The Governor's Proclamation.

Inasmuch as the centennial anniversary of the inauguration of George Washington as first president of the United States will occur on the 30th day of April, Anno Domini, 1889, which day has been set apart for an act of congress as the whole general holiday for the people of the whole country.

Now therefore, I, Sylvester Penoyer, governor of Oregon, by virtue of the authority conferred upon me by the constitution of the state, do hereby declare the aforesaid Tuesday, April 30th, 1889, to be a legal holiday; and I do request that it shall be so observed by the good people of this commonwealth. And, inasmuch as the impressive act of inauguration, which occurred at noon, was presided at in the morning by prayer in all the churches of the city, for God's blessing upon the government to be instituted, I would further request, in obedience to a worthy example, but prayers shall be held at nine o'clock in the morning of the holiday in all our churches to the end that the blessings of God may be vouchsafed to our government for all time.

SECRETARY HALFORD says there is no truth in the stories of the president's ill-health. In an interview he said "There are those, of course, when President Harrison is worried, which by the office-distributing system is but natural. Everybody who has a great deal of business to transact suffers more or less from worry." He had known the president for twenty years, and Mr. Harrison's health was never better than it is now.

A STRANGE historical discovery was made in a cave on the Red river, in Montague county, Texas, a few days ago. They found a yellow, faded manuscript which they could not decipher. The find caused a sensation in the county, and the manuscript was inspected by a score of men, but no one could translate it. A Latin scholar was finally found, who, after hard work, furnished a rough translation. The letter purported to be written by Don Pedro Marquez, and was dated October 29, 1542. It set forth that, in obedience to the orders of his Imperial Majesty, Charles V, an expedition was sent to rescue De Soto and his friends. The expedition landed in the New World on April 27th. It was composed of 114 men. They traveled until they were 200 miles southeast of the cave, when the Indians killed sixty-three men.

A COMMITTEE of congress has reported favorably a bill appropriating \$150,000 for the purpose of building an air ship as described in the patent of Arthur de Bausset. De Bausset's theory is the same as that on which a steel steam ship is built, which is that if the vessel is lighter than the water it displaces it will float. So too, if a vessel can be constructed that will displace air weighing more than its weight of air, it will rise till it reaches the level where the air is just heavy enough to float it. Nothing can be built that would be lighter than the air it displaces, but practically the same effect can be produced by removing from a lightly built structure more than its weight of air, or in other words, by creating a vacuum. That is to say, the weight of a hollow body consists of two parts, first, the weight of the material forming the shell, and secondly, the weight of the air contained in the shell. Now, if enough of the air can be removed, that is, if a sufficiently large vacuum can be created, the vessel will displace more air than it weighs, and will rise. De Bausset proposes to build a strong steel shell of sufficient strength to resist atmospheric pressure from without after the air has been removed from the interior.

WANAMAKER, speaking of the probability of one cent postage in the near future, says: "I think it is much more important to improve the postal service first. I think the service can be made better. After that is accomplished, it will be time to talk about one-cent postage. I am in favor of it. I think it can be done, and that it will come in time. I hope to reach this subject practically some day."

JAMES BREWSTER, a healthy young mechanic of Seattle, is certainly a dangerous rival to the famous Dr. Tanner as a fester, only that Brewster's fasting is second nature to him. He is a rough carpenter, and does general out-door work and in appearance is a picture of robust health. He does not average more than one meal a week and has not for two years past averaged more than that number. About once a week, and sometimes twice, he feels violently hungry, and it seems as if he could not eat enough, but a few mouthfuls suffice and all of his cravings disappear.

WHEN a man like Claus Spreckles makes an agreement it can be relied on. To an interview a few days ago he stated that the best sugar company which he has just organized with a capital of \$5,000,000, will build in different parts of California ten factories to cost \$500,000 each. The manner in which Mr. Spreckles has entered into the best sugar industry shows he has unlimited confidence in it, and the farmers cannot do better than to give the culture of saccharine root some attention. Experimental efforts with the beet in Washington were attended with great success, and there is no doubt but that the beet in this section is inferior to none in the world for that purpose.

THE establishment of free cooking schools in San Francisco is being organized, the women of Milwaukee are endeavoring to engrave education in cooking upon the local public school system, and in Washington, D.C., rudimentary instruction is being given in the public schools in the art of proper cooking. Assuredly this is a progressive age.

The idea of making instruction in cooking part and parcel of the public school system appears to be the best one. Parents consider it necessary to send their children to school, while they would not to a cooking school. Consequently only the children of wise and far-seeing parents would profit by the latter, while the former would be for all.

MAYOR DYER of Guthrie, Oklahoma, announces that his policy will be reform, and at a meeting of the city council a resolution was adopted ordering shell workers to leave town. These pursued their avocation on both sides of Main street from the depot to the land office, and realized immense sums, many making as much as \$500 daily. The condition of the people has been somewhat ameliorated by the sinking of two wells which yield plenty of good water. A large number of men are wandering about seeking claims or employment, neither of which can be had. Supplies are coming in abundantly and prices are somewhat lower.
