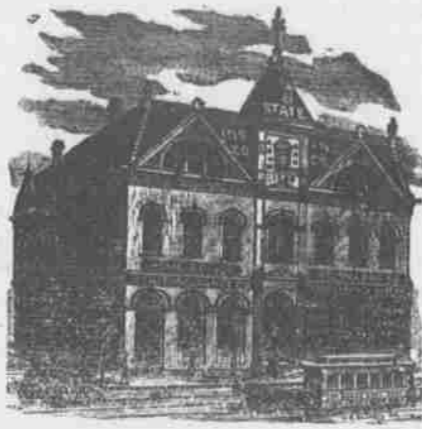

TELEGRAPHIC TIDINGS.

Important Events of the Whole World for Twenty-four Hours.

Harrison's New Plan.

HELENA, March 12.—A special, evidently inspired from headquarters, says that President Harrison has adopted an entirely different plan in the distribution of offices from that followed by his immediate predecessor. Cleveland did not take as final the recommendations of the cabinet in the matter of appointments. President Harrison is referring all office-seekers to the men who constitute his cabinet, and as far as possible he intends that the cabinet officers shall determine the men to be appointed to the various positions. This is to be the policy of the present administration. This will take from him a great deal of care and work.

The Strikers Accede.

PORTLAND, Or., March 13.—The strike on the O. R. & N. has ended. Yesterday the engineers' association held a meeting, and resolved to go to work at the old wages, the company having given a written pledge to take back all the old employees at the same wages. The pilots and mates' association also decided to return on being shown a telegram from General Manager Holcomb stating that if the company's terms were not accepted he would immediately start a crew of competent men from the East to fill their places. All the boats are running to-day.

The Cruiser Charleston.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 12.—Naval Contractor Fernald, who is superintending construction of the Charleston, said he had received no orders from the secretary of the navy, but had received a telegram from the chief of construction of the naval bureau, asking when the Charleston would be ready for trial. Mr. Fernald said the Charleston would be ready for trial in five weeks, but in case of necessity would be ready in two weeks, and her armament would be mounted in ten days additional.

The Santiam Mining Dispute.

ALBANY, Or., March 13.—In the circuit court yesterday the case of Bilyeu, Woodin, Strong & Co. vs. Dr. E. G. Smith, for possession of the Red Bull mine in the Santiam district, which was decided in favor of plaintiffs in Justice Humphrey's court and taken up to the circuit court on an appeal, was dismissed at the cost of defendant. This decision is in favor of the Albany company. The case will probably be appealed.

Some More Appointments.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—The president has sent the following nominations to the senate: Arthur C. Millett of Watertown, Dakota, to be governor of Dakota; Luther B. Richardson of Grand Forks, Dakota, secretary of Dakota; Cornelius H. Hanford of Washington Territory, chief justice of the supreme court of the territory of Washington.

The Missionaries Released.

ZANZIBAR, March 12.—The missionaries recently captured by the insurgents have been released upon the payment of \$3000. In addition to the ransom money the Germans surrendered 22 slaves who had fallen into their hands. The followers of Bushier were taken into the interior. They were secured to enter into negotiations with the Germans.

A Much-Married Man.

KANSAS CITY, March 12.—Hiram Adams, a colored deputy constable, shot and killed Samuel Patterson, a colored barber, in a quarrel over a 50-cent dice game this morning. Several hundred negroes visited Adams in his cell during the day, among them ten women, each of whom claimed to be his wife.

Only One Governor.

CHARLESTON, W. V., March 13.—The supreme court has refused the writ of mandamus of Goff. This leaves Wilson governor until the contest comes before the legislature.

We Can Whip Germany.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—Admiral Porter, who has made a very careful study of the Samoan situation from a naval standpoint, ever since the existing complications arose, is quoted as having said recently: "I have carefully investigated the stories about the Nipsic. It looks as if they were put out at the instigation of Bismark to test the sentiment of his own and our people. He has never been a friend to the United States. He will find out very promptly the temper of the American people. Of course, we are weak at present on the ocean," he continued, "but there is a plan which will meet the emergency and will badly cripple Germany while we are getting ready. No one supposes that the American people would give up the contest until Germany has received a sound drubbing."

Death by Electricity.

NEW YORK, March 13.—The final experiments were made yesterday by the New York state authorities to satisfy themselves as to the best means of executing condemned criminals by electricity.

Several dogs were killed with an alternating current at from 500 and 700 volts for ten seconds. Four calves, of approximately the weight of a man, were killed at 800 volts pressure for contacts of from fifteen to twenty seconds. An 830-pound horse then took the alternating current in the same way at 1000 volts pressure and died. In every case death was instantaneous and without a sound or a struggle.

A Salvation Army Victim.

VICTORIA, B. C., March 12.—Jennie Hamilton, one of the servants brought from Ireland some months ago by Canon Cooper, of Kamloops, was sent to the Westminster asylum to-day, having become insane through attending the meetings of the Salvation army.

"Jack the Ripper."

GRASS VALLEY, Cal., March 12.—Frequent notices posted on the outskirts of the town, signed by "Jack, the Ripper," have caused some fright among women and children in this vicinity.

Union Pacific Surveyors.

REDDING, March 12.—Sixty Union Pacific railroad surveyors are camped in town, who have been employed in surveying through the northern part of the state.

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.

Services were held in Berlin Sunday in memory of Emperor William, it being one year since his death.

No confidence is placed in the rumors from Samoa regarding a conflict between American and German gunboats.

It is said that the color line is drawn disadvantageously to the colored children in the Washington charitable institutions.

Advisers received from lower California say that poor men had better stay away, as the gold discovered is not easily mined without capital.

A ten-year-old son of Judge Smeles, of Augusta, Ga., killed one boy and wounded another Saturday with a gun that he "didn't know was loaded."

General Master Workman Powderly, of the Knights of Labor, says that Le Caron, the witness in the Parnell trial, is a villain of a more desperate dye than being simply a spy.

General satisfaction is expressed over the announcement from President Harrison that men who are residents of the territories are to be selected as the various territorial governors.
