen mill. They have addressed a circular stating the proposition and requesting assistance from those who are able to give and will be benefited by the establishment of extensive woolen mills here.

The terms of payment upon the subscription are as follows: 12 1/2 per cent. on March 1, 1889, 25 per cent. on July 1, 1889, and the remainder on December 1, 1889.

The present is regarded as an opportunity which we should not allow to pass unimproved. That the erection of the proposed mill will be of infinitely more advantage to Salem than the amount of the subsidy asked, admits of no argument.

Salem is now entering upon a period of prosperity which should not be checked by any disposition upon the part of our people to neglect this opportunity.

The circular closes with the admonition that "the most prosperous towns on this coast to-day, are those which have the most liberally advertised their resources and subscribed to subsidies to develop manufacturing industries."

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Great interest has been felt on the first appearance in Boston of Mr. Josef Heine, the blind violinist. His performance was admirable, his tone is full, pure and strong.
