A Salem Symp. Arrested.

William Van Cardow, who keeps the Riverside hotel at East Portland, arrived in this city last night and swore out a warrant for the arrest of Ann Smead, a woman of bad character, whom he charged with stealing \$340, in gold coin, from him last Saturday. He says she went into his hotel and asked leave to rest in the parlor a few minutes. While there she went into a bedroom off the parlor. There she found the safe containing the money, which she appropriated. She left in a few minutes. The money was missed in a short time. By communicating with Marshal Ross of this city, she was located, with the result stated. The woman was detained in this city until noon today, when she was taken to East Portland to answer to the charges.

A Pleasant Lecture.

According to announcement, Rev. Dunning of Boston gave one of his noted lectures at the Congregational church last evening. The audience was large and all were much interested in the talk. Dr. Dunning is a man of great religious force and power. He has quick and decisive thoughts that bring his talk out in a very plain and understanding manner. Articles of Incorporation.

The Presbytery of Oregon filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state today, with headquarters at Portland. They are to be known as the Presbytery of Oregon in connection with the Presbyterian church in the United States of America. The incorporators are W. H. Landon, Thomas Boyd, A. J. Brown, O. P. Plummer of Portland and D. O. Gornely of East Portland.

The River on a Rise.

The rains for the past ten days have had a desired effect upon the stage of water in the river. It now stands five feet and four inches, and is still rising at the rate of six inches every twenty-four hours. If the present rains continue much longer, the prospects are that the highest stage of water this year will be reached soon, which will greatly convenience the rafting of logs to the saw mill.

Salem is going to celebrate a Great Big Time Assured.

The mass meeting last night, called for the purpose of taking action in the matter of celebrating the Fourth of July, was largely attended by enthusiastic citizens. Mayor Williams called the meeting to order.

A motion unanimously carried that Salem celebrate the national holiday in an appropriate manner.

A general executive committee of five was appointed. They are to appoint sub-committees and have the general oversight of the matter. This committee consists of E. M. Waite, W. S. Ladd, C. B. Moore, J. M. Rosenberg and Jap Minto.

It was decided to issue an invitation to the six companies of the second regiment, assuring them that all expenses and entertainment would be attended to by the committee.

The executive committee appointed a finance committee as follows: M. E. Goodell, W. F. Dugan, C. L. Keller, J. G. Wright and J. H. Albert.

Granges of the State.

The JOURNAL is in receipt of several communications, this week, from different parts of the jurisdiction and all show that the grange is prosperous.

Pomona of Gilliam county has most interesting gatherings. (This is the county grange.) The patrons of Gilliam expect to push matters until the grange is thoroughly organized in that county.

A letter from Washougal, Wash., shows that the members of that grange are very much in earnest. They are most anxious that the grange be organized in Washington, and the hope is a wise one.

Multnomah district Pomona is by no means idle. News from this quarter is most gratifying. They have moved their quarters into a more commodious hall, and refuse to patronize the Oregonian because of its enmity to the farmers.

Turner grange received two proposals for membership at its last session. It usually has most interesting gatherings.

Surprise initiated four candidates at its last session. Several visitors were present from Salem grange.

Three More Prisoners.

The state penitentiary received three accessions this morning. One was Le Blanc Francois from Grant county, sentenced to one year, for assault with intent to kill. The other two were from Douglas county. They were W. H. Harrington for one year, convicted of assault with a deadly weapon. He shot a man named Rawlins who lived at Florence. The other was James F. Levins, convicted of murder in the second degree and sentenced for life. Levins' crime was that of killing his son, with whom he had a quarrel over some trivial matter.

Every Eight Minutes.

This morning the street cars commenced to run through trips from North Salem to New Park. Everything is moving along nicely and the cars will start to run from now on at 8:30 a. m. and pass along Commercial and State streets every eight minutes. This will give much better accommodations, and people will not be detained waiting for cars as formerly.

HARRIS.—In Salem, Thursday evening, May 16, 1888, of paralysis, Rev. J. W. Harris, aged fifty-eight years and twenty-one days.

Mr. Harris' death was not unexpected, as his illness was of such a nature as to render death a matter of a short time. He was a Congregational minister and was formerly pastor here, at Albany, The Dalles, and at Corvallis. He was born at Cornwall, England, April 25, 1831.

The funeral will be conducted from the residence in University addition to-morrow at 10 a. m., and the remains will be taken to Albany for burial, leaving Salem on the 19:45 train.

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Burial Alive.

Some years ago quite an excitement was raised on the most public corner of the two principal streets of St. Joseph, Mo., by the stopping of a funeral procession at the earnest pleadings of the mother of the child about to be buried, when on opening the coffin the little girl was found struggling out of her grave clothes. She was taken home and was alive and well years after, to the writer's knowledge. The child had warned her mother some time before that she would not be dead and there were other wonderful things connected with the case as published in the local papers at the time. Only during the first days of this month a woman at St. Louis was rescued from burial alive just as the casket was to be closed, by a mere accident, and she recovered and was well at last accounts.

So many cases of the kind occur that we may be sure not one in a hundred of the apparently dead are ever rescued from burial alive. What a horrible thought! We are ill and sink into immolation. The bystanders say "all is over" and weeping friends are led away. No one ever thinks to make a test; no one ever says "perhaps he is not dead." The fact is, we ought never to permit a body to be consigned to the grave until after some surgeon has examined and severed the spinal cord. A slight cut will do it and make it sure that there will be no resuscitation down under the ground. Until the surgeon has the confidence to do this nobody ought to be buried. But we neglect this as we do other things and go on and on until being surprised at these horrors we are startled into some resolve which is neglected.
