OUR PEN PICTURES.

Short Sketches of Our Law Maker And Prominent Men.

ROBERT A. IRVINE.

The subject of this brief sketch was born in Todd county, Ky., in the year 1824. He is a descendant of the Irvines of South Carolina who came to this country long before the Revolutionary war. Their original home is on the banks of the Irvine river, Scotland, whence some of them immigrated to Ireland, counties Armagh and Fermanagh, and Irvinestown is the home of the race there—a stern, hardy, earnest, Scotch-Irish Presbyterian ancestry. General William Irvine, surgeon general of the revolutionary army and later commander of Crawford's expedition, was the head of that family in this country, whose members began to scatter from Pennsylvania through the South and West as early as 1760. Senator Robert A. Irvine moved to Missouri as early as 1834 with his parents, where he resided until 1852, when he came to Linn county, Oregon, where he has ever since resided. He is a farmer, although elected sheriff for his county and served two terms. In 1866 he was elected Senator for his county for the first time. Senator Irvine is a firm democrat and is decidedly in favor of low taxes and the smallest practicable appropriations, as his consistent votes show. He is earnestly in favor of a homestead law, believing that law taxes and good laws will do far more to invite the industrious, laboring and intelligent classes to our state than all the publishing and advertising. He is a strong friend to his own class, the farming and laboring people.

HON. JOHN HAHN

is a republican Representative from Clatsop county. Mr. Hahn, is a native of that well known land that is called Germany. He was born in that country April 21, 1846. When he was twelve years of age he came across the ocean and landed in New York in 1860, and in 1872 we find him in Oregon, where he has resided continuously up to the present time. He resides at Astoria, where he is engaged in mercantile pursuits. Mr. Hahn is a man well respected by his fellow citizens and was a member of the city council from 1878 to 1881, and had the honor of being elected mayor of his city in 1881, which office he filled until 1886. Mr. Hahn opposed the pilotage bill that passed the legislature this session. He thinks their compensation small enough for the hardships which they are compelled to encounter.

HON. JAMES A. HUNTER.

Mr. Hunter is a staunch republican from Wallowa county and resides in that beautiful city of Enterprise. He was born in the state of Ohio in 1832, and moved into Indiana, the Hoosier state, in 1844. Fourteen years later we find him in the Grasshopper state, or what is better known as Kansas. He served three years in the Seventh Kansas Vol. Cavalry, and one year in Hancock's veteran corps. In the year 1877 he migrated to Oregon and located in Marion county of which Wallowa was then a portion. Mr. Hunter boasts of the honor of having voted for every republican candidate for the presidency of the United States from Fremont to Harrison. Mr. Hunter is a frank, open hearted man and has hosts of personal friends.

TELEGRAPHIC TIDINGS.

Important Events of the Whole World for the Past Week.

A GREAT DISASTER.

An Earthquake Destroys a City and Kills Many. NEW YORK, Feb. 19.—The Press contains the following description of the recent earthquake in Central America, dated San Jose (Costa Rica), January 10th; The capital of the republic has been completely destroyed by a series of earthquakes beginning on the evening of Dec. 29, and the latest of which passed over us yesterday. Further shocks are expected every moment and the horrors of the hour are increased by the probability of an eruption of the volcanoes of Razu and Boaz showering down fire, bowlders and molten lava on a valley in which a population of 8000 is centered. Both of these volcanoes have shown signs of growing activity in the wreaths of blue smoke ascending from their craters. As nearly as can be ascertained, about 200 lives have been lost thus far, and the injured number nearly 1000. The homeless multitude of terror-stricken survivors wander about in a state of demoralized consternation easier imagined than described.

An Infernal Machine.

HELENA, MONT., Feb. 19.—The infernal machine which was reported to have been found in the rear of the Salvation Army hall at Deer Dodge turns out to be a big red fire-cracker and a small Chinese bomb. It is the general opinion that some men and boys of the army placed the boom and cracker near the window, and exploded the other bomb near the house, where a child of one of the women of the army was sleeping, in order to create sympathy. The processionists were egged and subjected to shocking indignities, hence the ruse.

Money for Oregon.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—The Sundry civil bill was taken up yesterday, and considered, and the following items agreed to: For establishment of light ship and steam fog signal at the bar of the Columbia river, Or., sixty thousand dollars; for connecting Tillamook Rock and Oregon light station by telegraph cable and land telegraph line, \$6000; for establishment and maintenance of refuge station at Barrow Point, Alaska, \$15,000.

A Fatal Fire.

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 20.—Landis' transfer stables, on Tenth street and Troost avenue, were destroyed by fire yesterday. James Hoffman, one of the owners of the building, perished in the flames. Ninety-four horses were also lost. Loss, \$65,000; partially insured.

Another Big Fire.

SELMA, CAL., Feb. 20.—An incendiary fire destroyed five buildings at the corner of West Front and Second streets. The losses will aggregate \$15,500; insurance \$9,000. This was the twentieth fire within one year, nearly all supposed to have been incendiary.

Sub Puzzled.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—John B. Henderson of Missouri is in the city. He visited the president-elect at Indianapolis last week, and says his impression from remarks made by Mr. Harrison is that M. M. Estee of California will be appointed attorney general.

Admission as States.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—The conferees on the territorial bill reached an agreement last night, it is said. It provides for the admission of the two Dakotas, Montana and Washington by proclamation, after October.

Nearing the Capitol.

INDIANAPOLIS, Feb. 20.—The announcement is made that the president-elect and his family will leave for Washington Monday afternoon. Until then they will receive no callers, except by special appointment.
