

THE LEGISLATURE.

Only Two More Days of the Short Session.

THE GOVERNOR VETOES AGAIN.

But the House Doesn't Stand By Him This Time.

THE RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS.

The Bill Will Become a Law and the Board Will be Elected.

As the last days of the session draw nigh, the number of spectators and lobbyists increase. To day the corridors and rotundas are crowded to their utmost capacity.

And now Oregon is to have a real live board of railroad commissioners, the House this morning having passed the bill over the governor's veto.

The time for the introduction of new bills has passed. The laws that are to be made have already been introduced.

TUESDAY P. M. SESSION.

House amendments on Sinclair's bill to promote drainage, concurred in.

Veto of the governor of Dawson's bill creating a railroad commission, read. The vote, the question being, "Shall the bill pass notwithstanding the veto of the governor?"

S. C. R. by Gray, that a committee be appointed on assessment and taxation to offer five amendments to the existing assessment law; laid on table.

Communication from superintendent of instruction, recommending a resolution that an appropriation be made that the state may be represented at the National Educational association at Nashville, Tenn., July 16, 17-18-19, 1889.

Walden resolution that \$500 be included in the appropriation bill, in order that the state may be properly represented at this convention; lost.

Watkins Bill providing times for holding circuit courts in the Seventh judicial district; read three times and passed.

EVENING SESSION.

Paquet, bill amending charter of Oregon City; passed.

Gilbert, bill amending Sellwood charter; passed.

Northup, bill amending Portland charter; read twice and made a special order to-morrow evening.

Raley, bill to relocate county seat of Union county; passed.

Bill by Moss regulating salary of county judges in Lake and Klamath counties; passed.

Smith, bill for relief of Wasco county; read twice.

Gilham, bill creating Harney county out of Grant; senate adjourned while this bill was pending.

WEDNESDAY A. M. SESSION.

S. B. 141. Re-passed to enrolled bills. Reports of committees, committee on state lands, on state treasurer; more clerical aid recommended.

Committee on school for the blind recommend appropriation of \$9000; no ground for complaint found.

The consideration of H. B. 69 to create the county of Harney was resumed and the county was organized.

S. J. R. 9, was recommended and passed and \$500 was appropriated to enable our schools to be represented at the national convention at Nashville, Tenn.

The committee on military affairs recommended the passage of H. B. 102 for the relief of indigent soldiers. It was ordered for 3d reading.

THIRD READING.

S. B. 123, Watt, prohibit donation for amount of property subject to taxation, except mortgages. Postponed till evening.

125, to confine titles to swamp and overflowed lands. Passed.

128, Gray, to authorize McGonigle to operate a log boom on Sakamhan creek in Clatsop county. Passed.

S. B. 133, Norval, to grant O. & W. R. R. Co. right of way through lands of Oregon, etc., and take lands, etc. on payment of same. Passed.

S. B. 142, Tongue, to prevent spread of contagious animal diseases. Not passed.

170, Gray, postponed. Oaphans' home committee reported satisfactory. Adopted.

FIRST AND THIRD READING. 205, considered engrossed in due order.

172, Wager, To require Co. warrants to be recalled after seven years. 180, To amend section 1 act to authorize bridge between Portland and East Portland.

H. B. 212, Taken up in place by suspension of rules read 1, 2 and 3, time in line of above; passed.

HOUSE.

TUESDAY P. M. SESSION.

Belknap. Bill allowing all chartered educational institutions to examine students for teachers' certificates. Passed.

Portland water bill resulted in 39 to 21, no one being absent.

Fullerton S. B. To allow the Gardiner Mill Co. to build a boom on the Umpqua. Passed.

Price. Bill to allow the Tolo Townsite company to build a boom on Rogue river. Passed.

Hatch S. B. For an enabling act for Polk county. Lost by a vote of 23 to 32.

Committee to examine the blind school and state treasurer's office reported favorably; adopted.

Tongue S. B. To license stallions; failed to pass.

Paulsen. Bill to regulate rates of toll on the Portland railroad bridge; failed to pass.

Harrington. Bill for the relief of school district No. 35, of Multnomah. Passed.

Maekay S. B. Allowing companies operating mines, etc., to file mortgage in more than one county. Passed.

Watts S. B. For \$478 for relief of Joel J. Hembree; re-committed, claims.

EVENING SESSION.

Chandler. Bill for bridge across Owyhee river failed to pass.

S. B. Relating to appointment of stock inspectors; failed to pass.

Sinclair. Bill to protect salmon and other food fishes in Oregon waters. Passed.

Tongue. Bill requiring burying of carcasses of animals. Passed.

Smith. Bill for relief of Wasco county. Passed.

Maxwell. Bill to allow Salem, Tillamook & Astoria railroad to bridge river at Salem. Passed.

Waldo. Bill of \$110 for the relief J. M. Dinsmore; passed. Also Waldo's bill for relief of John Stapleton, 150; passed.

WEDNESDAY A. M. SESSION.

Com on enrolled bills reported H. B. 64 and 65, correctly enrolled.

Maxwell moved a reconsideration of S. B. 141, to license stallions; adopted; bill was again placed upon final passage and passed.

Thomas called up S. B. 103, by Cogswell, to create the county of Hamilton. Was lost on second reading.

Roe called for S. B. 161, by Raley to re-locate the county seat of Union county; read first and second time by title only; motion to refer to com on commerce lost. Rules suspended and bill was passed.

At 10:25 under a special order the House considered S. B. 75, to amend an act to create and establish a Board of Railroad Commissioners, bill was passed in the Senate and House over the Governor's veto.

Kirk moved a call of the House. Amendment was made to H. B. 73, by the Senate; amendment adopted.

S. J. R. No. 9, was adopted.

H. B. 69 was returned from senate amended and House adopted amendment.

Roe moved a reconsideration of H. B. 105, which failed to pass; motion lost.

Laughlin called for H. B. 98 and 298 as a substitute to license and regulate insurance business, made special order at 7:30 this evening.

Ladd, at the request of Paquet, called for H. B. 196, to provide for recording wills. Passed.

Labrie called for S. R. 94 by Fullerton, to amend an act to incorporate the city of Roseburg. Passed.

Kirk called for S. B. 66 by Raley, to amend an act to incorporate the city of Weston. Passed.

Hunter called for H. B. 92, by Armsstrong, to amend section 2575, 3276 and 2577 pertaining to education. Passed.
