LATEST BY TELEGRAPH.

Snow at Virginia City.
VIRGINIA CITY, Nev., May 5.—Snow fell here last night to the depth of eight inches, and to-day the streets are filled with sleighing parties.

Election Law Passed.
ST. LOUIS, May 4.—The Australian election law, with modifications to suit the different localities, has been adopted by both houses of the Missouri legislature, and now awaits the governor's signature.

Serious Collision.
JAMESTOWN, Dak., May 5.—The first section of the Northern Pacific west-bound limited passenger train collided this morning with a freight thirty-six miles west. The firemen and engineers of both trains jumped.

Coming to Oregon.
SAN FRANCISCO, May 5.—The West bound travel on the Central and Southern overland routes is very light at present. Few people, compared with the numbers going into the Northwest are coming by these routes to California this season.

Snow in California.
TRUCKEE, Cal., May 5.—It has been snowing constantly since yesterday afternoon. Two feet has fallen at Truckee and three at the Summit. Snow plows are running for the first time this winter. All wires are down east. It is the heaviest storm of the season.

Leaving Oklahoma.
OKLAHOMA CITY, I. T., May 5.—Five men in their coffins and a maul in irons were carried north from this infant city yesterday. The dead men had died natural deaths, that is to say, nature had given way under the hardships encountered, and none of the five deaths were directly at the hands of fellow men.

The Latest Fad.
NEW YORK, May 4.—James Waterbury gave a circus entertainment last evening at Baychester, which has caused much excitement for past weeks among the "four hundred." A train of nine drawingroom cars, filled with a brilliant throng of lovely women, and more or less known men, pulled out of the Grand Central depot.

At Baychester they drove to Waterbury's private residence and entered. The tent was almost large enough for Barnum's circus.

Killed by a Negro.
MEMPHIS, Tenn., May 5.—At Covington, Tipton county, last night, Mayor Douglas and a posse of ten went to the house of Henry Donaldson, a negro, with a warrant of arrest on a charge of assault. When a demand was made for Donaldson to open the door he fired through the door, killing Mayor Douglas instantly. The remainder of the posse retreated and the negro made his escape.

Train Lectures.
NEW YORK, May 5.—George Francis Train, who has been fasting sixteen days, delivered one of his characteristic lectures at the Union Square theatre this evening to a fair sized audience. He was dressed in a queer, ancient style suit. The speaker explained that his other clothes did not fit him. There was no particular connection in his remarks, but some of his points were aimed at the late great celebration in this city, which he called a fizzle.

Inhuman Punishment.
HELENA, Mont., May 5.—Arlee, the venerable chief of the Flathead tribe of Indians, came in yesterday and made serious complaint against the management of affairs under the administration of Agent Roman, who has been in charge of the reservation for a long number of years, objecting to the methods of punishment employed. He made complaint about these things some months ago, but the same inhuman forms of punishment seem to be still in vogue.

According to his statements only last week an Indian who broke jail was hung up by his hands and kept there for forty-eight hours. An Indian woman who is supposed to have deserted her husband and given 120 lashes, is now lying in a precarious condition and her recovery is extremely doubtful. Chief Arlee wants all offenders to be justly punished, but not in this inhuman and barbaric custom of 400 years ago. He wants them punished just as white people are punished, no more and no less.

Pacific Coast Prunes.
SAN FRANCISCO, May 5.—The following special is received here from New York. What the item states, however, in regard to California prunes, may very well be said of Oregon's. The writer has seen in New York as fine, if not finer, quality of prunes from the latter state as from the former. Following is the item:

Interest in California prunes has recently become keen, owing to the arrival of several parcels prepared and packed in fancy French styles. The result of the experiment is most satisfactory, the prunes arriving in a remarkably fine state of preservation. No fermentation, mold or other ill effects of heat were noticeable. Samples of the fruit which arrived first are still in as good state of preservation as when opened, and there is no sign of a tendency to become candied, which is so detrimental to the French article at this season of the year. The Tribune reporters saw several members of the trade and learned that the general opinion after these tests or experiments was that California prunes rank as first quality, but the quantity would come in due season. California has given the fruit trade of New York several surprises during the past few years but this one is the greatest, especially as the California product is now selling at three-quarters of a cent a pound higher than the French article.

Portland Poets.
PORTLAND, May 6.—Lillie May Olsen, the little 5-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Olsen, who was shot in the head Thursday forenoon, died yesterday morning at 20 minutes to 6 o'clock.

A special train bearing Dr. Seward and party, who have been journeying across the continent precisely a month, rolled into East Portland from San Francisco at 8:30 yesterday morning. A few hours later the train was sidetracked near the Northern Pacific depot on this side, and at 6 o'clock last evening, pulled out for the Sound.

Ground will be broken on Spring street to-day for the cable railway, weather permitting. G. W. Lynch, general manager, says he expects to put fifty men to work this week, and that the work will move right along to completion. The great bulk of the material for the hill work is on hand, which is the reason why work is commenced on that part of the line first.

When the Coloma was made fast at the D street wharf Saturday evening, Capt. Allen M. Noyes had completed his twentieth trip to China. His handsome bark, after her trip of 13,000 miles, looks as bright and clean as a new dollar. The Coloma crossed out over the bar November 2 and crossed in May 2, her voyage having occupied just six months to a day.

Jay Gould's Opinion.
NEW YORK, May 5.—Jay Gould was asked if he regards the accumulation of wealth itself as dangerous. He replied: "On the contrary, so long as the money is kept in the country I regard its concentration in certain localities or in the hands of individuals as of the greatest benefit to the nation. Where men accumulate fortunes and take the money out of the country it is a serious injury, but the corporation which creates capital that is to remain here, and keeps in motion our circulating medium, is a benefit to the whole country."

Railroad Committee.
NEW YORK, May 4.—The senate committee to sift the question of the Canadian Colonial-American railroads and diversions of the American traffic over the Canadian lines, met this morning, but adjourned until Monday without having accomplished anything.

At the noon hour they started off to a restaurant to eat dinner where they could get it for twenty-five cents. These are a few of the reasons why the Chemekete charges fifty cents for single meals. But remember this gives you the freedom of parlors, reading rooms, writing material, lobby, washrooms, closets, etc. Consider these things before hastily deciding that fifty cents is robbery for a single meal when a good one can be had at a restaurant for two bits. d-c-w.

The Railroad Commissioners.
The board of railroad commissioners created by the late legislature is in session to-day in their chamber at the state house and are striving to bring the railroads to justice toward the public. They have received rates for both passenger and freight traffic on the following roads: O. R. & N., Southern and Northern Pacific and the Oregon Pacific. The rates are the usual ones and will be of no special benefit to the board unless the roads decide to raise them, when the board will try and assert their power.

The commissioners go to Portland to-morrow to investigate the overcharges claimed for the transfer of cars over the O. R. & N. railroad bridge at that place. The board has received complaints in regard to the matter, and intends to thoroughly investigate the matter.

They will also look into the cause of the accident by which a man was killed in the switch yards at Portland about three weeks ago. The law in regard to this matter makes it the duty of the board to investigate all deaths by railroad accident within the borders of the state, and they will determine as to whether it was by the will or the company's carelessness that he was killed.

They expect also to use their power with regard to the fast running of trains through cities. There are present to-day, Commissioners Colvig, Far and Clow and Secretary Waggoner.
