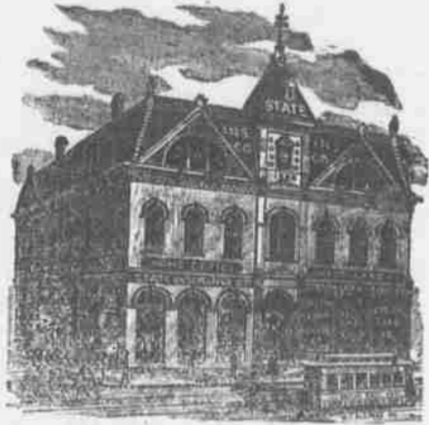

TELEGRAPHIC TIDINGS.

Important Events of the Whole World for the Past Week.

Two Cabinet Items.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—Senator Plumb has sprung into prominence as a prospective cabinet officer. Secretary of the Treasury Mr. Plumb discretely keeps his own counsel, but some of his closest friends have been talking, which accounts for the matter having gotten out. Senator Ingalls, in reply to a question, said that he did not know whether General Harrison had made such an offer to Senator Plumb, but he doubted very much whether Mr. Plumb would accept it if it were made.

Representative Thomas of Illinois will no doubt be the next secretary of the navy. Mr. Thomas is a member of the House committee on naval affairs, and is the designer of what naval officers consider to be one of the best plans yet submitted for an armored cruiser. Those who know Mr. Thomas best, think that he will make a model secretary of the navy, and that no better man could have been found to superintend the building of the new navy.

Sewell and Samoa.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—Secretary Bayard again put his foot in it. He forced Mr. Sewell, U. S. Consul General to Samoa, to resign because that official gave the foreign committees of the House and Senate a true statement of affairs in those islands—a statement that was necessarily uncomplimentary to the State department. The removal of Mr. Sewell at this time is regarded as particularly unfortunate, because it will appear to the natives of the islands as though it was done through fear of Germany, and as a rebuke to him for bravely insisting on American rights. So strong does this view of the case strike Senator Frye that he says if he has any influence with the next administration Sewell shall go back to Samoa as consul general.

A Murder Tragedy.

MASON, CITY, Ia., Feb. 18.—Menger details of a dreadful tragedy at Glenville, Minnesota, reach here. Two young ladies went to the home of an old couple to spend the evening. At 9 o'clock they started home, and had scarcely stepped out of the door when they were shot down by two ruffians. The old gentleman started to go for help, and while he was gone the fiends entered the house and killed the old lady.

The body of one of the murderers was found forty rods from the house. He committed suicide by shooting himself in the head. The girl who escaped instant death has since died, making four deaths in all.

A Holocaust.

HARTFORD, Conn., Feb. 19.—The boiler of the Park Hartford hotel blew up yesterday morning, wrecking the entire front of the structure, which was a five-story brick building. The entire fire department and police reserves were summoned. The ruins took fire and the work of the firemen was greatly impeded by the blinding volumes of smoke and steam. The loss of life is estimated at from forty to seventy, but may be less.

Stanley Dead Again.

PARIS, Feb. 18.—A correspondence of the Petite Journal at Saine Salvador Congo says: "A Courier has arrived from the West Coast, who states that a report is current that Henry M. Stanley was killed in an engagement with natives near Waugamba. The courier reports that several instruments which have been identified as having belonged to Stanley have been sold by natives."

The English Navy.

LONDON, Feb. 19.—It is reported that at the coming session of parliament the government will propose a defense loan of £10,000,000, the proceeds to be devoted to the construction of twenty men-of-war, fifty cruisers and increasing the torpedo boats.

RICH RECRUITS FOR HEAVEN.

New York Women of Wealth and Fashion Join the Salvationists.

NEW YORK, Feb. 19.—Tinkling tambourines, scarlet streamers and hosannahs, the fashionable and the humble united under the banner of the Salvation army. The army headquarters were crowded to the doors with the daughters of Murray Hill and the chosen of Mammon. Down into dusty, noisy Reed street came these ladies. Draymen paused in wonder, Gamins gazed open-mouthed and the girls who labor for a living and those who neither toil nor spin looked enviously on.

It was the regular afternoon meeting. Society has set its stamp of approval upon the army. Recruits are being drawn from the ranks of the "select," and, in consequence, the gathering at headquarters was a most remarkable one. It was strange to see beautifully dressed women with bunches of exquisite flowers at their waists and decked with jewels, praying with bent heads in unison with the plainly clad and the rough handed.

LOOKING FOR LAND.

Wonderful Rush of Settlers into the Northwest.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 19.—John J. Valentine, of the Wells-Fargo Express company returned yesterday from a visit to Oregon and Washington Territory. He has been up in that country each year for the past three years, but on this last trip he was more impressed with the development of the country than ever before.

Prices are going up every day and their advance is something wonderful. The Northern Pacific is doing a good deal for that country and the Canadian Pacific will also aid its development considerably, particularly if it follows out its plan for building a railroad down the Sound to Seattle. Thirteen Men Escape.

OMAHA, Feb. 19.—A Bee special from Ashland says: A remarkable wreck took place here. The regular freight was standing on the track when another freight came up behind crashing into the caboose, smashing it into kindling wood, ruining the engine and piling several cars on top of each other.

There were thirteen men in the caboose at the time, all of whom were asleep. They awoke to find themselves in all sorts of curious positions among the debris. One man's nose bled slightly as the result of a collision with some substance. He was the most seriously injured of the thirteen.

Panama and the Canal.

PANAMA, Feb. 18.—A large number of laborers have been discharged from the canal works, a majority of whom have left for the West Indies, Costa Rica and China. A limited amount of work continues on all sections of the canal, and a total suspension is not expected until the middle of March.

She Did Her Part.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 19.—Mrs. Elizabeth has just died, aged ninety-three years. She was the mother of twenty-one children. She had 117 grandchildren, 76 great grandchildren and 46 great-great-grandchildren. Her oldest son is seventy years old.

Bound For Samoa.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—A telegram received from Rear Admiral Belknap, commander at Mare Island navy yard, California, says the United States ship Vandala arrived at Honolulu February 2d, and was to sail for Samoa on the 7th.
