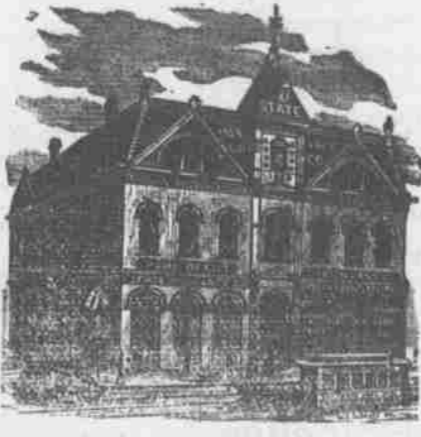

An Innocent Convict.

CHICAGO, March 7.—At the funeral of Newton Watts, who died at Joliet serving a life sentence for complicity in the Rock Island express robbery, the minister declared his belief in Watts' innocence.

Farewell, and if Forever.

WASHINGTON, March 7.—First Comptroller Durham, commissioner of the inter-state commission, and Fourth Auditor Shelley have tendered their resignations, to Secretary Windom, to take effect at his convenience.

British Interference.

LONDON, March 7.—In the house of commons to-day the parliamentary secretary for foreign offices said that the government had not heard of any truce being established between the German consul at Apia and Mataafa.

A Big Failure.

READING, Pa., March 7.—About the largest iron works in America failed for over a million—the Reading Iron works—several other works in connection with it are expected to shut down.

War in Montana.

HELENA, March 7.—In Jefferson Canyon there is war between the hands of the U. P. and the N. P. Ry. Cos. The N. P. men jumped the location of the U. P. location and the men of the latter are determined to recover it.

Servia Wants Peace.

BELGRADE, March 7.—The regents of Servia have issued a proclamation in which they declare they will endeavor to cultivate friendly terms with all the powers and inaugurate a constitutional regime, place the finance of the country on a sound basis and maintain order.

The Panama Canal.

PARIS, March 7.—The cabinet has decided that the government will reply to the interpolation, to be submitted in the chamber, regarding the Panama canal bill, and to give details of such action until it is decided upon as to the international character of the question.

On Stanley, On.

NEW YORK, March 7.—A private letter from Bangolo, on the Congo, says Henry M. Stanley has started on his journey to rejoin Emin Pasha. He has not told his plans, except that he will not return by way of the Congo.

Abdicated.

BELGRADE, March 6.—King Milan has abdicated the throne of Servia. Crown Prince Alexander will be proclaimed king to-morrow.

A Big Newspaper.

DENVER, March 7.—The News bought one of the finest corners in Denver for \$125,000 and will put up a mammoth office.

Chehalis Booms.

CHEHALIS, N. Y. March 7.—This town is taking on a new boom because of its railway improvements.

WAR OR NO WAR.

An American Vessel Blown Up At Samoa.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 7.—The Examiner to-morrow will print, with the greatest prominence, the following telegram from Breslau, Germany: The Schleisenger Zeitung prints the following dispatch from Samoa: The German frigate Olga has bombarded Mataafa's camp.

She Saw Heaven.

COOPER, Texas, March 7.—Mrs. Charles Collins of Chapmanville was taken dangerously ill and apparently died.

Twelve hours after her supposed death Mrs. Collins showed signs of animation. Two hours later she was sitting up conversing with her friends. She related a marvelous experience. She said that her soul had left the body during her comatose state and gone straight to heaven. She saw the Savior, she said, and the wonderful magnificence of His surroundings were too wonderful to be expressed in words.

The Mormons alarmed.

OGDEN, March 7.—The Mormons are somewhat excited over a movement inaugurated in our new liberal City Council tending to rest the so-called Tabernacle Square, one of the finest blocks in the town, from the grasp of the church, which has been holding it.

More Railway Trouble.

HELENA, Mont. March 7.—There is prospect of a serious collision between the men of the U. P. and N. P. R. R. in Jefferson Canyon. Large bodies well armed on both sides are there gathered.

Badeau and Grant.

NEW YORK, March 7.—Gen. Badeau again appears before the public in connection with the life of Grant. This time it is for money from the publishers for failing to print a portion of the book.

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.

The king of Holland is reported to be dying.

Mary L. Booth, editor of Harper's Bazaar, died yesterday.

Ira Sankey is now moving on the Pacific coast—another evangelist.

Seven thousand pensioners draw pensions at the San Francisco office.

The shah of Persia has sent a complimentary cablegram to President Harrison on his inauguration.

The German papers do not think Harrison's inaugural address very friendly toward foreign powers.

The Mexican authorities at Paso del Norte are building dams in the Rio Grande river, causing erosions on the American side.

West Virginia has three governors at present, two new ones having been sworn in, while the old one refuses to vacate his office.

The present extra session of the Senate will touch upon nothing but executive business, and only a two weeks' session is anticipated.

The Dakotans sent a leather medal to Springer of Illinois for his services in connection with the admission to statehood question.

Mills, member for Annapolis, Canadian parliament, proposes that the Dominion buy up the New England states and annex them to Canada. He urges that very great dissatisfaction to the United States exists among New Englanders.
