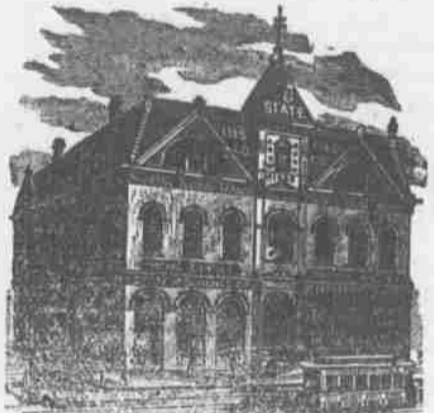

Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.

Pocatello Must Move.

SPOKANE FALLS, Feb. 25.—Great excitement prevails at Pocatello, Idaho, on account of the closing of all business on the reservation by order of the Indian agent, acting under instructions from Washington. Special notices are being posted on all the business houses, declaring them closed and the buildings erected since September 1, 1888, subject to confiscation, thereby rendering 2000 people homeless.

This Was in Indiana.

EVANSVILLE, Feb. 25.—Several Mormon missionaries have been proselyting some time past in this section of the country. Two of them, in Dubois county, have been claiming to perform miracles, but failed to do so. They were told by a number of citizens to leave the county, but refused. Friday, while they were exhorting, several masked men seized them, stripped and tied them to trees, and gave them fifty lashes each on the bare back. They were told they would be left to themselves until morning, but would be killed if found in the county Saturday. They disappeared.

Albany's Street Railway.

ALBANY, Or., Feb. 25.—The question of granting the franchise to the company recently organized in this city for the purpose of building a street car line, will come up for consideration at the meeting of the city council, to-night, as an ordinance granting the proposed franchise was introduced at the last meeting and referred to the committee on ordinances with instructions to report at the next regular meeting.

Scarlet Fever Epidemic.

BISMARCK, Dak., Feb. 25.—Scarlet fever, which has been prevalent in this city and Mandan for some time, now reaches a most alarming stage, and all precautions are being taken by the authorities of both cities to present its further spread. The city schools, churches and places of amusement have been closed, and there is talk of closing the legislature.

Our New President.

INDIANAPOLIS, Feb. 25.—The hurry and confusion of preparation and work for the last hours of residence at the Harrison homestead were constant. A stream of callers kept the general busy all day yesterday. Many buildings in the business portion of the city were gaily decorated in honor of the departure of the president-elect for Washington in the afternoon.

For Natural Gas.

ALBANY, Feb. 26.—Those who are familiar with natural gas say there are indications of its existence near Spring Hill, in Benton county, two and a half miles from Albany. An oily substance can be seen upon the water in that locality, and indications of coal have been found. It is probable prospectors will be out soon.

Another Horror.

PITTSBURG, Feb. 26.—A Wilkesbarre, Pa., special says: A terrible explosion occurred in a squib factory at Plymouth. Nine girls were burned to death and thirteen seriously injured.

Movements of Salem People.

The following personal mention is found in the Los Angeles Herald of the 20th inst., and gives the movements of a party of Salemites:

The Fox Guzey.

"Yes," said another old gentleman, "I remember mighty well. But the dumb bulls—they will make any man run. Take a hollow black gum log, 8 to sixteen inches in diameter, and saw out a length of about 12 to 16 inches. That makes a cylinder, hollow out smooth inside, and the thinner the better.
