LATEST BY TELEGRAPH.

An Inhuman Brute.

PORTLAND, May 12.-Frank Jarvis, a brute, of Rooster Rock, charged by his married daughter, Mrs. D. W. Ross, with the crime of incest, had a brief preliminary hearing before Justice Tuttle. The prosecuting witness, a frail little woman with an honest looking face, was accompanied by her husband and her three weeks old babe. Mrs. Ross related the history of the revolting details of the crime, and during the recital she was weeping the greater part of the time. The story the poor little woman told was a fearful one, and every one in the court room that had a view of her face was satisfied that she was telling the horrible truth. The defendant was not placed on the stand, but he was bound over to appear before the grand jury, with his bonds fixed at \$5,000, which he was not able to furnish.

Portland Paragraphs.

PORTLAND, May 13.-During the past week the Portland cable railway company has had a force of fifty men engaged in the work of excavating on their line to the Heights, and it is understood to be their intention to double the force at once, and crowd the work as fast as possible.

The funeral of Emil Weber, the dead gambler, was held yesterday afternoon. A crowd began to congregate and half an hour before the time set for the funeral, and at the end of the services at least 500 people passed through the room to look at the remains.

The pioneers' reunion will be held on Tuesday, June 18. Arrangements are being perfected which promise the best reunion ever yet held. The board of directors last fall selected William Kapus, John McCracken, D. P. Thompson, W. M. Ladd and Charles W. Knowles as a committee of arrangements.

While the work has been going on quietly, it may be depended upon that no fear need be entertained of anything like a failure.

A Terrible Tragedy.

KANSAS CITY, May 12.-A terrible tragedy occurred in Justice Lewis' court this afternoon at the trial of a man named Smith on the charge of burglary. Detective Gilley, who caused his arrest and was prosecuting witness, was seated near when Smith suddenly jumped on him, plunged a knife into his throat, almost severing his head from his body. Smith then attacked Officer Malone, cutting him in the leg. Gilley staggered back, drew a revolver and commenced firing, putting three shots into Smith. Malone fired also, and Smith fell dead with five bullets in his body. Smith had been in jail three weeks. He is supposed to have secured the knife from his partner, named Lavin, who was in the court room during the trial, but escaped in the general confusion.

Gold in Dakota.

DEADWOOD, Dak., May 11.-Great excitement prevails, caused by the discovery of new and rich placer diggings about forty miles from here. Prospecting these diggings last year on a small scale showed gold in quantities, which was kept quiet, but on renewing work this spring the secret got out, and now men are rushing to the gold fields from all directions, on foot, horseback and in teams, taking up provisions and a complete mining outfit. All in a rush. Parties from the diggings returning for provisions and supplies, show plenty of gold dust, and state that the diggings are extensive, and worth sixty or seventy cents to the pan.

Jeff Davis Makes Reply.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., May 12.-The Nashville American publishes a letter from Jefferson Davis, replying to an article by Lord Wolesley in the North American Review. Davis denies strongly Wolesley's charges of incompetency against himself and cites proof to show that he did all possible to secure arms and war material for the confederacy. The letter was written in response to a request from the editor of the American.

Fish a Free Man.

AUBURN, N. Y., May 11.-James D. Fish, of the defunct firm of Ward & Co. and ex-president of the Marine bank of New York, left his prison this morning, and drove in great speed to a station several miles distant to avoid the crowd.

A Race War.

NEW ORLEANS, May 12.-As a result of the fight between some negroes and whites last Tuesday at Gretna, in which two men were seriously injured, trouble has since been brewing, which culminated today in a serious outbreak.

This morning a fire broke out in the engine house of the colored fire company, and the colored militia company's arsenal, adjoining, was burned also. A large crowd of whites and negroes gathered, and a delegation of the Gretna militia (white) went to the scene.

Several negroes refused to leave the burning building, until they were in danger, alleging that they were afraid to face the whites. When they finally came out, a fight ensued and some of the whites fired, seriously wounding three negroes.

All the time the fire was spreading, and several houses were destroyed, the flames finally dying out for want of fuel.

During the conflagration a number of white men, armed with shot-guns and rifles, congregated around the scene, and prevented any negro from coming within 100 yards of the fire. After the fire was over armed squads of whites scattered around town and entered a number of negro cabins, ostensibly in search of arms.

A reign of terror prevails among the negroes, and colored women and children have been leaving Gretna all day for this city, taking with them such effects as they could carry.

Cable Road Accident.

SEATTLE, W. T., May 12.-This afternoon a terrible accident occurred on the Front street cable road, on the corner of Pine and Second streets. As dummy No. 2 came down the Second street hill the brake refused to work. The car obtained great momentum and in making the turn into Pine street the passengers on the left side were thrown off.

Among them were Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Wagner of Chadro, Neb., with two children. Mrs. Sophronia Wagner had her 3-year-old child Pleny in her lap, and when thrown off struck on her head and neck. She was picked up and carried to the Griffith house, but expired before reaching the house. Her oldest child, Almo, aged five, received severe scalp wounds. The other child and the husband escaped uninjured.

Another Bank Robbery.

FOREST CITY, Mo., May 12.-A bold day-light bank robbery, after the style of the recent Denver successful robbery, was enacted in the Frazer & McDonald bank here yesterday afternoon. Two men rode up to the bank, tied their saddle horses and entered the bank. At the point of cold steel they forced the cashier, Cave Hunt, to hand over the cash. They succeeded in taking \$5,000 with them. They backed out of the bank, mounted their steeds and sped away. An armed posse was soon in pursuit. Sheriff Frame was telephoned to at Oregon, the county seat, and joined in the chase, with an armed squad.

Counterfeiters at Helena.

HELENA, Mont., May 12.-This city is infested with a gang of burglars, shoplifters and passers of counterfeit money. The shoplifters are bold, doing their work in daytime. Three are under arrest, and the police are on the track of others. Most of the counterfeit money is ten-dollar bills, made in 1875, bearing the signature of John Allison, register of the treasury, and John C. New, treasurer, and numbered No. A, 286623. Fifty-cent pieces of spurious silver coin are also in circulation.

Clergymen in Conference.

YORK, Pa., May 11.-At today's session of the United Brethren conference of the World's quadrennial conference of the United Brethren church, the committee to whom was referred the new constitution and confession of faith, reported affirmatively. Rev. Mr. Titus of Michigan and others vigorously opposed the acceptance of the report, and presented a great number of petitions, praying for no change in the constitution. The new constitution was adopted.

No War This Time.

LONDON, May 12.-A Berlin correspondent says the Samoan conference has agreed that a neutral zone shall be created at Apia, and that equal rights shall be granted all powers with regard to the customs. The correspondent also says that Germany has as yet made no claim for indemnity for the killing of the Germans by the natives in Samoa.
