A Case Continued.

At Albany the Lebanon bank robbery case has been continued until next term of court. This was done on an affidavit of the defendant that he had important witnesses who could not be procured at this term of court. This was a pretty smoothly planned robbery, and had the perpetrator had one more night he would have captured the coin and escaped with it. He had tunneled under the bank and removed the bottom of the "burglar proof" safe. The inside steel plate had been drilled all around, but not quite through. One hole was accidentally made. This brought the drill up into the apartment with the coin. His burglarship whittled a neat plug, blackened the end of it, and drove it up through this hole. His calculation was at fault. The plug projected an eighth of an inch and the plan was discovered. To be sure the best laid plans of mice and men "oft gang a-glee."

Another Ice Factory.

Salem is to have a second ice factory. It will be constructed and operated by Klingler & Beck, of the brewery. These gentlemen will consume a large quantity of ice in conducting their own business and they have decided to build a large refrigerator and manufacture ice for sale. They have ordered a complete outfit of machinery from San Francisco, and before many days it will have been placed in position. As there is a large territory that will be dependent upon Salem for ice, it is thought two ice manufactories will not be too many to supply the demand, which will increase as the people become accustomed to the daily use of ice.

A Great Big Sensation.

The La Grande Journal has worked up a great big sensation. It claims to have the story from reliable authority that an old pioneer named Martin Ludwig has been confined in a dungeon at Baker City for nearly ten months and recently made his escape by a door which was accidentally left unlocked; that the man was fed on scanty meals and forced to pay exorbitant bills, which bills it is claimed were found on him; that he was forced to make a will, but does not know in whose favor. It is reported that prominent citizens of Baker City are mixed up in the affair, but no names are given yet, and the whole matter is kept quiet, awaiting investigation.

Caught in the Quarantine.

Among the passengers on the steamer Columbia, upon its arrival at San Francisco from Astoria, were Mr. and Mrs. Clarke Irvine from Salem. A case of smallpox developed on the steamer on the trip and she proceeded direct to the quarantine grounds on entering San Francisco bay last Saturday evening. An effort was made yesterday to transfer the passengers of the quarantined steamer to the City of Mexico, in order that the former might dock. The passengers, however, refused to make the change, stating that they preferred to remain in the present comfortable quarters until the terms of quarantine shall expire.

The legislative board of railway commissioners is conducting a meeting this afternoon, at their room in the capitol. Knight, one of the commissioners appointed by Governor Penoyer, on the 1st of April will make a demand on the secretary of state for a warrant for his salary, and if his request is refused, as it doubtless will be, he will sue out a writ of mandamus requiring the state treasurer to pay him. The action will be begun in Judge Boise's court, and will be taken by consent of both sides to the supreme court.

Caught by the Tide.

A gentleman from Yaquina tells the Albany Herald that Conductor Kenney of the Oregon Pacific met with an exciting adventure at Yaquina, Sunday afternoon. He was hunting for water agates on the beach, and did not notice the incoming tide until the waves before and behind reminded him that the tide awaits for no one. He mounted a log next to the bluff, where he was imprisoned for about five hours, before the tide receded and he was enabled to return. What success he had at agate hunting is not stated.

Yesterday morning the plat of Boise's addition was filed with the recorder and before the shades of night had fallen six lots in this popular addition had been sold.
