A Serious Accident.

This morning, while at work in the northeastern part of the city, Albert Southwick was accidentally struck in the face with a hatchet, cutting a severe wound. Mr. Southwick, father of the young man, was standing on a bench, using the hatchet above his head and had just taken it down, when his son raised up, which caused the hatchet to strike him in the face on the left side of the nose, cutting a deep gash. The wound was dressed and will no doubt heal without disfiguring his face.

Two More Insane.

There were brought to the city and consigned to the asylum for insane to-day two unfortunate inmates. One was Wm. Olsen, from Marshfield, Cook county. His hallucination is in thinking the seas and is constantly pursued by witches and wild animals. The other is Judice Fort, from Umatilla county. He has an idea he has pursuers who are seeking to kill him. He tries to evade them but they are always near him.

Ready to Make Brick.

At the penitentiary all is readiness to begin the manufacture of bricks on Monday next. A force of twenty-one men will be employed in the brick yard and it is expected they will turn out 20,000 brick per day. These will be used in the construction of the new northeast wing of the asylum, which will require 600,000 brick. The convicts will also make brick for the state reform school when that institution is located.

One Year in the Pen.

William Leabo, a citizen of the Dalles, was sentenced from the United States district court at Portland, convicted of selling liquor to the Indians. Leabo had some previous experience in the business. He pleaded guilty. The result was that Leabo was fined \$5 and sentenced to one year in the penitentiary. He was brought up yesterday afternoon and will not furnish any whisky to Indians for a while.

Catfish in Oregon.

Pudding river at Swartz's mill is being stocked with catfish, brought from Silver Lake, Washington. The fish can be bought for \$20 per 250, and are said to multiply rapidly. The catfish is considered one of the finest eating fish of the flumy tribe. They have a most delicious flavor, as all former residents of eastern states will remember. They ought to do well in the waters of Oregon.

The Laws Printed.

Yesterday evening, less than three months after the close of the recent session of the legislature, State Printer Baker delivered to the bindery the printed laws of 1889, which make a book of 800 pages, the largest yet issued in the history of Oregon.

The Closing Concert.

The conservatory of music will give their closing concert for the season early in June, for which occasion an elaborate program is under course of preparation. A novel attraction will be Master Hoyt of Portland, the celebrated boy violinist.

He Here Decoration Day.

Cos. A and B will be in Salem and assist in memorial services on May 30th, Decoration day. They promise to add much to the pleasure of the day. An appropriate program is being arranged for that day and Salem will put her best foot foremost for the entertainment of her guests.

Fell on His Head.

Lewis, the five-year-old son of S. T. Richardson, while playing yesterday afternoon fell from a tree, striking his head upon the ground, and bruising it considerably. He was resting easy at last accounts, and it is hoped that he may recover soon.

More Survivors.

Nine survivors of the wrecked Alaskan passed through Salem this morning from Yachima to Portland. They were rescued from life boat No 3 and were three days without food.

Off to Ashland.

Prof. McElroy goes to Ashland this evening, where he will close the normal examination to-morrow. He will also deliver a lecture there to-morrow evening, on an educational subject.

THE SALEM CITY COUNCIL.

The City Fathers Conducted a Lively Meeting Last Night.

A regular meeting of the city council was held last night for the transaction of business.

The ordinance looking to the regulation of the construction and operation of street railways was referred to the committee on ordinances, for further amendments.

The matter of the construction of a sidewalk along the S. Watson property on Trade street, on the north side, was referred to the committee on streets and public property.

The committee on streets and public property presented a favorable report for sewers on Ferry street to the alley between Liberty and Commercial. They recommended that the city surveyor make a preliminary survey and estimate.

In the matter of the election of a city surveyor W. H. Byars and Seth R. Hammer were nominated. The first ballot gave Hammer 3 votes and Byars 6. The latter was declared elected.

The matter of preparing an ordinance for the improvement of the streets was referred to the committee on streets and public property.

A petition was presented asking the vacation of Church, Summer and Capital streets between Court and State, referred to committee of Williams, Hirsch and Murphy.

A protest was raised against using Marion square as a cow pasture and the marshal was ordered to hereafter arrest cows found browsing therein.

STATE GRANGE MEETING.

The Annual Session to be Held in Salem Next Week.

The annual session of the Oregon State Grange will convene at the State House in the city of Salem, on Tuesday, May 28, 1889, remaining in session three days—Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

Arrangements have been made for reduced rates on the Southern Pacific and O. R. & N. railways; members paying full fare going and one-fifth fare returning.

The session will open promptly at 10 a. m. on Tuesday, the 28th. On Monday afternoon at one o'clock there will be an address of welcome by Governor Penney and a response by Mrs. I. L. Hilleary of Turner.

Also an address of welcome by Judge R. P. Boise on behalf of Salem Grange and a response by W. A. Sample of Heppner.

Mrs. H. E. Hayes will deliver an address of welcome to the California delegation of whom there is expected to be a large number in attendance. Many of the California patrons will be here and the grangers of Oregon are preparing to give them royal entertainment.

The fifth degree will be conferred Thursday the 30th, and the sixth degree, Friday the 31st.

The prospects are favorable for one of the most successful and interesting meetings ever enjoyed by the Patrons of the state, and those absent will lose a treat they will always regret.
