The Governor's Proclamation.

Inasmuch as the centennial anniversary of the inauguration of George Washington as first president of the United States will occur on the 29th day of April, Anno Domini, 1889, which day has been set apart by an act of congress as a general holiday for the people of the whole country.

Now therefore, I, Sylvester Penney, governor of Oregon, by virtue of the authority conferred upon me by the constitution of the state, do hereby declare the aforesaid Tuesday, April 30th, 1889, to be a legal holiday, and I do request that it shall be so observed by the good people of this commonwealth. And, inasmuch as the impressive act of inauguration, which occurred at noon, was preceded at 6 o'clock in the morning by prayer in all the churches of the city, for God's blessing upon the government to be instituted, I would further request, in absolute forbearance, that a worthy example, that prayers shall be held at nine o'clock in the morning of such holiday in all our churches to the end that the blessings of God may be vouchsafed to our government for all time. In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the state to be affixed, this 26th day of April, A. D. 1889.

GEORGE FRANCIS TRAIN proposes to abolish poverty and death by showing that a man can live on ten cents' worth of potatoes and one cup of coffee daily, provided he takes a Turkish bath. He is putting this idea to a practical test, having lived for the last six days on this diet. He has, however, lost two pounds of flesh daily.

In speaking of the reform school Governor Penney said: "I think that if managed properly it will be an essential and indispensable institution. There are a number of young boys in the penitentiary who should have different associations, if possible. Their wayward tendencies could be better checked in a reform school than in a penal institution."

An excellent general idea of the topography of the Emerald Isle was once suggested by a writer who likened it to a terraqueous trencher, rhomboidal in form, the circle inscribed. Within its lozenge-shaped parallelogram comprising a vast field of limestone, the mountains of granite, clay-slate and quartz, of the island being found outside the described circle in the rim of this "terraqeous trencher."

There appeared recently in a small weekly paper published in North Carolina what purported to be an interview with ex-President Cleveland, in which he was alleged to have said that he would not accept the democratic nomination for the presidency in 1892, and that his public life was at an end.

To a member of the editorial staff of a Charleston, S. C., paper who forwarded the article contained in the North Carolina paper, Cleveland has written a letter, in which he says:

"I think it very unprofitable to attempt to correct errors and misrepresentations of newspaper interviews, and in reply to your letter as to whether the alleged interview correctly represents what I said I will content myself with the statement that the report of the interview which I was en route to Florida is very inaccurate and misleading."

The largest electric railway system in the world was put in operation in Topeka, Kan., last week. The plant has been established at a cost of \$600,000. There are sixteen and a half miles of track in the system. Richmond, Va., has for some time claimed the largest plant, but it only operates twelve miles. A speed of fifteen miles an hour can be easily attained, but Topeka only permits a maximum rate of eight miles. The cars are lighted by electricity, and make comparatively little noise in motion.

M. M. HUSSEY of Menlo Park has recently made a peculiar balance wheel, suitable for an electric watch. The wheel has been completed, and it was exactly the thing that Mr. Hussey has long wanted. Mr. Hussey said that he was a friend of Edison, and for eleven years had seen experimenting on clocks and watches, with the idea of running them by electricity. The motor or watches is in a metallic case, which is about an inch long and is attached to the watch by a chain, which may be of any metal, but which is so constructed as to carry the current. The motor, it is said, will not need to be charged more than once a year. It is thought the invention will prove of much value.

MR. McLEALIN of Willhoit believes he has contrived a contrivance that will separate gold dust from black sand. It is a thing that has the appearance of a fanning mill. Numerous attempts have been made by persons of a mechanical turn to invent a machine that would gather the many millions of dollars out of the billions of tons of black sand. N. L. Rober of Corvallis claims his invention solves the problem. His machine forces the sand through a vat containing 500 to 600 pounds of mercury. The mercury catches the gold. Whoever hits upon the bright idea how to rake up the little sparkling flakes of gold should form a "black sand trust" right away.—Reveille.

About Sleep.

Everett Hale says that his own rule is to devote nine hours of the twenty-four to sleep. While this intellectually and physically strong man finds this amount necessary for the preservation of his health, multitudes show their ignorance of hygienic laws by declaring, with evident pride, that they take but five or six hours, and indeed sometimes less. When, however, it is understood that nature demands that one-third of life be passed in sleep, their error, or ignorance, becomes apparent. It is not sufficient that eight hours out of the twenty-four be passed in bed simply, but the requirement is this amount of sound, refreshing, tranquil sleep, else, as a rule, health cannot be maintained. The following is from the Boston Journal of Health:

The amount of sleep necessary depends upon the habits and health of the individual; it should not be less than seven, and need not be more than nine hours. If profound and unbroken, less is required. The quantity must depend upon the facility with which the nervous system is restored. The most refreshing repose is that which is entered quietly and seems to have passed quickly. By discipline a certain control over the mind is acquired and sleep can be summoned at will. It is proof of a disordered brain if this cannot be accomplished.

Archbishop Gross.

Archbishop Gross of Oregon, one of the most learned divines and eloquent pulpits orators of the Catholic church, will deliver a lecture in Exposition hall, St. Louis, Mo., Saturday evening, May 5, on "A Phrase in Woman's History." In speaking of him the Republic says: "Archbishop Gross is of German-Irish descent, a native of Baltimore. He was ordained to the priesthood by the venerable Archbishop Kenrick, and was engaged for several years in missionary work. After serving in this field for several years, he joined the Redemptorist order, and rose by successive steps to the position of Superior. At the Third Plenary Council of Baltimore, held in 1880, the prelate received marked attention and was appointed as Archbishop of the See of Oregon, to succeed Archbishop Segher. The Catholic Knights No. 447 have general charge of the reception of the Archbishop, under whose auspices he will deliver what promises to be the lecture of the year."
