The expenses of the University of Tennessee are but one hundred and seventy-five dollars per scholar per year; those of Harvard the most expensive in the Union, are but seven hundred dollars. These sums feed, clothe, and serve for tuition expenses.

The wealth of the Vanderbilts by a very careful estimate is given authoritatively as amounting to \$374,000,000. Cornelius has \$110,000,000 of this and W. K. \$85,000,000. They are nearly all business men and are in receipt of good salaries, and live with great economy, considering their incomes.

"The gilded stone quarry over the way," as the New York state house is called, at Albany, cost eighteen and a half million dollars. INTOLERANCE.

Ignorance and brutality are ever intolerant. But at a South Carolina college two professors were mobbed by the students for voting republican, and at Bowdoin, Maine, President Hyde was also mobbed by the students and citizens for announcing that he was in favor of free trade, while for the same reason Professor Canfield of the Kansas State University has been denounced at indignation meetings, his expulsion from the college demanded, and a resolution introduced to the legislature branding him a traitor. These are fine signs. Happy, proud America!

WONDERS OF ASTRONOMY.

A matter of the highest interest to the whole world is the proposed new object glass for the San Diego observatory. It is to be a forty-inch lens, [that of the Lick is but thirty-six.] Clark, the manufacturer, says the best place in the world for observations is Southern California, and that the biggest glass ever made can be used without any difficulty. The great difficulty is to get the glass, which is made at but four places in the world, Birmingham, England, Germany and two places near Paris. The great piece of glass must be simply perfect, and takes many trials to make it. The great authority, Mr. Clark, thus concludes: "Contrary to the predictions of astronomers, the refraction of light does not interfere with observations at the Lick observatory. Not only have the observations been good, but they have exceeded anything ever dreamed of."

"If there are intelligent beings in the moon," said Mr. Clark, "we should be able to see their buildings, bridges and canals. It is suggested by scientific men nowadays that there may be air and water and inhabitants on the side of the moon which we never see. Perhaps these people may explore the desert which is continually turned toward us. If they do, and if they build there or make big excavations, we should be able to see their works with this forty-inch glass."

A SECOND CHRIST.

Where will folly end? Well why not? Let us have a law against these fools too. A dispatch from Minneapolis says: A meeting is being held there by a body of persons who believe Christ is on earth. The meeting was led by C. C. Whitney, who read from the 5th chapter of Isaiah, saying that it referred to a woman who would give birth to a new Christ. This woman, he said, was Mrs. Buckman, whom he had met in Kansas twenty years ago. She was filled with the spirit of the Lord and fulfilled the prophecy of Isaiah. Her son, the Rev. Geo. J. Schwenfuth, now a resident of Rock Island, Ill. Whitney says is the true Christ.

Schwenfuth writes frequently to Mr. Whitney, and his letters are read as sermons.

CAUSE FOR CHEERFULNESS.

The Adjutant of the Salvation Army at San Jose, Cal., on the occasion of his marriage ceremony, said he was glad religion did not mean unhappiness. He believed in cheerfulness in religion. "I think that only those who believe in Jesus Christ are happy," said he. "I believe in the Bible, every word of it. I believe the bad will go to hell, and only those who accept Jesus Christ will go to heaven." As that puts about one out of every million of all who have existed on the earth in heaven and sends the remainder to eternal fire and brimstone it is a most cheerful reflection. Let the saints rejoice.

SHORT CROP OF LAWYERS.

For the first time in its history there were no applicants for admission to the bar before the supreme court at Utica, N. Y.
