LONDON, April 17.—Sugar opened 6d lower, but soon advanced 2s. The market is excited. It is reported that continental buyers are purchasing for American accounts.
Fatal Explosion.
VIENNA, April 17.—An explosion occurred in the Rothschild's colliery at Saffan, Austria, to-day. Two men were killed and two dangerously wounded. Six are missing.
A Mad Monkey.
PARIS, April 17.—The Princess of Sagan, noted leader of fashion, was recently bitten by a pet monkey, which has since died of hydrophobia. She is going under the care of Pasteur.
Emigrating to America.
LIVERPOOL, April 17.—A thousand emigrants embarked upon seven steamships here to-day. The majority are bound for the United States. A few are going to Argentina Republic.
Looking After Passes.
WASHINGTON, April 17.—The Interstate commerce commission this afternoon issued an order instructing a large number of railroad companies, including many of the most important lines in the United States, to appear before it and make explanations in the matter of free passes and free transportation.
Red Cloud in Washington.
WASHINGTON, April 17.—Red Cloud, the big Sioux Indian chief, called on the president this afternoon, accompanied by Agent Jordan, of the Rosebud agency. Red Cloud was attired in civilized garb. It is his custom to make a pilgrimage to Washington on the incoming of every new president, and this is the ninth time he has paid his respects to the Great Father.
The Salmon Catch.
SAN FRANCISCO, April 16.—A local paper says: From present appearances there is likely to be a scarcity of salmon this season. One of the principal reasons given for the anticipated shortage in the salmon catch this year is the fact that but little rain has fallen in the salmon districts, and that the water is too clear for fishing purposes. About 700,000 cases have already been sold and are awaiting delivery. The greater portion of this lot goes to England.
