J. H. Smart, D. Let Them Fight.

The Astoria Pioneer is horribly down on Portland. Thus it speaks: "We are preparing a brief history of Portland and the many thieving schemes she has inaugurated against the balance of the state. The first act of Portland was in 1859 when the Pacific Mail steamers made their headquarters at St. Helens. That was the terminus of the Oregon route. Portland was anxious to have the steamers land at Portland, and in order to accomplish her object she sent representatives down to St. Helens, set fire to the town, burned up the steamship dock and compelled the company to make their headquarters in Portland. A few years after that she stole the Vancouver barracks and garrison from Vancouver and had them located in Portland."

"She next attempted to steal the capital of the state away from Salem. She did steal the headquarters of the lighthouse service away from Astoria, after W. B. Headington had at great expense built a handsome residence for the use of Capt. Merriam, and they still owe Mr. Headington for the last year's rent. She has kept on her damnable stealing outrages until she, at this session of the legislature, attempted to steal a slice off from Clackamas county, and so persistent has she become as public plunderer, the city is known in history as the "Den of Thieves." Nearly all the crimes committed in Astoria are committed by the petty larceny thieves of Portland. Have we then not the right, and is it not necessary for us to quarantine against Portland, for fear that she will steal the city of Astoria, should it be left out doors after dark?"

THE QUACK BILL.

ED. CAPITAL JOURNAL:—The Oregonian in its pettifoggish advocacy of the doctors bill says it was "aimed at quacks." If it had said it was aimed at some of the quacks, it would have been about correct. In instancing quacks who were to be deterred from plying their trade by the provisions of this bill it mentions the French men and women who took lots of cash out of Portland. Now the bill provides that anyone desiring to sell medicines as these people did shall pay to the state a license fee of one hundred dollars a month. Does the Oregonian think this would serve as a prohibition, or is it on the principle of high license—if it pays well it is all right?

The French woman or any other sharp quack like her would not mind paying \$100 for a monopoly of the business which this bill practically gives to such as she is. She would do the state in a month and carry away more money than a whole army of little quacks. She could afford to pay the Oregonian well, too, for advertising her business.

The Oregonian sees no wrong in giving to a board of three men more power than is possessed by the supreme court—power to annul a certificate for unprofessional conduct and leaving it for this board to determine what is "professional." The oldest and ablest physician in the state might in an unguarded moment do something—say insert an advertisement in his local paper making known some new remedy or appliance he had discovered and straightway this medical board is down upon him and he is deprived of his living. There is no appeal—this board is all powerful. Such legislation is simply infamous, and I venture to affirm that the people of this state will settle this question of quack legislation at the next election.

If the governor should decide to use the veto power to strangle this wretched apology at law making the great mass of the people will applaud him for it, and he will have added one more to the many laurels he has won in his attempt to secure the rights of the people against the encroachments of cliques and monopolies.
