

Paper From Wood.

The discovery of the value of wood in paper making is credited to Dr. H. H. Hill, of this city. About forty years ago the doctor visited the paper mill at Vassalboro, and after looking over the machinery suggested the feasibility of using wood, and asked why the manufacturers did not get a few bales of excelsior from Augusta, where it was made, and try the experiment of making paper from wood. "It can't be done," said the manufacturers. "Have not you as much gumption as the horse, whose nests are made of wood shavings?" asked the doctor. The result of the conversation was a letter, some time later, from the firm's wholesale agents in Boston asking what they were putting in their paper to make it so much better than it had been. It was the wood, then first used in this way.—Kennebec (Me.) Journal.

Cold Baths. The method of treating typhoid fever in the German military hospitals is by cold baths, says the Medical Record. Out of twenty-one hundred cases treated before the fever had progressed five days every one recovered. Out of the same number treated so at various periods only one and a half per cent. died. Nineteen thousand treated with all kinds of cold bathing, less than 8 per cent. died. Strict cold bathing from the beginning seems to be a certain cure.
