Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.

Immortality in Alaska.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Governor Swineford of Alaska has forwarded to the secretary of the interior his report upon the alleged outrageous treatment of women and children in Alaska, charged by Mr. Voorhees, and by several ex-special agents of the treasury department. The report is made in response to a resolution adopted by the senate in December and will be sent to the senate by the secretary. It briefly states that the governor enters his most emphatic denial of the charges made by the persons named, and strongly denounces the efforts of so-called moralists to degrade before the world the people under his charge, and to create an impression that Alaska is a place of nameless horrors.

That immortality exists in Alaska the governor admits, but he most emphatically denies the story told by Voorhees, and says there is not a town or village existing in the most civilized portions of the United States in which there is not more immortality than in any town in Alaska.

The status of married women in Alaska is different from what it is in the United States. There the matter of marriage is one of bargain and sale. This may account for the shocking tales told in the east.

A Wonderful Story.

New York, March 1.—Rev. Hubler, a missionary to Liberia, who recently returned to Brooklyn, tells a remarkable story of a relapse from civilization to barbarism of a young colored girl of Raleigh, N. C., who with her family had immigrated to Liberia, where her father is a prosperous rice planter, while she is the wife of a greasy black king of Golahs. Shortly after the family's arrival at Liberia, Maria disappeared and when her father and brother found her she was one of the King Jim's thirteen wives, attired in only a waist rag and with her hair cut short. She refused to return to her old broken hearted mother and father, and her brothers were insolently driven from the kaar by the attendants of the black king. This was four years ago and now Mr. Hubler says she has subjugated all the other wives. She is extending his domain, has built a fine palace, has embraced the Mohammedan faith and will shortly marry a powerful chief.

Black and White.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Feb. 28.—Thos. Cassone, a negro, and Annie Abbott, a buxom white girl of eighteen, were married in Jeffersonville this morning by Rev. Ezra Miller, a negro preacher. The parties came to Jeffersonville last night from Trimble county, Ky., and remained in seclusion until this morning, when the ebony swain went to the county clerk and secured a license, making oath that his bride-elect was twenty-one and saying nothing as to her complexion. The minister has been arrested but he declares the bride was veiled and he thought she was colored.

To Add More Stars.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Representative Springer introduced a bill for the admission of Idaho and Wyoming. It provides that these territories may become states as provided in the Omnibus; that the provision of that act shall extend to these territories the same as if they had been included in the Act, with certain exceptions.

Misery vs. Splendor.

SHANGHAI, Feb. 27.—The ceremony of the marriage of the Emperor was performed with unusual splendor. The magnificence of the festivities contrasts strongly with the condition of the famishing millions in the provinces.

No More Base Ball.

NICK, Feb. 28.—The game of base ball between the Chicago and the Americans was abandoned owing to the bad weather. The clubs have started for Palm.

An Electrical Phenomenon.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 28.—A strange phenomenon occurred near Ontario, in this county, Saturday. Willie, son of James Vanwig, a rancher, started across an open field to join his father, who was at work. Mrs. Vanwig, sitting on the front porch, watched the little fellow plodding across the plowed ground, when suddenly the eyes of the mother and of the father, who had stopped work, watching the little boy coming, were blinded by an indescribable flash of light. When they recovered their vision they saw Willie lying on the ground. He had swooned, and was badly injured. His hair, eyelashes and eyebrows were burnt entirely off. His clothes were scorched and burned in places.

He was resuscitated with great difficulty and has not yet entirely recovered from the shock. His burns were very deep and painful. There was not a single cloud in the sky at the time, nor any wind. Electricity was undoubtedly the cause.
