The Cultivation Church.

It is the intention to secure a convenient site and at an early day proceed with the erection of a substantial church edifice.

A Pressed Brick Factory.
This morning Murphy & May commenced operations in their mill for the manufacture of pressed brick. Their yard is located immediately south of the fair grounds and they have machinery capable of turning out 200,000 brick each month. This is quite an important industry and will give employment to a dozen men. It is expected that they will be running at full capacity within a few days and in thirty days they will have 100,000 brick ready for use.

Likes the Valley.
The editor of the Drain Echo was in the valley this week. He returned home and wrote: "We were in the Willamette valley last week, and while there is no wild 'boom' there is everywhere visible prominent signs of great prosperity. New people with capital, enterprise and push are seeking that magnificent valley in which to build up new homes, and introduce new systems of industry that will cause that fair Oregon land to blossom as the rose."

TO ADVERTISE SALEM.

The Board of Trade to Consider It in Special Meeting.

The Salem board of trade is called to meet this evening in special session for the purpose of taking action on the subject of advertising Salem and furthering her railway interests. Also for the timely consideration of many other matters of vital importance to Salem which may properly come before the meeting.

It is particularly urged that the meeting to-night be liberally attended as there is much that ought to be done for the good of the capital city. The city is now receiving a good healthy immigration—men who come here to live and labor—and the matters for discussion this evening are in their interest. While no boom is expected or even desired here, yet there is a healthy advance in real estate values, an increased activity in sales and a general new life infused all around. That this condition may be continued and that new enterprises may be established and industries encouraged this meeting is called. Turn out, members of the board!

Mr. Coffey's Case.

The indictment against Bartholomew Coffey charges that on the 20th of last September the agent had under his control, \$300 in cash, of public money, and on that day he converted it to his own use by fraudulent means, the whole amount. On the 21st of October following, he had \$100 of public money in his charge, and appropriated \$10 to his personal benefit. November 19th he had \$200 in cash and took the whole amount. November 30 following, he took \$90 more, and on September 30, 1887, having \$300 of government money, he kept \$142 in his own pocket.

It appears from statements made by the Indian interpreter, John McBean, that the agent purported to have purchased various amounts of wood and hay, while in reality the transactions were fictitious and served only as a ruse whereby Coffey could charge the government with certain amounts which virtually would be placed to his credit. The bookkeeper has also been indicted and the outcome is looked forward to with much interest.

Prunes.

The cultivation of the prune is a profitable branch of horticulture. The trees are heavy bearers. The silver prune, and petite prune d'Agen (French prune) are two of the best varieties. It is claimed that this branch of fruit-growing will be more profitable than any other kind in the future. Fifty pounds of dried prunes would be a very low estimate for a full bearing prune tree. As a rule they are planted twenty feet apart or 108 trees to the acre; that would give 5,400 pounds to the acre, which are worth eight cents a pound. Reduce the price to the low figure of five cents per pound which will give the producer a gross profit of \$270 per acre, and the work is light compared with general farming. In 1887 there were imported into the United States 64,985,345 pounds of dried prunes. When skill and care are brought to bear in picking, drying and packing, our prunes will be the favorite in the eastern markets over all foreign competitors.

A Marion County Man Suicides.
At Portland at nine o'clock yesterday morning, John Dunagan, aged twenty-nine years, a blacksmith employed in the North Pacific lumber mills, while crazed with drink, shot himself through the left side, with a forty-four caliber Winchester rifle, inflicting a wound from which he expired shortly after. The deceased formerly resided at Gervais in this county, where he carried on a general blacksmithing business. Two years ago he left Gervais, being a very hard drinker, and his business having failed. Sunday he was in Gervais and was very blue at the outlook for his future and that of his family. After returning to Portland he continued drinking until the climax was reached as recorded above. His parents and his wife's relatives reside near Silverton, and are shocked at his suicide.

Articles of Incorporation.
The Oak Grove and Juniper Flat ditch company filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state to-day. Their object is to convey water from White river or other streams or bodies of water, through the farming and grazing lands of Oak Grove and Juniper Flat and vicinity for irrigation, stock, domestic and mill purposes. The capital stock is \$15,000; incorporators, J. Stein, Hampton Kelley, William McD. Lewis, Henry Darwich and Basil Delow. Principal office will be located at Wapinitia, Wasco county.

The Youthful Forgers.
Willis Jordan and Jack Morgan, the young men who passed a forged order for two suits of clothes on G. W. Johnson, are having their preliminary examination before Recorder Conn this afternoon.

Changes Hands Again.

The Emerson restaurant on Commercial street, owned by A. I. Mays, has changed hands. Mr. Mays has sold out to Mr. McIntire, well known in the city. The new proprietor takes charge the first of the month.

A Mad Bull.

Mr. Putnam, who lives just over the river in Polk county, was the loser a few days ago of a valuable horse, under very peculiar circumstances. It was in the pasture with an immense bull, when the latter became enraged and making frantic rushes at the horse gored it to death.

A Special Train.

To accommodate those wishing to visit Portland to attend the centennial celebration on April 30th, a special train will be run on April 30th, leaving Eugene at 4 a. m. and keeping 15 minutes ahead of the schedule time of the overland train. Excursion tickets will be on sale from April 29th to 30th. These tickets will be good to return until May 2d.

The Capital Saloon Man Arrested.
This morning Wm. Schroeder, proprietor of the now famous Capital saloon, was arrested on information made by E. J. Schermerhorn. The charge is that Schroeder permitted Claud Strahan, a minor, to frequent his saloon. Schroeder gave bonds in sum of \$50 for his appearance at nine a. m. to-morrow before Justice Goodell for preliminary examination. Schermerhorn is the man who had Frank Starr arrested.

A Child Lays Glass.

Wednesday evening while unobserved by his mother, the little three year old child of R. B. Duncan, the real estate man, by some means got in its possession some ground glass, which it began to eat. Quite a quantity had been devoured by the child before noticed. The little one was taken very sick soon after. Medical aid was at once summoned and remedies administered, but this evening the child is lying in a most critical condition.
