TELEGRAPHIC TIDINGS.

Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.

A New Transcontinental.

TACOMA, MARCH, 5th.—Colonel Rogers, chief of the preliminary surveying party of the Manitoba road, is authority for the statement that the road is headed for the coast, and that it is the purpose of Jim Hill to make the vicinity of Tacoma the western terminus of his road. He realizes that the road must be pushed through to the coast or go into bankruptcy. Mr. Rogers says nine or ten million dollars will have to be raised in Europe on bonds, and the road built through within the next two years. The line by which the road expects to reach Tacoma is from Butte City, its present terminus, through Lolo Pass in the Bitter Root Mountains, and the Nez Perces Indian Reservation to Lewiston, Idaho, from which point it follows the Snake river on the north bank to some point near Grange City, from which it makes a bee line to Ellensburg. From Ellensburg it makes another bee line to Cowlitz Pass and then it strikes out for Stellacoom and from Stellacoom to Tacoma.

The New Cabinet.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—President Harrison yesterday sent to the senate the following nominations: Secretary of state—James G. Blaine of Maine. Secretary of the treasury—William Windom of Minnesota. Secretary of war—Redfield Proctor of Vermont. Secretary of the navy—Benjamin F. Tracy of New York. Secretary of the interior—John W. Noble of Missouri. Postmaster General—John W. Hamaker of Pennsylvania. Attorney-General—W. H. H. Miller of Indiana. Secretary of agriculture—Jeremiah Rusk of Wisconsin. The cabinet was confirmed by the senate.

A Curious Accident.

New YORK, March 5.—George Williams was buried to-day. A post-mortem examination showed that death resulted from a piece of wood lodged in his intestines. About a week before the boy broke his slate frame in school, and while trying to mend it he put a piece of wood, to which a string was attached, in his mouth. While fixing the slate the wood and string slipped down his throat. The boy remained at school until the hour of dismissal, and was not inconvenienced by the string and wood until he started for home, when he was taken sick and vomited. Nausea and fever followed until his death. The autopsy revealed the fact that the smaller intestine had become punctured by the wood.

Held For Contempt.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 5.—David S. Terry, for whom bench warrants had been issued by the United States district court on four indictments in connection with the contempt of court matters, surrendered himself to-day, and was released on \$5000 bonds on each charge.

The Appropriation Bill.

WASHINGTON, March 5.—The amount carried by the general appropriation bills passed at this session of congress was \$281,879,000 against \$308,906,000 for the current year.

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.

It is reported that the Manitoba railway is heading towards Tacoma. The address of President Harrison is highly spoken of by the press in general.

It is said that over half a million people were in Washington at the inauguration.

As usual the fourth of March at Washington was a day of storm. The procession went in a beating rain.

Two of the supposed train robbers in the Pixley affair have been arrested. They strenuously deny the insertion.

A niece of the late Chief Justice Chase, Mrs. Leland, was committed for trial, accused of stealing some ear-rings and money.

The actress, Maggie Mitchell, is seeking a divorce from her husband, Mr. Paddock. He courted her fourteen years and they were married in 1893.

The will of the late rich man Flood, disposes of four and two tenths millions of dollars—one-half to his wife and remainder to his son and daughter, share and share alike.

It is predicted by the skilled observers that the yellow fever will prevail again this year in the infected districts of last summer, because there has been little or no frost there this winter.

During last January 140 cases of persons were treated at the Pasteur Institute, who had been bitten by mad animals, of those but two have died. 133 of those cases were bitten by dogs, six by cats and one by an ox.

The Associated Press send off a high compliment to ex-President Cleveland, for his unwavering courtesy and kindness, and state that while their relations with the White House have always been pleasant, their position as representatives and instructors of the public was never so clearly recognized as by Cleveland.

The Tacoma News glorifies over its cotemp because it scooped the news about the coming of the Southern Pacific, the double tracking of the Northern Pacific between Tacoma and Portland on the Pacific Division and on the Cascade, and the efforts of the Manitoba to get a terminal there. This, in addition to the facts about the U. P. and the Canadian and Manitoba will make Tacoma the grand terminus should they be realized.

The Sunday Examiner of San Francisco gives a long account of prisoners forced to labor, by putting them to a kind of torture, in case of refusal. All these were cases of persons convicted of some trivial offense and fined, and made to labor to pay the fine. In no case was it pretended that they had been guilty of any crime. In some cases they suffered severely under the torture. And yet the constitution of every state as well as of the United States declares there shall be no involuntary servitude except of convicts for crime, and no cruel or unusual punishment.
