A Lively Runaway.

There occurred quite a lively runaway this morning at Fisher's livery stable. A gentleman from Dallas had come inside Fisher's livery stable to unhitch and when partly done, one of the horses gave a plunge, broke loose and started around the city at a lively rate. Luckily no one was hurt and very little damage done.

A Booming Valley.

R. D. Allen, the Jefferson ferryman, is in the city looking after the project of a county bridge across the Santiam at Jefferson. He says their village has grown and improved more within the last six months than in years before. He speaks of all the valley towns as being on a good boom and thinks the future has much in store for the Willamette valley.

A Genuine Mad Stone.

J. F. Moses of Crawfordsville about 15 or 16 years ago came in possession of several mad stones, said to be genuine, which he doubted. Still their virtue has surpassed all former reports. In speaking of them, he said: "I regard it as the last act of folly for any person to die from the bite of a mad dog, snake or poisonous insect if within reach of a mad stone. I have also used them in many diseases as an experiment and have seldom failed in making a perfect cure to my delight and the relief of the sufferer."

And Still They Advertise.

The latest stroke of enterprise on the part of the Oregon land company is their publication of a 10,000-edition of eight-page folders, descriptive of Salem and the valley. Articles of Incorporation.

To-day the following articles of incorporation were filed with the secretary of state:

Farmington M. E. church, with property valued at \$500; incorporators, Jacob Holman, S. Craig and Thomas Withcombe, Jr.

Columbia river lumber and fuel company; object to buy and sell lumber, fuel, real estate, etc.; with a capital stock of \$50,000; principal office at Portland. D. J. Moore, H. B. Borthurst, C. W. Knowles and Geo. H. Durham, incorporators.

Weather Report.

During March 1889 there were 13 days on which rain fell, and an aggregate of 2.84 inches of water. There were 6 clear, 8 fair, and 17 cloudy days. The highest temperature for the month was 79° on the 26th; lowest, 35° on the 24th; mean, 57.44°.

The average precipitation for March for 20 years is 5.13 inches; for March 1889 2.84 inches, is below normal by 2.29 inches. The deficiency in the average precipitation since Jan. 1st, is 10.47 inches.

Frosts occurred on the 10th, 21st, 14th. The prevailing winds for the month were from the north during 12 days, south 13 days, southwest 6 days.

A New Way to Kill Bugs.

Alfred Sheppard of Turner has discovered a new and novel way of destroying thousands of insects, etc., that are so damaging to fruit and fruit trees. His plan, which we are informed works wonderfully, is as follows: Place a tub of strong soap suds out among the fruit trees or shrubbery and at night place a common coal oil lamp lighted, under the tub, which should be placed upon stakes about two feet from the ground. Thousands upon thousands of bugs and insects will find their way into the tub of suds, where they are destroyed. The light serves to draw them to the tub and it is really wonderful how many will accumulate during the hours of one night.

THE CITY COUNCIL.

Horses For the Fire Engines—
Petitions for Bridges.

A CITY ATTORNEY IS SELECTED.

The Routine Accounts Are Allowed—
Much General Business.

Last evening was held the regular meeting of the honorable body of the city council. The meeting was called to order with Mayor Williams in the chair and councilmen Hirsch, Farrar, Collins, Lafore, Strang, Skinner, Bush and Hutton present. Committee on ways and means (to whom had been referred the petition from the fire companies, asking the city to provide a team for each engine), reported that they had investigated the matter and found that Salem could proudly boast of as efficient fire companies as any city in the state according to its population, and were satisfied that the providing of teams as asked for would be a great help to the companies and also would serve to lessen the danger of fire. They therefore returned the petition, with their hearty approval. \$15 per month is allowed each company for incidental expenses.

Strang moved that the city pay to each company the sum of \$300 and allow them to select their own teams, harness and wagons; motion was unanimously adopted.

The street commissioner was instructed to consult with the chief of each fire company as to the best method to pursue concerning stables, etc. The street commissioner will at all times have control of the teams and will use them for any work he may have on the public streets.

Committee on ordinances reported a bill recommending the office of city attorney and defining his duties and fixing his salary, etc.

Report of committee on streets and public property, for the construction of a bridge across south Mill creek, on Church street, adopted.

Petition for bridge across south Mill creek on Capital street, was referred to committee on streets and public property.

Committee on fire and water asked for further time to report; granted.

Report of city recorder and treasurer for first quarter; read and referred to committee on accounts and current expenses.

Remonstrances, from petitions from block 10, asking that a sewer be not constructed through block 70; referred to committee on streets and public property.

Petition for an ordinance prohibiting boys or any one to carry or have in possession, a slug shot or any device similar thereto; referred to committee on fire and water.

Petitions for the construction of a sewer from the college campus to Ferry street; referred to committee on streets and public property.

Proposal for publishing of city ordinances in the new city directory for 1889; referred to committee on printing.

The bill providing for a city attorney was passed unanimously. Hutton placed in nomination G. G. Bingham and Collins, J. J. Murphy. Murphy received eight votes and Bingham one. Mayor Williams therefore declared Murphy duly elected city attorney for the ensuing year.

THE FORGER ARRESTED.

He attempts the Check Racket at Seattle and Is Captured.

The appended paragraph appeared in a Seattle paper Sunday morning, and conveys some information that will be welcome received by G. W. Johnson, the Salem clothier, who cashed a similar check for the same man a few days ago:

"A man giving the name of George Kenyon of San Francisco purchased \$150 worth of goods at the Globe clothing house to-night, and presented a \$200 draft on the Portland National bank in payment. Proprietor Cohn's suspicions were aroused, and taking the draft to a clerk, went to his bank to investigate. The draft was pronounced bogus, and on returning the clerk recognized Kenyon on the street. He gave chase, was joined by policemen and Kenyon was captured and is now locked up. He says he got the draft over a poker table last evening."

This man Kenyon is, no doubt, the same fellow that defrauded G. W. Johnson out of \$150 in a similar manner last week. Mr. Cohn is at Seattle and writes saying it is the same fellow. Cohn was here at the time the game was worked and met the swindler. Cohn has bought some land of the Oregon land company and Kenyon also was negotiating the purchase of a tract. Together, on the evening of the robbery, they went to the office of the land company, Kenyon wishing to close his negotiation. He suggested that they would have to take a check as part payment, but Mr. Cohn concluded they could do nothing until morning, as they never handle strange checks. The man went away and worked his check off on Johnson. Cohn writes from Seattle that it must be the same fellow and Mr. Johnson is happy in consequence.

HE DIED MYSTERIOUSLY.

Much Mystery Surrounds the Death of a Former Settler.

The startling announcement of the sudden death at Oakland, Cal., of W. H. Lindner, whose name has attained considerable prominence of late through his arrest on two charges of bribing electors at the Oakland city election, created great surprise among his friends.

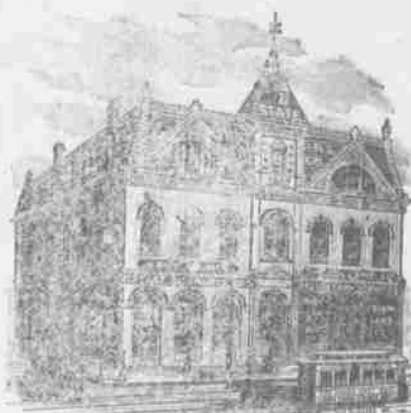
Both cases had been called and continued from time to time since the first appearance of Lindner in court. At the time of his death they stood calendar for trial April 21st. His friends say there was nothing in the charges, and that if they had come to trial they would have been promptly dismissed.

His life and death are thus commented upon by an Oakland paper: "Lindner is said to have been engaged in handling patents as a business, and visited Australia to float a poisonous vapor for the destruction of the rabbit pest in that country, securing a royalty of several thousand dollars for it, although it proved ineffectual as an exterminator. Deceased was a native of Pennsylvania, aged 48 years. His occupation on the certificate of death is given as that of inventor. He has been a resident of this state only six months. Dr. Gallaher, deceased's physician, had been in attendance upon him since February 3d, and he returns disease of the heart, as cause of death. He was a member of a Salem, Or., Lodge of Workmen. At noon on the day of his death he telegraphed to his lodge the amount of his assessment, which would have become delinquent had it not been paid that day, that day being the last day of grace, and at two o'clock he was taken seriously ill, growing worse until the hour of his death, at 7 p. m. Deceased leaves a wife and two daughters."

THE GRAND WILLAMETTE VALLEY.

Its Comparison With California—A Veritable Paradise.

A JOURNAL correspondent who is now at Oakland makes the following comparison between the Willamette valley and the land of beams. In his opinion the land "where rolls the Oregon" is excelled in no particular by California. He says: "I certainly prefer the Willamette valley to any part of the coast. Salem must become a town of great wealth and some Oregon souls in twenty years. So will Oregon City. So will Astoria."
