Yesterday the poolers were around soliciting their old customers, saying that they would reduce the prices on meats to what they were before the pool was formed. A Robbery at McCoy.

At McCoy on Monday a little robbery was committed but the intruders were captured and the money refunded. A couple of small boys aged ten and eleven broke into a Chinaman's house and stole about \$10, and started on foot to leave the country. They were captured yesterday at Ballston and brought back home. They had spent very little of the money, and as it was returned to the grieving pig tail, he was satisfied to let it go without prosecuting the young culprits.

Lost His Wallet.

Yesterday a party of three land-seekers from Wisconsin were looking over Salem. They were Germans and had stopped the night before at Gervais. They were taken out yesterday by the Oregon land company, and when several miles in the country John Fortier, one of the men, happened to remember that he had left his purse, containing several hundred dollars, under the pillow at the Gervais hotel. He returned to the city at once and telegraphed. The purse had been discovered by the landlady and was forwarded by last night's express, and Mr. Fortier went on to Albany and Eugene in a much happier frame of mind. He will return to Salem in a few days.

A Horticultural Bulletin.

The recently appointed State board of horticulture, of which R. S. Wallace is treasurer and member from second district, has issued Bulletin No. 1. The necessity for immediate action in battling with the obnoxious pests that have already secured so strong a hold in many of the orchards of Oregon, prompts the State board of Horticulture, created by the last legislature, to issue its first act toward carrying out the object for which it has been created. It is the desire of the board to do all they can in accomplishing the results sought in the enactment of the law creating them, and to this end they bespeak the co-operation of every person interested in horticulture in Oregon. The secretary desires to secure the name of every fruit grower in Oregon, and to this end requests that every one to whom this knowledge shall come, will send him his name and postoffice address. He also desires that all shall write to him freely relative to their experience in combating these common enemies of the orchardist, for it is only by interchange of experience that the best results can be obtained. The board will issue other bulletins at an early day.

The former is now on trial and a decision is expected by four o'clock. On one of the latter charges he was acquitted. The other will be tried at once upon the ending of the dog case.
