A Big Shipment.

The Salem iron foundry to-day made a big shipment of castings to Oregon City. It was the major portion of their contract with the Willamette Falls electric company, and consisted of iron wheels, shafts, pinions, etc. The shipment weighed about three tons. It is their belief that Salem's foundry secured this contract above a dozen other bidders.

Three New Postoffices.

Three new postoffices have been established in Marion county on the daily mail route between Salem and Knight. They are Argus, at Falls City, twenty-five miles north-east of Salem, with George Lehan, postmaster; Willard, at Georville, twelve miles east of Salem, with Mary H. Sturmer, postmaster; Lewisville, eighteen miles north-east of Salem, with Samuel Lewis, postmaster.

Habitual Eggs and Easter.

Ostara was goddess of light in spring, in honor of whom a festival was celebrated in April, and now Easter day is that upon which the rest of the movable feasts depend. To mark this festival day a grand easter display fills the window of the Kandy Kitchen, where is found a well assorted stock of fine candies, nuts, fruits, etc. Cheap and fine! Yes, that is the word. Go and see.

A Still Alarm.

There was great excitement along Commercial street on the west side, between State and Court, at about eleven o'clock this morning. The cry of fire was passed quickly from mouth to mouth but no alarm was turned in. The fire companies were quickly on the spot and were directed to the photograph gallery of Miss Sperry, where a fire had caught from the flue. A stream of water immediately averted a conflagration. No damage was occasioned even from the water.

Memorial Day.

The time is approaching when steps looking to the proper observance of Decoration Day should be taken. It is trusted the citizens will lend substantial encouragement to the Grand Army organization here to enable them to observe this day on a more extensive and impressive scale than ever before in the history of the city. The observance of this day in former years has been commendable, but no effort should be spared in making the celebration this year a still greater success.

That New Brick Block.

The original intention of the projectors of the new brick block at the corner of Commercial and Chemekete was to have it a three-story one, but when the bids were opened they decided that two stories would be sufficient. The plans and specifications will be changed and new bids called for. Mr. Eldridge owns the two corner lots and says he proposes going three stories. His mind is not to be changed in the matter and his building will be three stories if the others are only one.

Oregon and Kansas.

A JOURNALIST reporter this morning had the pleasure of an interview with a gentleman who had just arrived in Salem from Arkansas City, Kansas. This gentleman had left Kansas a week ago and came direct to Salem. He says the season here is fully six weeks in advance of that in Kansas. There buds are just beginning to swell and the earliest trees are not yet in blossom. He says many of his neighbors are considerably interested in Salem, having read of it a great deal recently. Many of them will visit the coast this summer and fall, looking up homes.

Why Not in Salem?

It is reported by the newspapers that a gentleman from an eastern state is visiting the coast to investigate the prospects for the establishment of a pottery. Salem can furnish the water power, and surely with all the other resources of which she boasts can also furnish the necessary clay. This is a much needed enterprise, as it is our crockery ware is mostly shipped from Peoria, Ill., and the transportation added to the cost of manufacturing accounts for the high prices paid for crockery. Surely if the gentleman would visit the capital city he would meet with such encouragement as to bring his tour of inspection to an abrupt close.

A MIRACULOUS ESCAPE.

The Overland Express Knocks a Careless Driver Sky-High.

Just before the incoming overland express crossed Chemekete street last night and while running at a speed of about twenty miles an hour the engine gave a series of shrill whistles. This was an alarm to Henry Mann, a boy who lives east of the asylum and was returning home with his team and wagon gear. The boy was leisurely crossing the track. He heard the whistle and gave the horses a sudden snap with the lines. This had no effect other than to stop them, leaving the wagon immediately on the track. Quicker than thought the train had dashed through the wagon and shattered it into pieces. Miraculously as it may seem, the young man and the hind wheels (he having been sitting on the rear axle) were hurled about fifty feet, where they alighted together, little the worse for their aerial flight. The horses and the fore part of the wagon described a similar movement on the opposite side of the track and escaped with little damage.

The escape of horses and boy are truly miraculous and should serve as a warning. It will also result in having trains respect the city ordinance and lower their rate of speed while running through the city. Young Mann has learned a lesson which should be live five times seventeen years (his present age), he will never forget.

SOME MORE HOME SEEKERS.

Another Large Party of Immigrants Arrive in Salem.

Yesterday evening there arrived in Salem another large party of immigrants, who come here to build their homes and spend their days. There are about thirty of them in all and they are direct from Oil City, Pa. At the head of the colony is Dr. Devin of Oil City, who is general manager and pilot. They arrived in Portland several days ago and spent some time in looking around there. They had heard much of Salem, and yesterday morning found them on board the steamer Occident, ready to move on to the capital city. The boat arrived here last night about nine o'clock, and the excursionists immediately found comfortable quarters at the Chemekete.

They are a thrifty energetic people who are weary of the blighting droughts, blistering blizzards, and blistering suns of the eastern states and seek homes in the Pacific Northwest. They seem highly pleased with Salem, and will give this portion of the Willamette valley a careful investigation. It is quite probable they will purchase farms in this vicinity and abide with us.

Called to Portland.

This morning Capt. Lovell, C. Bozart and N. Davis took the train for Portland, where they were summoned to appear before the United States grand jury to testify as to the charges against William Crawford, the young colored man so long employed at the state house, and who carried the mail between the state house and the postoffice. The charges against him are that he broke open letters and took sums of money at various times, most of which he lost at gambling. The amount thought to have been taken is something near \$500, and most of this was from the state school fund. Crawford was employed under R. P. Earhart when he was secretary of state, and he continued in the service of the state until a few months ago, when he was told that his services would be dispensed with. He then left and his whereabouts at present are unknown, although it is thought, should a true bill be found against him, he will be detected and brought to justice. He is thought to be at Portland or Milwaukee now.

Another Transfer.

Yesterday evening A. T. Yeaton sold to Rev. P. S. Knight his lot and interest in the new brick block to be erected on Commercial street. Mr. Yeaton owned the south twenty-five feet of the Eldridge block. Mr. Knight intends to erect the building in connection with the block and will rent the rooms. Mr. Yeaton's only reason for selling was that the upstairs rooms would not suit his furniture business and on that account only was he induced to sell. Mr. Yeaton informed a JOURNALIST reporter this morning that should he find a suitable site he will erect a building designed especially for his business, as at his present quarters he has not half the room he requires.

Don't Be Discouraged.

It is to be regretted on account of the capital city bank, under whose auspices the Quintet club was to appear last night, that more tickets were not sold, that more tickets were not sold for the entertainment. Salem's citizens take pleasure in patronizing the band boys, but this attraction was one which would not draw two good houses the same season. Should the band have a new attraction they would be liberally supported.

OCCIDENTAL JOYRIDERS.

The annual conference of the M. E. church South will be held in Dallas on June 12th.

A Colorado bar who is running a newspaper, surrounded by carous and chilled by snow, writes thus: "Hundreds of people in Oregon are in a starving condition. So many have emigrated to that country this spring that everything is overdone, work cannot be had for half the population; out of money and no labor for them, they are idle and hungry."

Seattle & Deane have commenced suit in the United States circuit court against the Oregon Pacific railroad company to recover the sum of \$111,250.02 with interest from January 15, 1890, and costs and disbursements. They allege a contract to build fourteen miles of railroad for which they were to receive according to the terms of the contract \$203,945.75, only \$92,692.12 of which has been paid, leaving \$111,253.62 due.

A Baker City paper gives some good advice to its citizens with respect to new comers who seek homes. It reminds them that new comers who seek homes form a poor idea of land conveniences when they are treated as if they are only strangers, who shall be plundered. If one treats homeseekers well, harnesses up his team and drives him around to where he can take land, an impression is created in favor of the country and its people.

He Will not Ignore.

In Salem there is no business man who, through superstition, fully or some other like cause, will insure neither his goods nor his life. He thinks the plan is a mistake, one, and that if his store should chance to be consumed by flames that it would be his loss. He has been induced. It does seem strange that in this day and age of the world there are those who do not believe in taking advantage of the complete protection afforded them by reliable insurance companies. It is not unusual to find a man whose superstition will not permit him insuring his life for the benefit of his family. But when such men extend to the insurance of property it seems they have gone too far.

Another Brass Band.

As announced last week, the students of the Willamette University are organizing a brass band. Subscription papers are now in circulation and already nearly \$450 has been subscribed by the business men, citizens and professors of Salem. The instruments, which will cost about \$300, will be purchased in Portland soon, and the band will start in under auspices the most favorable. The instruments and uniforms are to remain the property of the university band, and when one member leaves school or the band he relinquishes all claim. In this way the instruments are insured careful treatment and the university will ever be able to boast of a good musical organization.

Gave Himself Up.

Robert Krebs, who has been traveling over Eastern Washington, the Sound country and Alaska, the past few months, arrived at Brooks a few days ago. He understood he was wanted at Salem and came to the city yesterday when the warrants were served. He gave bonds for his appearance Tuesday next before Justice Chase. Krebs is charged with having carried concealed weapons and with having unlawfully killed a dog. This trouble is but the outgrowth of the Gervais scrape of last Christmas.

Folk's New Court House.

The usual large crowd congregated at Dallas yesterday to hear the decision on the court house question. The court decided to have the canvass of votes made before them, which is now in progress. Both sides are in earnest in their work, and it is thought a final and satisfactory decision will be reached by to-morrow evening.

The Board Returns.

Governor Penney, Secretary McBride and Superintendent McElroy have returned from Lafayette, where they went to view a site for the reform school. No decision has been reached yet. They will look still farther. In the meantime Salem will select her element location, when the board will view before many days.

A Peculiar Hallucination.

John Hunt, the aged New Englander who was placed in the asylum yesterday, is possessed of a peculiar hallucination. He is off times wild and imagines he owns thousands of head of stock, consisting principally of rabbits, wolves, wild geese and such wild animals.

Over Next Time.

The Occident delivered at the O. R. & N. wharf last night something over ninety tons of freight for Salem. Among the freight was the balance of the street railway iron and two fine threshing machines for Downing and Lake.
