Glad to Get Back.

Dr. A. H. Diven, leader of the immigration colony that came out here from Pennsylvania a short time ago has been looking over the valley. He has been to Albany, Eugene, Yacima and various places through out the state. He returned last evening to Salem and a short time after his arrival in the city he was met by a JOURNAL reporter, who remarked that he was glad to see the Doctor back again, to which he replied, "Yes, and let me inform you that we are most happy over the fact that we are back. Salem now seems to be like a home." The party have taken pains to view the different parts of the state and are now satisfied that Salem is the pride of the state. The JOURNAL congratulates Dr. Diven and his associates upon their wise selection in the choice of Salem as their future home.

Public Improvements.

Quite a large and enthusiastic meeting was held at ex-Gov. Moody's residence last evening for the purpose of organizing a society for improvement of the public grounds of the city. The necessary committees on by-laws, etc., were appointed, and the meeting adjourned for one week, to meet at the same place. It is believed, with the assistance of the city, county and state, much may be accomplished in beautifying our public grounds, and especially the appearance of Wilson avenue. Societies of this character have been very successful in places in the East and there is no reason why, with proper effort and management, much good cannot result from the effort now being made.

Logs for the Saw Mill.

The Capital Lumber company succeeded in getting a small raft of logs from Murphy's landing, just above Independence yesterday. This is the first lot of logs they have been able to secure this spring, but it is to be hoped they will be able to secure more soon, so as to be in a condition to supply the demand for lumber.

Mr. Moore, the manager of the company, says that he has secured about 700,000 feet of white fir that will be brought down immediately.

Biggest of the Season.

Superintendent Downing of the penitentiary this morning favored the JOURNAL with a box of the largest strawberries seen this season. They are of the "Penneyer" variety, delicious in flavor and beautiful in form. The largest one measures seven inches in circumference.

These berries were grown within the enclosure at the penitentiary and by convict labor. Warden McKinnon, Supt. Downing and Mr. Bees have made a careful estimate and say that with six more days of warm sunshine they will have a ton or more of the ripe berries.

The Beardsley Examination.

Willie Jordan, who has been in jail here for the past few days, on charge of complicity in the Johnson forgery, was this morning taken to Dallas by Sheriff Smith of Polk county, to appear before the grand jury and give testimony in the Beardsley-Perryman killing case. It will be remembered Jordan was the nearest eye witness to the shooting and his evidence, it is thought, will be quite important.

Picnic at Turner.

There will be a grand picnic at Turner on Saturday of this week. It is to be given under the auspices of the Turner band, and is sure to be a success. Dr. J. C. Gilbert of Salem will deliver the address of the day. The program of the day will close with a ball at the opera house in the evening.

ROSWELL P. FLOWER HERE.

The Great Democratic Presidential Candidate Passes Through Salem. To the overland train this morning was attached a special car, upon which was printed "Chicago & Indiana Coal Railway, Business Car." A JOURNAL reporter knew what this meant and as soon as the train stopped he was at the door of the car, and upon presentation of his card was ushered into the presence of the great democratic New York politician and presidential candidate, Roswell P. Flower, who with a select party of friends, is making a tour of the Pacific coast.

Their special car is elegantly furnished throughout, being a combination dining and parlor car. The excursion party consists of some fifteen or twenty and they seem to be enjoying the trip finely. Among the party are Roswell P. Flower and family, H. H. Porter, manager of the road, Ex-Mayor Murphy and wife of Troy, N. Y., Miss Emma Keapsly, Mrs. George Flower, Fred Flower, H. Seivert and George Smith and wife, together with a large number of porters, cooks, servants, etc.

When the train rolled into Salem Roswell P. Flower, the man who sought the nomination for president of the United States at the hands of the democratic convention which nominated Grover Cleveland, was on the forward platform of his special car, eager to gain a view of Salem, the capital city, of which he had so often read. Mr. Flower greeted the reporter cordially, expressing delight at the beauty of the city, but there was no time to attempt anything more than a very brief interview.

"What do I think of Mr. Harrison as president," he said, repeating the words of the reporter. "Well, he promises to give an honest administration. It may not be remarkable for its brilliancy, but it will be fair, if William Henry Harrison was his grandfather. But Blaine is the principal figure. He wields a great power behind the throne. His left hand is seen quite distinctly."

"The star of the republican party is now in the ascendant. The democrats are going to win in '92 with nearly the same platform on which they were defeated last fall. We are hopeful, for we won this time if the popular vote would indicate the result. Cleveland's majority by popular vote was too great to be ignored. The new states will not materially change the situation. Too many factors are shutting down under your high protection policy. Salem is indeed a pretty place. Good day."

The train moved off and with it one man who still has some hope of the ultimate success of the democratic party. Such men are scarce, however.
