LATEST BY TELEGRAPH.

Portland Paragraphs.

PORTLAND, May 21.—Ten more of the Alaskan's passengers have been rescued, as the following telegram from W. M. Hoag to Manager Smith of the O. R. & N. shows: "A party came in from Alsea bay last night and reported that one of the boats from the ill-fated steamer Alaskan came in to Cape Perpetua early yesterday morning with ten of the wrecked sailors. They report having drifted near one of the life rafts from the Alaskan with two dead men on her. The men are now at Alsea and report no news of the other boat, but gave news to Captain Winant, of the steamer Mischief, of their location and direction, when last seen, and the Mischief at once put to sea in search of them. The sailors saved are in good condition, and strong hopes are entertained that Captain Winant will pick up the missing boat, which is supposed to contain eighteen men."

Mrs. Annie Sneed, charged with stealing \$356 from the Riverside hotel, had an examination before Justice Mayo of East Portland yesterday and was held in \$500 bail to answer before the grand jury. She admitted she was in the hotel when the money was taken, but denied taking it. It was shown that she went into the room where the money was and that no one else went into the room until the money was missed.

Albany Points.

ALBANY, May 21.—Wm. M. Hoag, vice-president of the Oregon Pacific railroad, is now on his way from New York and will arrive here the latter part of the present week, when it is announced work on the road eastward will at once commence.

L. W. Clark, who committed suicide at Portland Sunday, was formerly a well-known photographer of this city, and less than three months ago was married to Mrs. Mary Moore, also of this city.

The members of the Albany Presbyterian Sunday school have arranged for a picnic to be given at Maroon on Friday, June 14. The Sunday schools of Salem, Jefferson, Lebanon and other places will join in the picnic, and the various Sunday schools of all denominations in this city have been invited to attend. Half-fare rates have been secured on the railroad, and a large attendance is promised. A basket dinner will be held in the grove.

A Crank's Leap.

NEW YORK, May 20.—Steve Brodie, a bridge jumper, jumped from Passaic Falls this morning and came out without damage. For the past three months Brodie has entertained the idea that it was necessary, in order to preserve his record as a jumper, to rival the late Sam Patch by jumping from some of the places from which the latter jumped. About March 18th Brodie went to Rochester to jump from the Genesee Falls, where Patch lost his life, but was dissuaded as the water was only five feet deep. The scene of to-day's jump is one of the places where Patch jumped.

Murdered in Cold Blood.

NEW YORK, May 20.—Advices from Rua Tan, an island off Honolulu coast, say that Rev. Hobbs, a Baptist minister, and his wife and child were horribly butchered with knives by unknown persons while asleep in their home. The object was robbery. A sailor named Burrell was arrested with some of the stolen money on his person.

Important if True.

OTTAWA, May 20.—A report is current in official circles that a British man-of-war will soon sail from Victoria, B. C., for Behring sea to inquire into the seizure of British vessels by American revenue cutters.

Two Firm Changes.

D. W. Matthews has sold his drug store on State street to G. W. Putnam, a substantial farmer of Aumsville. Mr. Putnam was formerly engaged in the drug business. Dr. Matthews will take a short rest for the benefit of his health, but it is presumed will re-engage in business in Salem soon.

Mr. Tiffany has retired from the firm of Forstner, Tiffany & Co. The firm name will now be Forstner & Co. Mr. Tiffany will continue in the employ of the firm as salesman, but has no interest in the business.
