The Senate Does Much in a Little Time.

WILL ADJOURN NEXT SATURDAY.

So They Decided at This Morning's Session.

STORMY IN THE HOUSE.

The Chair Strikes Out From Both Shoulders.

The Dalles will have water. The bill passed through the House this morning with a rush. The bill was introduced in the Senate by Watkins, and authorizes Dalles City to incur an indebtedness of fifty thousand dollars for the purpose of providing the city with good and wholesome water, and for the erection and construction of purchase of such water works and reservoirs within or without the limits of the city as may be necessary or convenient therefor, and to provide for the issuing of bonds and the payment of the principal and interest thereon. The bonds are different in one respect from the celebrated Bull Run water bill bonds, as they are "taxable."

SENATE.

FRIDAY P. M. SESSION.

Northrup. Bill to regulate pilotage rates on Columbia river; passed.

Special committee of senators from Eastern Oregon reported bill to establish agricultural societies in Oregon, with amendments; engrossed. Chandler. Bill restricting senators to five minutes' time on any one subject; adopted.

Cogswell. Bill for relief of Lake county; passed.

Gray. Bill for relief of Clatsop county; passed.

EVENING SESSION.

The following bills were passed: Bills amending Corvallis, La Grande, Pendleton, Grant's Pass, Albina, Eugene City charters incorporating Lakeview; Central Point; Watts' bill amending Dayton charter. Joint committee to visit penitentiary reported, with recommendations; referred judiciary. Mackay. That either superintendent or warden of penitentiary be required to reside in the prison; adopted.

SATURDAY A. M. SESSION.

Senate passed motion to adjourn till 1 p. m. Monday.

S. B. 206 substituted for 104.

S. B. 204. County seat of Polk county reconsideration postponed till 2 p. m. Monday.

House message notifying the passage of several bills. Also that S. B. 195, 69, 5, S. J. R. 6 were passed, and S. B. 39, 85, and 109.

The following bills were read a third time and passed.

S. B. 94. Section 44 amended concerning venue of suits.

S. B. 98. To amend Sec. 557, taxing costs.

S. B. 107. A crime to ask to be put on a jury.

S. B. 108. Amending 387 miscellaneous laws, concerning suits in equity.

S. B. 115. Giving \$2500 per year for a refuge home.

S. B. 122. Appointing two commissioners to aid in selecting juries.

S. B. 18. Sheriff to file stub books instead of stubs with the county clerks and other officers.

S. B. 86. Establishing a boatman at Astoria in service of the health officer; fixing salary.

S. B. 201. To amend t. l. c. 76 of laws relating to supervisors of roads.

S. B. 88. To amend Sec. 2304 so as to allow deputy of the district attorney to attend courts.

S. B. 89. To give hotel keepers liens on baggage, etc., of guests.

S. B. 90. To amend Sec. 1982, making it an offense to leave offensive matter unburied, etc.

HOUSE.

FRIDAY P. M. SESSION.

Reading of assessment bill; passed, 34 to 20, absent 6.

Hatch's Memorial Normal school bill; on the final passage the vote was 20 to 29, absent 2. Failed to pass.

Williamson's bill against pasturing stock on the lands of others; passed.

Jennings' bill regarding the collection of taxes; withdrawn.

Dimeck. To protect fish, and to create a fish commission; failed to pass.

Jennings' bill on collections of notes; failed to pass.

Ricker's bill for public roads for logging and lumbering purposes; passed.

Ladd. Bill amending the special law governing the Portland school district; referred to engrossing committee.

Watt. To allow boom on North Yamhill river; failed to pass.

Chamberlin's reform school bill; passed, 36 to 15, absent 1.

EVENING SESSION.

Pope offered a resolution providing for the appointment of a committee of three to compute the mileage of members; adopted.

Maxwell. Bill appropriating \$14,811 for the relief of Tillamook county; passed.

McCoy. Bill to create the county of Fulton out of part of Wasco county; passed, with amendment that the name of the county be Sherman.

Ladd's bill to amend the act providing for the establishment of special school districts in towns of 10,000 inhabitants and over; passed.

Requiring the superintendent or warden of the penitentiary to reside at the prison in the quarters provided; concurred in.

Joint committee to visit the penitentiary reported, making various recommendations; committee on ways and means.

Stanley. To amend Jacksonville charter; passed.

Irvine's bill to amend Albany charter; passed.

SATURDAY A. M. SESSION.

SELECTION OF BILLS.

Moore selected H. B. 170, to appropriate money to aid the county courts of Washington and Tillamook counties to construct a wagon road. Passed.

Geer of Marion, called to the chair.

Morelock by request, called for H. B. 69, authorizing The Dalles City, to incur an indebtedness of \$50,000 for water works. Passed.

Moss called for S. B. 59, to provide for the construction of a wagon road from Parsley to the state line on the South and appropriate money therefor.

Hume called for the clerk to call the roll of the House; adopted and the Sergeant of Arms sent after the absentees.

Northrup moved that a further call of the House be dispensed with and S. B. 59, be made a special order at 11:30; lost.

Pau'sen, asked a leave of absence for ten minutes, "said he wanted out." Speaker pro tem Geer, declared it out of order. [laughter.]

Goodnough asked to be excused for the day; objections were raised and the Speaker said he would be pleased to excuse him but it was not within the power of the Chair to do so. [Great applause.]

Northrup for a second time, moved that the further call of the House be dispensed with; lost. [Applause.]

"Northrup raised to a point of inquiry as to whether he would be allowed to read out of the American Encyclopedia?"

Motion made by Thompson to dispense with further call of the House. Passed.

Goodnough excused for the day, Thompson again moved for a call of the House.

Hume moved that the assistant sergeant at arms be sent to aid the sergeant at arms in finding the "naughty one."

At 10:55 the Sergeant of arms appeared at the outward gate of the bar and said, "Mr. Speaker, I have performed my duty and have succeeded in bringing forth Messrs. Miller of Jackson, Bowditch, Price, Apperson, Miller of Linn, and Fisher of Polk."

Mr. Speaker—"Gentlemen, you have absented yourselves, carelessly, from the session of the House for an hour when time is very valuable. It is the opinion of the chair, and presumably of the House, that a due regard for a strict performance of the duties you owe your constituents would require a more constant attendance in the sessions of this body. Gentlemen, the House extends to you a warm reception." [Applause.]

Blundell moved that each absentee be presented with a "brass collar." Miller of Jackson, said that it was his opinion that they had been "muzzled enough already." [Great laughter.]

Further call of the house dispensed with.

Speaker again stated that S. B. 59, was on its final passage, roll called and bill was passed.

Common roads and highways reported that S. B. 92 had been considered and recommended that it do not pass. Was indefinitely postponed.

Com on elections reported S. B. 91 considered and recommended its passage with amendments; adopted.

Napton called for H. B. 208, to appropriate money to the county court of Malheur county to construct a wagon bridge over the Owyhee river; lost.

Northrup called for S. B. 161, but as it was not in his house, his name was passed with intent to call it any other time.

Paquet called for H. B. 67, to amend section 580, chapter 49 of Hills Code relating to the duties of county superintendents; passed.

Thompson moved that House adjourn until 2 o'clock Monday.

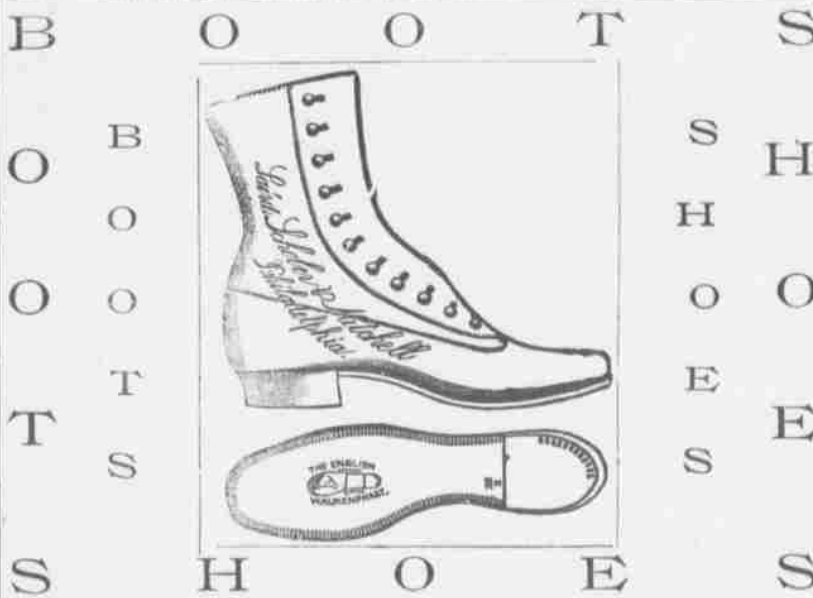
