Secretary Tracy has given the contract for the construction of the monster armored coast-defense vessel provided for at the last session of congress, to the Union Iron works of San Francisco. The price is to be \$11,628,000. Five years ago no one would have believed it possible to build such a vessel on the Pacific coast, owing to the lack of facilities. But this concern now has one of the finest plants for iron ship-building in America.
