The Other Side.

The M. E. church South replies to the report of the legislative committee as follows in brief: That there was a college owned by that church called Corvallis college and that in 1870 this state adopted it as the Agricultural College of the state and that the Corvallis college accepted the contract duly, and appointed gentlemen to frame regulations for the government of said Agricultural College, which regulations were in time approved by the state; that pursuant to the premises the college bought the farm and paid itself some \$3600 principal and interest on the same; that it has ever since followed the laws and rules adopted by the state; that never has there been but two professors of the college who were members of their church in all the time since 1870; that the sum of \$100,000 paid it by the state has gone to defray expenses of teaching pursuant to the regulations approved by the state, which has always been pleased with the conduct of affairs; that other large sums given by the M. E. church South have gone the same way as well as contributions by members of that church; that the pretended annulment of the contract by that church was wholly without any authority, fraudulent and void and so decided by the supreme court—together with much else that puts a wholly new face on the subject, if true. Let both be heard. Hear all sides; then decide, is the CAPITAL JOURNAL'S motto.

Concerning Chinese Pheasants.

Speaking about the proposed law protecting these birds the East Portland Vindicator thus speaks out in meeting, voicing the sentiment of the farmers generally: "The farmers of the state are unwilling to raise grain to fatten and multiply game for the Alpine club or any other high toned sportsmen.
