John Beck, who recently came to Salem and lives in the Coffey house, came near losing all by fire yesterday evening. The roof took fire from a defective flue, but as the fire was at once discovered, a few buckets of water averted serious results.

## More New Houses.

J. A. Black, a prominent banker at Bloomington, Neb., bought of Duncan & Booth yesterday two fine building lots in South Salem. Mr. Black expressed his mind by saying he fully expected to come to Salem in a short time to make it his future home. They also sold a lot in Meredith's addition to Prof. Jory, who expects to build soon.

## Confined to its Bed.

What purports to be reliable information was given out this morning from a wholly unreliable source to the effect that the Willamette river at Salem stood "twenty-two inches below low water mark." It goes on to say that if rain does not soon come navigation will be cut off. As twenty-two inches below low water mark would make the river unnavigable even for ducks, the latter clause is superfluous.

## No Grange Meeting.

Marion county Pomona grange was unable to hold the regular meeting to-day from the fact that Salem grange failed to open their hall for that purpose. We do not think this was intentional, but indicates short memory of those who hold the key. The next regular meeting of Pomona grange will be held at Aumsville on the second Thursday of May. ## Improving the River.

The government snag boat Willamette is proving herself a good boat in swift water and bad bars, which are to be found on the upper Willamette. She made the run from the mouth of the Luckiamute to Oregon City in eight hours, one stop of half an hour. Recently she ran from Albany to Corvallis in three hours, which is exceedingly good time. The Willamette draws twenty-seven inches and consumes half a cord of wood an hour.

The abstract when completed will be a voluminous one, consisting of 125 closely written pages.

## A MAMMOTH EXCURSION.

A Band Of Sixty-Two Home-Seekers Arrives at the Capital City.

There arrived in Salem yesterday evening a colony of home-seekers. There were sixty-two of them in all. They were accompanied by F. J. Strayer, traveling agent of the Oregon land company. Mr. Strayer left Salem on the sixth of January for Pennsylvania for the purpose of organizing a colony to bring to Salem. Arriving at his old home near Johnstown, Pa., he delivered lectures on the resources of Oregon and the Willamette valley, and of the advantages offered by Salem and Marion county to home-seekers. He was successful to such an extent that one week ago this morning two special cars left the little city in central Pennsylvania, destined for Salem. The six-days journey across the vast expanse of mountain, vale and river was uneventful, although very pleasant. The ceaseless panorama of the world's grandest scenery served to entertain and charm. Arriving at the capital city the party took a rest and are to-day taking in the sights of the city of promise and their future home.

In conversation with a JOURNAL reporter Mr. Strayer said that this body of men had come here with the intention of casting their lot in Oregon. It is their intention to purchase land, establish business enterprises and become bona fide citizens. They are a pleasant people, possessed of money and enterprise and animated with a desire to build their homes in a land where life is not made a burden by the obstacles attendant upon a country subject to disastrous climatic changes.

This is the largest colony of immigrants brought to this valley for many days. It is decidedly the largest one that ever left an Eastern state headed directly for Salem. The enterprise of the Oregon land company is to be commended, while the hand of citizenship is cordially extended to our prospective citizens.

## PROGRAM FOR ARBOR DAY.

Exercises That Will be Performed by The Salem Schools.

The following program of exercises will be carried out to-morrow, Friday, afternoon at the East Salem school. To these exercises all interested citizens are invited:

From one to two o'clock, exercises in the various school rooms, consisting of recitations, songs and readings by the pupils, and a special lesson by the teachers on one or more of the following subjects:

Lead the pupils to recognize and appreciate the different ways in which trees contribute to supply the necessities, the comforts and the luxuries of our lives.

To foster and develop a love for trees in respect to their beautiful forms, colors and scenic effects.

To see the necessity of a certain proportion, and proper distribution of forest land, to prevent those sudden and extreme climatic changes which produce the desolation following successive floods and long extended drought.

To exercise an intelligent observation of the trees of their own locality, having reference to utilizing native or foreign species in the best way for tree planting.

At two o'clock the teachers of the various schools will form a hollow square in the yard of the East Salem school building, under the direction of the superintendent.

The out-door exercises will consist of an address by Gaylord W. Cooke, class of 1889.
